#### Restoration House Report

The first thing I want to say in my report is a huge congratulations to men who have persevered and done the hard work that rehabilitation is. You inspire us and fill us with hope for what is available to a man who believes in himself and a different future. I recently had to sit in the County Court in support of one of our lads to share about Restoration House and our program. On several occasions the Judge reflected back and thanked Foundation 61 for the work we do helping men find life. After the second time I spoke back and said, "to be honest, we just provide a place to live and walk alongside them, they have to do all the hard work."

We have had a stable year providing a nurturing residence for 49 men to find a home and new beginning. As always some come and go quickly, others stay for a while and some push through to compete their journey with us. For some it's the second (or third) time round who come in and I have been reminded this year not to give up on a man because "rehab" didn't work the first-time round. We have recently sent Matty off to the transition house after completing his second full go with us over the last few years. To see the difference in Matt this time from last has been great. Matt stands as a reminder to me that we are all ongoing works of art, "masterpieces" the bible would say, all created to do good things.

Throughout the year we have delivered 1,450 contact hours through Learn Local and the class participation has been fantastic. It is inspiring to watch the men courageously look back over their life to uncover and uproot the behaviours, thinking and traumatic experiences which have bound them for so long. Art Therapy, process and small groups are often the highlight for the boys in the week.

We recently had a group of year nine students come out for some "life education" and I shared with them that many of our guys, like them, already had significant traumatic events and identity crises that had them on a negative path ultimately leading to their addiction by the age of 15. (cont.)

The year has certainly had some drawbacks though with the passing of Dean Lobbe. The calls and tributes came fast as Dean had made a significant impact on all the guys who had the privilege of being loved by him during their stay at Foundo. It is impossible to sum up the impact of Dean's life but his legacy through the actions of his love continues to speak well past his earthly life. We also lost one of our participants this year who passed away from complications during heart surgery. His passing really left a hole in the house. However, it was a time of both mourning and celebration for many, especially his family as he passed away sober and connected with his family.

My highlight of the year has been our incredible team of volunteers who come week in and out and give their time, energy and resources to love on our lads. To our overnight warriors, our day time heroes and the crew who come and hang out in the evenings, run bible studies, transportation etc – you make this place and your actions speak love, louder than words.



#### **House Of Hope**

### Inspire Women's Group

'Being connected is vitally important for our mental and physical wellbeing and can be a protective factor against anxiety and depression. Foundation 61 through its's Inspire Community Group has created safe spaces for women to find a place for community, connection, and conversation.'

Our women's community group Inspire, provides a place for woman in our local community to come together and find a place of connection. All are welcome, with our youngest participant being in her twenties and our oldest in her 80's.

We have enjoyed a number of social outings over the 12 months including a night at the movies to see Mrs Harris Goes to Paris, and coffee connection mornings exploring some new places in and around Geelong. This has included Barrabaool Maze Gardens and Van Loons Nursery. Our Art Therapy group continues to meet each Tuesday at Bellarine Living and Learning Centre in Whittington. Nicole Myers finished up facilitating the group mid-year due to work commitments. We are extremely thankful for her commitment to the group from a student who started on placement with us to group facilitator. Jo van der Schoor has stepped up into facilitating the group and will bring a new focus on personal development and growth. We are thankful to Jo for her willingness to take on this role.

Our 2022 – 2023 Inspire retreat was once again held at Camp Burnside with our good friend Jules Haddock "the Anxious Bird" as our guest speaker. The theme of our retreat was "my cup overflows". Around 20 ladies were in attendance for what was another memorable time of connection and sharing.

A number of our ladies participated in some of the events hosted by Art of The Minds in October in celebration of Mental Health Week 2022. These events provided connection and education opportunities.

We are thankful to Kardinia Community Services and Kardinia Church who provided us with Christmas hampers that we were able to distribute to some of the women who are part of our Inspire community in the lead up to Christmas.

And, when the doors of the House of Hope finally open for women in 2024, it will be the full realisation of the vision Rob, Caroline and the other founders of Foundation 61 had 18 years ago. 


