


A MESSAGE FROM YOUR ZOR POTENTATE




PAST PRESIDENTS HONORED



QUESTION: Did you change your name?

ANSWER: Yes, our name changed to reflect our change from a hospital to an outpatient clinic. Our new name is Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities (SHC-TWI).

Q: Is SHC-TWI still performing surgery?

A: Our SHC-TWI surgeons are still performing surgery on our patients, but not at our facility. The majority of surgeries are now performed at Gillette Children's Specialty Healthcare in St. Paul.

Q: Will SHC-TWI patients receive financial assistance for surgeries at Gillette?

A: Yes, both SHC-TWI and Gillette offer financial assistance to SHC-TWI patients. Families should first contact the SHC-TWI financial counselor at 612-596-6108 for details and options.

Q: Is SHC-TWI moving?

A: Yes, in the future, the clinic will move to a different, well-equipped and appropriately sized site in the Twin Cities metro area where outpatient services will continue. We are looking forward to providing your care in a newly updated environment and will notify all families of our move well in advance.

Q: Has the cafeteria closed?

A: Yes, the cafeteria has been replaced with high end vending providing a variety of meal options, including: sandwiches, soups, pasta, fruit, cereal, and a variety of beverage and snack options. Debit or credit cards are required to make a purchase. Cash is not accepted.

Q: Is the parent accommodation center (PAC) closed?

A: Yes, our on-site hotel, the PAC, has closed. Many nearby hotels are offering SHC-TWI patients discounted rates. For a list of participating hotels, call the main number and speak with a receptionist. Ifcost is a concern, first contact your local Shrine Center to inquire about financial assistance.

Q: Is transportation assistance still available?

A: Yes, please contact your local Shrine Center to make arrangements. Our receptionist can provide you with their contact information, if needed.

Q: Is POPS closing?

A: Pediatric Orthotic and Prosthetic Services (POPS) at SHC-TWI is not closing, but it is changing. Most devices will be fabricated at our POPS central fabrication facility located in Tampa, Florida. POPS in the Twin Cities will provide the same clinical service by the same staff as well as the same quality devices. As a POPS patients, you should expect comparable turnaround times for devices as before.

Q: What does the future hold for SHC-TWI?

A: The core services provided at SHC-TWI have not changed. Patients will still visit the SHC-TWI clinic to see their physician, take x-rays, and receive physical or occupational therapy, orthotics and prosthetics. Our future looks a lot like the SHC-TWI that you already love but with increased accessibility thanks to telemedicine and outreach that will expandur services throughout the upper Midwest region bringing more care to more children.







The instinct of the human spirit nurtures and looks out for others. Unlike a fawn born in the Spring and on its own in a year, a new baby needs protection and guidance throughout many years. Parents, family and friends influence a

path of life by giving advice and wisdom. A baby needs to be protected from the elements as well with learning a language of understanding. Warding off the hot and cold of Mother Nature can be brutal, if not prepared. Innocent and immature are the young in both mind and body. We, as humans, must be protected in the earliest years of life until maturity kicks in and one can be on his/her own. Shriners support the care needed to make young lives better. We invest so much into the betterment of our children to make their lives well and, hopefully, prosper.

Food, water, fire and shelter are the keys to survival is well known. Generations before us went out and gathered berries and fruits, raised chickens and beef or hunted when it came to food. The thirst was quenched by pure well water. Twenty years ago, you couldn't sell a bottle of water. It was looked at as a gimmick to make money. Today we buy H2O by the case for home and to sell at events.

Water today without filtration or chemicals is hard to find. I miss drinking from a 3-foot Artesian well fountain forced up between the rocks, like a garden hose stream. Hopping off the wagon while bailing hay on a hot summer day for drink. A porcelain tin water cup. Purply blue with white specs and had chips in its surface. It hung in the same spot on a post for the past hundred years for anyone who came along with no fee.

Selected rocks around an outside campfire had meaning. After spending a week with the Ojibwa Indians and learning their culture. The difference between a living dense rock retaining heat from the campfire and a dead rock that was porous, cold and useless. It gave me the origins of a wood stove brick I heard about, used to warm your feet under the covers on a cold winter night. Just like the Indians originally took a living rock from around the campfire for warmth. Days of making wood are getting slim, have a hard time giving our deadfall to anyone. Most rather pay for it and have a load delivered presplit. The adjustable remote flame of gas has taken over with the bill of a delivery hose or line. The even heat thermals not the same anymore.

Building of a new home, barn or shelter was with the help of a neighbor. Harvesting of crops was the same going from neighbor to next driveway helping each family fill their barn. In return a free labor team. Bartering was in full swing. We now have so many other variables to overcome which takes longer for maturity to develop. The change from living for family efficiency and learning how you could live without a lot money to working at a job that created more income and wealth. We buy most everything these days and it takes a lot of green backs to cover all the expenses. Being responsible to realize the difference between a want and a need can be tough. The days of living off the land and pulling a carrot or radish from the garden are getting less. Remembering the gathering of eggs, large gardens of vegetables of every variety for the table. Meat in the oven from a hunt or barnyard. Now, "Farm Fresh" means purchasing it from outdoor markets or inside a deli. Our shelters are far better than past generations. I remember my Grandma's worn kitchen floor where the linoleum wore smooth through to the subfloor. They first had a bathroom in their house in the Winter of 1979 probably one of the last to modify their home for this modern convenience. Forced to because of age and aches of getting to and from the outhouse. Land rich they were, but money poor. Kind and humble. The smell of homemade bread was forefront and showy material things on the back burner of life. I was already being brought up with modern conveniences and didn't appreciate the value then, like kids are growing up now with a smartphone today under their parents cell plan. We spend money on just about everything we put in our mouths and for all the comforts of pamper and entertainment. In only a couple of generations we became dependent on money to provide our food, water, heat and protection. Many of our elder Shriners can attest to all these changes on how money can buy convenience.

We entertained ourselves as kids. Made up games and came home with grass stained pants. Being bored didn't exist. Even when you laid in bed in your warm shelter of a house, in a dark room, you could imagine seeing the stars through the roof. Staring at a wall you could see outside through the material layers. Not just a vertical flat surface and barrier holding you in, but 10" of protection. The varnish stained window and base trim nailed from a finishing carpenter. Under that there's the glare of the semi-gloss eggshell latex paint sheen from the nightlight. Primer under that, then the hand turned texture design in the plaster. Then the paper both sides of the drywall, paper stapled insulation to 16" on center studs with foundation sill and Joist plate, possibly a black ant, the cripples and headers. Holes drilled to allow the electrical lines leading to an outlet another to a switch. Black, white and ground wire with paper and plastic protection. The exterior particle boards. Foam insulation. Masonite siding with primer and white paint. Shutters of black rounding it out. All this because we need a shelter of so many layers. Preplanned space before I was born to be shared with siblings. The next time your Grandkid, family or friend is bored. Ask them to look at a flat wall for entertainment. Using their imagination to see outside and escaping through it all. There are no barriers when determination and imagination can override blind obstacles before us.

The cost of living has gone up, but it's the cost of how we live that can make life unaffordable. As society keeps changing to expensive automation, the will and want to help children is still there for free. Donating your time and effort as a Shriner protects our fraternity's philanthropy. We all were protected when we were young. Paying forward today with your own Shriner passion leads to a good feeling. Best part, it's free.
