






THE JERRY BRISTOL STORY





That man is Jerry Bristol of Ellsworth, Wisconsin. He is not an ordinary man. His story is one right out of a Norman Rockwell's America.

He attended schools in Ellsworth and studied accounting at the University of Minnesota night school.

Jerry started his working career on the factory floor of Red Wing Shoe Company; rising through the ranks to spend 41 years with the nationally known company and retiring as the Shoe's chief financial officer. While in Red Wing Shoe administration Jerry was urged to become involved in committees and boards. One of his assignments included the IRC (now Pro-act) which provided employment for handicapped individuals. Jerry was a member of the board of directors. He also served on the Board of Supervisors for the company credit union, and participated in the School District coop program which placed students in real work environments.

Although Bristol joined the Hancock Lodge early on, he did not become active until his retirement since his duties were very time consuming.

Upon becoming a Mason he was soon directed to the Scottish Rite and then on to the Shrine. It was about this time that Hancock Lodge #229 was considering building a new lodge and he met the challenge of the building committee head on.

Jerry said "The Grand Lodge had expressed concern that a new building in a small town was a difficult task." But Jerry knew a new lodge would generate a great comradery with the lodge brothers and the sisters of the Eastern Star members. Jerry had a passion for fishing but Lester Heise, the brother selected to ram rod the project, did not give him much time for fishing because he had a job for him to do.

The project was completed in the fall and without warning, "I was elected Junior Warden!" said Bristol. Jerry went on through the chairs to become Worshipful Master. Then the Shrine came calling and soon "I was in line to become president."

Jerry's wife Mary was a member of the Eastern Star Chapter #116 and shared an opportunity to travel to Norway, Sweden and Denmark. Since traveling was one of his retirement goals, this fit right in. Naturally, upon return he was invited to join the Eastern

MARSHALL

Mark Hazelbaker - Madison mark@hazelbakerlaw.com



Zor's 2018 Marshal, Mark Hazelbaker is a lawyer who has a practice in Madison serving local governments and businesses. Mark is a native of Mukwonago, Wisconsin. He attended the University of Wisconsin - Madison, earning degrees in Journalism, 1979 and law, 1982.

While still in Law School, he worked as Executive Assistant to the Dane County Executive, assisting in budget and management analyses. He served as the Executive's liaison to the Cuban émigré community addressing the impact of the 1980 Mariel Boatlift in Dane County.

Mark served the United Council of UW Students as Legislative Director from 1980-81. As lobbyist for UW students, he succeeded in persuading the Legislature to reduce planned cuts to the UW System by half, restoring many important programs for students.

Mark clerked at a small Madison law firm, and subsequently was hired as the Legal Counsel of the Wisconsin Counties Association 1983 to 1986. While with the WCA, Mark led lobbying efforts to modernize county government by creating cabinet government at the County level. When controversy arose over implementation of Native American Treaty rights to off-reservation hunting and fishing, her was designated by the county officials in the affected area to represent them in the matter with the Department of Natural Resources and the Tribes.

In 1986, Mark moved to Manitowoc, Wisconsin to take a position with Manitowoc County as County Attorney and Personnel Director. Her oversaw implementation of the sale of a county nursing home to private operators and successfully defended the sale in Court. He managed all legal and human resource matters for the County until 1989, when he was promoted to the newly created position of Administrative Coordinator of Manitowoc County from 1986 to 1992. He continued to act as County Attorney. There, he met his first wife, with whom he had a son, Nik, who is now 30 and employed in real estate investments.

Mark returned to Madison to enter private practice in 1992 and has continued to advise and work with local governments, businesses and associations throughout his legal career. His experience includes acting as lead lobbyist on five major new laws and hundreds of local governments ordinance and zoning actions. He has handled thousands of court trials and dozens of jury trials in civil and criminal cases.

