RE: Preparing Our Hearts & Minds For General Conference 2024

Psalm 46:10 | Be still and know that I am God! I am exalted among the nations; I am exalted in the earth."

Dear Church Family,

On April 23, 2024, the General Conference of the United Methodist Church will come together for 'Holy Conferencing' for the first time since our last General Conference; a special called session in 2019. That feels like such a long time ago. It was supposed to deal with matters of human sexuality and many issues that surround that topic to set a course for the future. But then Covid hit and so many other things happened!

Now, the church once again turns to the process of 'Holy Conferencing' to prepare for the future and what it might hold. What is Holy Conferencing? Ultimately, it is the process for how we care for one another; a process of holy discernment. Jesus taught the disciples that "where two or more are gathered in my name, I will be there also."

When the General Conference gathers this week, 862 delegates from around the globe will come together in Charlotte, NC to consider important church business including some 1,099 petitions that have been raised. These include ongoing consideration of the issues relating to human sexuality. Work will begin in smaller groups, called legislative committees, to evaluate each petition and to discern which should be raised for consideration by the full General Conference body. After the legislative committees have completed their work, the conference will come together for worship and to observe the sabbath on Sunday with a day of rest.

I like to remind people that we are a global denomination. This is an important consideration which should ground us in our relationships with one another and God. John Wesley began using holy conferencing in small group settings. But the principles of listening to understand rather than listening to merely respond, loving one another, and listening for God during the conversation, have become a part of our Methodist DNA. Wesley referred to holy conferencing as a means of grace; meaning that this is not only a way to reach understanding but also a way to draw near to God.

Throughout this General Conference, I encourage you to evaluate information about the conference, especially that shared by secular media reports and social media, with caution and a healthy dose of skepticism. Such reports tend to lack a complete understanding of the nuances of ecclesiological matters and often sensationalize the news for commercial gain. As the general conference progresses, we will share important updates with you and at its conclusion we will provide you with an update concerning the decisions that are made and how our church might be impacted in the future.
