


Lenten Devotion Series from Outreach for Hope

Black History Month

In recognition of Black History Month, each week we will highlight and honor a Black person who has made significant contributions to our country and its people. Some will be historical figures and some will be contemporary. They are all a part of our shared journey as a nation.

Tuskegee Airmen

When the U.S. entered World War II, all of its military was still racially segregated. The Army, Navy and the Marine Corps all segregated black soldiers into separate units believing they were not as capable as white service members. As tradition and policy warranted, these separate African American units were overseen by white officers.

Since WWI, requests by African American service men, who desired to become aviators were denied. "The racially motivated rejections of World War I African American recruits sparked more than two decades of advocacy by African Americans who wished to enlist and train as military aviators." Then in 1941, under equal advocacy pressure, the War Department and the Army Air Corps constituted the first all-black flying group.

The qualifications for black applicants were incredibly high. "They made the standards so high; we actually became an elite group. We were screened and super-screened. We were unquestionably the brightest and most physically fit young blacks in the country."

It was within this atmosphere of segregation, screening, and scrutinized training that the famous Tuskegee Airmen, an all black flying unit of the U.S. Army Air Force (AAF), were established in 1941. The pilots and support personnel were trained at the Tuskegee Army Air Field at Tuskegee College in Alabama. The first all-black Tuskegee squadron was activated in 1943. Multiple black squadrons ended up training at Tuskegee, however the most recognized is the all black 332nd Fighter Group. This group fought in the European theatre during WWII where they became known as one of the AAF's most successful and decorated escort groups while protecting large Allied bombers from German fighter planes.

The U.S. military was finally desegregated entirely in 1948.