In 1994, Mark joined the fraternity as a member of Four Lakes Daylight Lodge. He was following tradition of his family, which has several active members. He joined Scottish Rite in 1995 and the Shrine in 2001. In 2015, he was appointed as one of Zor's Associate Members of the Board of Directors of the Shriner's Children's Hospital – Chicago.

He is married to Dr. Deborah Hoffman, a licensed psychologist, who has two adult children of her own. They live in Madison.


I love that Sir Gary had Brett Favre sign it.

COME ONE, COME ALL, TO THE 71st ANNUAL MEHARA SHRINE CIRCUS!

We will be riding elephants, laughing at the clowns, gasping in delight at the circle of death motocross riders, humming along to the calliope, and jumping at the boom of the human cannonball. We will be hosting an open-air circus at Carson Park in Eau Claire on June 12th and 13th at 2 and 7 pm. On June 14th we will be in the Dunn County Rec Center/Ice Arena at 2 and 7 pm. This year tickets can be purchased at Eau Claire and Chippewa Falls Kwik Trip Gas Stations or online at www.ShrinersFun.com. Ticket prices are \$16 for adults and \$14 for children.

Did you know the first circus the Mehara Shrine Club held in Eau Claire was in 1947? Sumner Timm a local business leader was Potentate. William Kay owned the circus in those days. The arrival of the circus was a big deal! It came in by train and was unloaded out near the old Drummond Packing plant. The entire circus would parade down to Carson Park and the City charged a fee to clean up after the animals. Eventually, they no longer paraded as they came by truck. It was about 1974 when the Mehara Shrine Club first contracted with Bob Sands as a promoter and George Carden as the circus provider. In 1983 when J Kevin Johnson was club President, the first Menomonie show was held. At that time, it was at the race track. Until recently when the Eau Claire Express baseball team took over the concessions at Carson Park, the Drum Corps provided/sold food. The Sawdusters sold pop and the food at Menomonie shows. In the earlier years, the funds raised supported Shriners Hospital for Children as well as a local Orthopedic School. The money raised helped pay for eye examinations, dental care, and fitting of glasses for local children. Later the school was known as McDonough. At that time there were also had hearing impaired children we helped. In addition, funds were used to sponsor local special needs children's Christmas parties at the Masonic Center. McDonough closed, and the children integrated into the regular school system. We were requested to stop sponsoring parties etc. While the circus no longer supports the immediate local charities, the Masons have set up a fund called the Angel Fund, that anyone can donate to, for local use and our circus funds support the work of the club and Shriners Hospitals.

HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

On Tuesday March 27th, 20% of our staff, 22 FTEs and approximately 31 people were notified of position eliminations. The last day of work for those

losing a job will be April 20th. This action was caused by the Home Office to speed up the process of the Hospital converting to an ASC (Ambulatory Surgical Center). Which basically means no over night patient stays. Hospitals that use Joint Commission accreditation must have at least two active inpatients at the time of all initial or resurvey events to be classified as a hospital. Twin Cities has an average of less than one per day. While the hospital doctors perform almost 500 surgeries annually only about 100 are inpatient discharges.

During, I believe, the 2009 Imperial session Nobles voted that limiting the use of a Shriners Hospital, such as for day surgery and/ or outpatient care, is a function of the board of trustees under Statue §508.7. Therefore the Board of Governors of the Twin Cities Hospital have no choice as to when and how the transformation takes place. Additionally, the Home Office does not believe we can sustain an ASC and would prefer the hospital look at alternatives such as developing area clinics and feeding patients to other Shrine Hospitals like Chicago and St. Louis. The Home Office engaged McKinsey & Company to support our core planning team in this effort and began their work on March 26th.

Hospital Day and Rainbow of Hope recognition will be Saturday May 19th from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Again this year our annual Hospital Day will be preceded by a Minnesota Twin baseball game. Rainbow of Hope awards will be presented to three current or past patients for their contributions as role models for others.

Women's General Auxiliary 4 Kids will host their annual meeting on Monday, April 23rd followed by a luncheon with the Hospital Board of Directors on April 24th.

