Your horse should have a solid foundation. This would include being able to tie on a single and cross tie; stand while being tacked, bathed, farrier work, etc. They should also be able to lead nicely on a lead rope. They should be desensitized to training aids. You want to be confident and in charge when training or interacting with your horse. It is imperative first and foremost for your safety, the safety of other people and animals, as well as the success of your participation in this clinic.

We will have a fun, informative, and busy day! Following are the items that will assist in a successful day...

Equipment/Tack

Please bring the following: (Please don't feel the need to go out and buy anything - we will make due!)

- Webbing or leather halter (not rope halters) and lead rope (round soft cotton rope is best around 4-6')
- Lunge line around 8-10' long
- Gloves optional
- Single hobble we will have a couple available to use at the clinic if you do not have one
- Set of reins preferably one continuous rein with snaps on each end to snap into halter
- Boots (preferred) or closed toe/heel shoes to work in. No crocs, flip flops, sandals or such are permitted
- Layered clothing so you do not have to stop to change
- Dressage type whip
- Lunge Whip, or stick & string/carrot stick
- Treats and treat pouch
- Other things to bring: Water/drinks, snacks, lawn chair, hay, water bucket

Principles of Training

It is important to always refer to the following principles of training when working with your horse and training new behaviors. Utilizing these principles will help to ensure your safety and success!

Safety First! Always do a safety assessment to ensure a safe environment for all
 Patience Approach all training sessions with a clear head and sense of calm

• **Capability** Asking something the animal is capable of

• Consistency & Clarity Clear, concise cues and commands (body language, voice, tools, position)

• **Repetition** Consistently repeat the commands, cues, and behavior over and over again

Reward
 Praise (verbal and physical) and treats for good efforts

• **Discipline** Indicating something is unacceptable thru voice, body language, and/or tools

• **Progress** Set the bar high; Move forward with training and expectations; Don't settle for less!
