# The most important gift for your premature baby



### Why is my breastmilk best?

Your breastmilk contains **invaluable nutrients** and immune factors that help your baby grow and develop well. Premature babies get extra benefits from mom's breastmilk, such as decreased risk of a serious infection in the intestines called necrotizing enterocolitis (NEC).

### How can I provide breastmilk for my baby?

Premature babies are not strong enough to feed at the breast so they receive expressed breastmilk instead. We highly recommend **pumping as soon after birth** as you are able. Ask your bedside nurse or a lactation consultant for help pumping as soon as you are ready. **Frequent pumping** (every two to three hours) will mimic the frequency of a newborn's feeding pattern and promote a good milk supply.

### Where can I pump at the hospital?

We encourage you to pump at your baby's bedside. Being closer to your baby while pumping can increase the amount of milk you produce.

### Why can't I just use donor breastmilk?

Your fresh milk is best for your baby. Donor human milk must be pasteurized for safety, which kills the infection-fighting live cells. It is a good bridge when a mother is actively pumping and trying to increase her own milk supply but it is not an equal substitute.

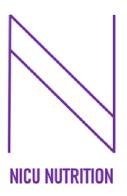
# How can I learn more about breastfeeding? What should I do if I have a problem?

Fresh	Up to 4 hours	Up to 4 days	6 months (12 max.)
Thawed	1-2 hours	Up to 24 hours	NEVER refreeze milk
Leftover from Feeding	Use within 2 hours of feeding		

## HOW TO GET A BREAST PUMP



### Public Insurance (Medicaid, TRICARE/VA, CHIP)

If you have WIC, you will need to reach out to your county's health department and let them know your baby was born prematurely and you need a breast pump. If you are already established with WIC you can call and schedule a pickup for your free pump. If you previously did not have WIC, but now qualify, you will have to schedule an initial intake appointment to get your free pump.



Download the **Gocify** App, free for WIC members, for 24/7 access to registered nurses, lactation consultants and dieticians.

### Do I qualify for WIC?

- WIC eligibility is based off your income scan the QR code to access a WIC prescreening tool and see if you qualify
- You are automatically eligible for WIC if you are eligible for SNAP benefits, Medicaid, and/or TANF



### Private Insurance (BCBS, VIVA, Aetna, United, Cigna, etc.)

Contact your insurance provider by calling the number on the back of your insurance card and ask if you have breast pump coverage. If you do, ask how and where you can get a breast pump; most require that you get a physician's prescription. Some insurance companies may have a preference for a specific medical supply company. Ask your nurse, social worker, an OBGYN, or Nurse Practitioner to get you a prescription for a pump.

After receiving a prescription, you can get a pump from multiple suppliers, including:
