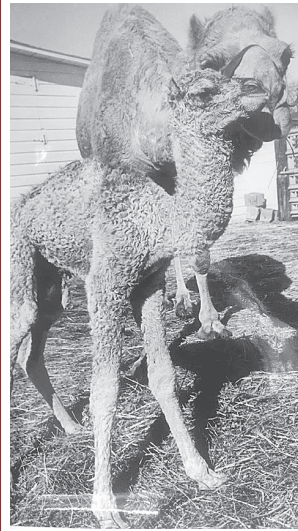

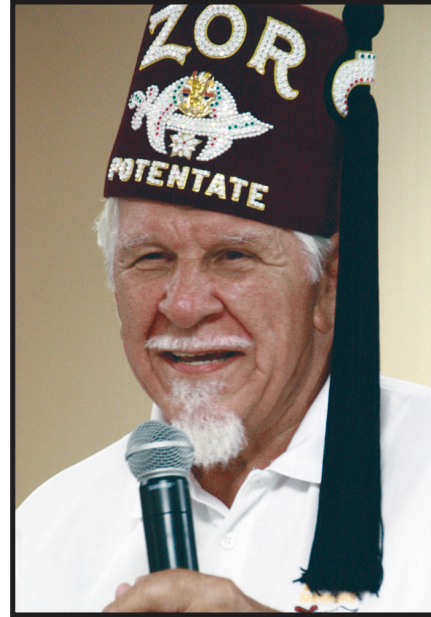

The Shriners Hospital for Children® started in 1922 in Shreveport, Louisiana and today have 22 hospitals throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico.

Former Patient Scott Boucher Becomes a Shriner



In 1982, I became a patient at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Springfield, in Massachusetts. Little did I know that my first visit would pave the way for years of specialized care and lead me to become a Shriner.


At age 5, my doctor in Northern Maine advised my parents that I would need extensive surgeries to correct my orthopaedic issues. Since my parents were unable to afford the necessary procedures, my doctor recommended that my parents contact Shriners Hospitals for Children for assistance. I became a patient, where I was treated for Legg-Calvé-Perthes

syndrome, which caused a deformity in both of my hip sockets and prevented me from walking. For the next 17 years, I underwent a variety of treatments, including 12 surgeries and two body casts. Some of the more unique treatments I experienced were 3-D gait analysis, a functional body brace that I used for two years and numerous advanced shoe orthotics. I am now 38 years old. I live in Bangor, Maine, with my wife, Dena, and our 5-year-old daughter, Claire, and own a financial services business. I joined Shriners International as soon as I turned 21. I knew 17 years ago that I wanted to help this amazing organization that changed my life. My favorite memories from when I was a patient are the Shrine clowns, so I felt there was no better way to give back than to become a clown myself. I have been portraying "Scooter" for the past 16 years, helping to make patients and families smile.

Last year, I worked on organizing a trip for our local Anah Shriners Clown unit to visit the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Boston and Springfield. Many of my fellow clowns had never set foot into a Shriners Hospital, yet they had dedicated hundreds of hours in support of the amazing work of the hospitals. I wanted my fellow clowns to witness how the hospitals are changing the lives of children and inspire them to continue on their great work.

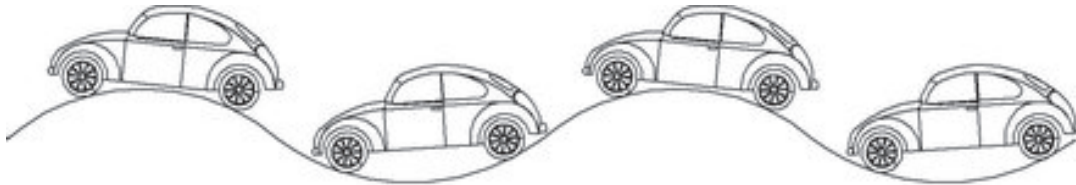

Good News...New shirts have been approved for drivers in the DADS program!!!!