The 3rd Annual Gala is scheduled for Friday, June 1st at the Renaissance Depot in downtown Minneapolis

Our 8th annual prom event was held on April 7th. This special event continues to be an exciting evening for our kids.

A screening clinic will be held in Ashland on June 27th.





A GIFT FOR BILLY

In 1922 the Shrine of North America established the first Shriners Hospital for children. Since then, they have grown to 19 orthopedic hospitals and 3 burn institutes located throughout North America.

This is the story of an accident our son Billy, age 11 had, and how we were helped by the Shriners. This is only one story, there are thousands more like it. So, I write this as "A Tribute to The Shriners" and to the more than 400,000 children who have been helped by them.

It was Thursday, April 7, 1994, a beautiful early Spring day in Wisconsin. As I was putting on my jacket to leave work for the day, in anticipation of our first cookout of the season, I received the phone call that all parents fear. It was my husband, Mike, screaming at me into the phone to meet him and Billy at the emergency room of our local hospital. After Mike had started the fire in the fire pit in our backyard, he realized that he had forgotten to pick up buns on his way home from work. Leaving Billy playing in the yard, he drove to the store a few blocks away, being gone for only a few minutes. During his absence Billy, thinking the fire had gone out, had thrown a small amount of gas (kept in the garage) onto the fire. At that moment Mike pulled into the driveway and heard Billy screaming. As he ran to the backyard, Mike saw Billy's pant legs in flames. He quickly rolled Billy in snow left in the yard, receiving minor burns to his own hands, and took him to the hospital after calling me at work.

After going to the Emergency Room, Billy was admitted to the hospital with third degree burns to his legs. Though Mike and I are both employed, neither place of employment offers insurance benefits. The only insurance Billy had was a small accident policy we had purchased through school. So being one out of the many thousands of families in this country without major health insurance, there was not much they could do, other than to try and keep him as comfortable as possible.

Billy's legs were burned so badly that we were afraid that he would never walk again, or at the least be terribly crippled. We had no idea what to do, or where to go for help. A deep feeling of helplessness had set in, and all we could do was pray for a miracle.

On Saturday morning that prayer was answered when a special angel in the form of a Shriner named Pete Schneider, walked into Billy's hospital room and into our hearts. With tears in his eyes, Pete offered us the help we so desperately needed-all expenses paid, no strings attached. All we had to do was go to the nearest Shriners Burns Institute in Cincinnati, Ohio. This was all taken care of by the Shriners, and on Monday morning Billy and I were on our way. If there is Hell on Earth, it must be at a Children's Burn Center. Within minutes of arriving, I knew that as badly as Billy's legs were burned, it was nothing compared to some of the others. Tiny babies scalded in hot baths, children burned in house fires, and teenagers burned in flaming car accidents. Some were burned on 90 to 100 percent of their bodies, with some missing limbs, ears, nose's and hair. It was like being in the middle of a war zone. I had never known this kind of pain and despair before. Yet they offered us hope, because we saw miracles happen there every day.

The entire hospital staff is specially trained to work with burned children and is among the best this world has to offer. I have never seen such dedication anywhere. They not only work with the patient, but with the entire family, helping us cope, and constantly reassuring us that everything would be all right.

Billy had surgery the following Thursday and Friday. On Thursday, they scraped his legs of all the burned tissue, and on Friday the skin grafts were done. All the skin from his entire back, buttocks and both thighs were taken. The donor sites, where they took the new skin to cover his legs, are equal to second degree burns, because most of the nerve endings on his legs were dead.

He was on bed rest for seven days with a Morphine drip. There were also tubes, life soaker hoses, wrapped with bandages on his legs which had sterile water pumped into them every two hours for five days, to keep the new grafts moist. His bed was constantly soaked.

After five days, the bandages and tubes were removed. It was then time for me to learn the bath, bandages and therapy routine. Mike came on the following weekend, so that he could learn the routine too, as I couldn't do it alone. This task was so tedious, that the first few times it took us nearly three hours, including the bath. This had to be done twice a day along with special exercises to help limber up his legs.