Some of the guidelines for the new shirts are as follows:

1. You must turn in an annual drivers certification from in order to drive. If you are unsure if you have turned one in or not, please check with your coordinator or Zor office for the form
2. You must have a minimum of 5 trips, starting January 1st, 2016 in order to have Zor pay for most of the shirt
3. You will be able to get 1 shirt with Zor contributing to it. If you would like more than 1 shirt, you will have to pay for the extra shirts you would like

The new shirts are short sleeve. You will pay \$10 and Zor will pay the rest of 1 shirt. Extra shirts will be \$25 each. On the right chest area will be the word Zor, the Shriner Emblem and the Hospital DADS under the emblem. On the left side will be a pocket. Your name will not be on the shirt, as the hospital issues badges with names and pictures that must be worn when entering the hospital. Please wear the badge on your collar, your shirt button area or the left side with a magnet. The badge SHOULD NOT be worn on your pants

Prostate Cancer

Who is at risk?

Age Although men of any age can get prostate cancer, the chance of having it increases rapidly after age 50. More than 60% of all prostate cancers are diagnosed in men older than 65.

Racial/Ethnic background African American men have the highest documented prostate cancer incidence rates in the world. Furthermore, in the US, the prostate cancer death rate for African American men is more than twice the rate for white men.

Other risk factors:

- **Family history** Having a father or brother with prostate cancer more than doubles a man's risk of developing it. The risk is much higher for men with several affected relatives, especially if their relatives were young when the cancer was found.
- **Diet** A high-fat diet may play a part in causing prostate cancer.

Prostate cancer in the United States: 2016 Estimates

- **New cases: 180,890**
- **Deaths per year: 26,120**
- **5-year relative survival rate for localized state: >99%**
- **5-year relative survival rate for all stages combined: >99%**
- **10-year relative survival rate for all stages combined: >99%**

Quality-of-life issues

From the time of diagnosis, the quality of life for every cancer patient and survivor is affected in some way. They may be affected socially, psychologically, physically, and spiritually.

Concerns that patients and survivors most often express are fear of recurrence; chronic and/or acute pain; sexual problems, fatigue; guilt for delaying screening or treatment, or for doing things that may have caused the cancer; changes in physical appearance; depression; sleep difficulties; changes in what they are able to do after treatment; and the burden on finances and loved ones. For prostate cancer patients and survivors, quality-of-life concerns most often revolve around the potential for incontinence and sexual dysfunction.

Bottom line

Age and gender are the main risk factors for developing prostate cancer.

Detecting prostate cancer in an earlier, more treatable form may increase the success of treatments and survival. All men age 50 and older should talk to their doctors about the risks and benefits of prostate cancer testing to decide if it's right for them. Men diagnosed with prostate cancer should discuss all available treatment options with their doctor, especially since it's not clear whether all men need to be treated for prostate cancer right way.

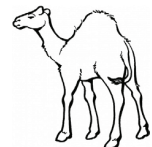

There will be a brief presentation about the trip and a question and answer session at the end of the August Steak Fry at the Madison Zor Temple.

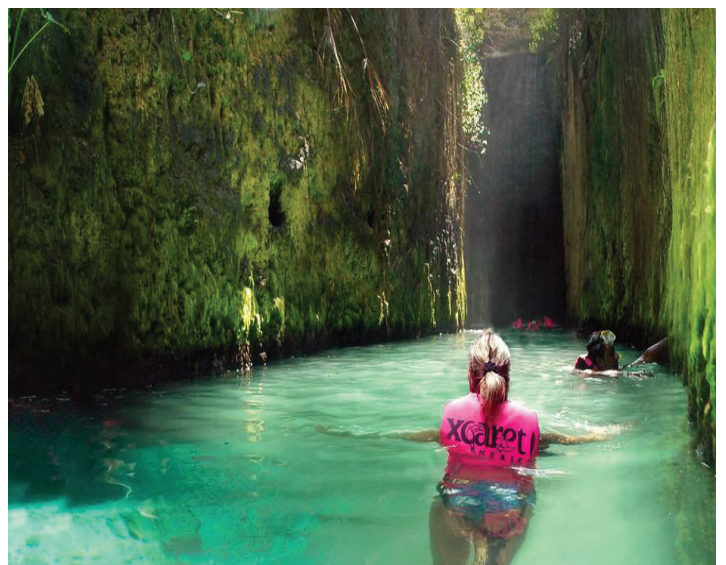