Tiny pieces of Adaptec bandages covered with Bacitracin Ointment had to be cut like a jigsaw puzzle to cover the open spots where the grafts did not take. Then a cream had to be rubbed between all these tiny pieces of bandage to help keep the new grafts soft and pliable. All these also had to be removed before going into the bath to be scrubbed.

Mike and I never thought we would be able to do this. But when the doctor looks you in the eye and tells you that they have done all they can do, and the rest is up to you to see that your son walks normally again, you automatically do what you must do, no matter how much it hurts. After we returned home, some very special friends offered to help us with this job, when Mike had to be at work. They will always have a special place in our hearts.

My stepmother, Delores Voight, came from Florida, where she and my dad spend the winters for health reasons. She stayed with us the entire time we were in Cincinnati. I don't know how Billy and I would have made it without her support while we were there. She stayed in the Family Care Unit at the Hospital. There were accommodations for me to stay with Billy in his hospital room. There was also a special classroom where he was taken to school every day for an hour. Most of his schoolwork was done on a computer. Thanks to this and to a tutor that came to our house after coming home, Billy was able to go on to sixth grade with the rest of his class in the Fall.

On April 27th after nearly three weeks, Billy and I came home. Home had never looked so good. Even Alex, the family dog, who had quit eating in our absence was glad to see us.

Billy, and either Mike or I, would go to Cincinnati by plane for periodic check-ups. Approximately five weeks after the skin grafts, Billy received pressure garments. He would have to wear them for about a year to keep scarring to a minimum.

Billy's story touched the small community of Wisconsin Rapids. A trust fund in his name was set up at a local bank to help cover hospital costs that occurred before Billy was taken to the Shriners Hospital.

I left a big part of my heart at the Shriners Hospital for Children in Cincinnati, and my life will never be the same. It has been a very humbling experience. All of this has been paid for by the Shriners Organization, the only Hospitals in the world without a billing department. That alone is an awesome thought.

There are no words to express how grateful we are to the Shriners. They have to be one of the greatest Organizations in the entire world. To us, they not only gave Billy "The Gift" of his legs back, they also gave him his life back. Thanks to them he is a normal boy again.

Burns, unlike other medical problems, are caused by accidents. ALL accidents ARE preventable. Mike and I feel we are fully responsible for Billy's accident. If we had locked up the gas and if we hadn't left Billy alone in the yard even for a few minutes, if we would have better educated Billy against the dangers of gasoline, this is one accident that possibly never would have happened. For our lack of responsibility, Billy had to learn the hard way, and he will carry the scars for the rest of his life. We shudder to think of what the outcome would have been without the Shriners.

Jerry's love of fishing led him in 1972 to build a cabin near Iron River, Wisconsin to accommodate fishing the beautiful Brule River.





The Well-Worn Fez

A young man stood silently, looking down at a pair of wrinkled, age-spotted hands. They were crossed over one another, neatly laying on a white leathern apron. The apron, in turn, was affixed to the now lifeless body of its long-time owner, being shown at his visitation. The young man noted two large rings on the right hand of the body.

"Dad, what are those rings on Grandpa's hand?" he asked, turning to a middle-aged man on his right.

"I know they're Masonic rings," his father said. "The one is his Mason's ring, the one with the two V-shapes coming together. I don't know what the one with a sword is."

A third man, walking up to the casket to view the body, overheard the question.

"The ring on his ring finger is a Masonic ring. It is the square and compasses," he said. "The bigger ring on his middle finger is a Shriner's ring. The sword is part of the Shrine's symbol, along with those two tiger claws next to it.

"You may not have noticed the other ring on his left hand," the man continued. He pointed to a ribbed gold band next to a worn gold wedding band. "That's his 33rd Degree ring from the Scottish Rite Masons. Your grandfather was a great Mason. He did a lot of work for the Fraternity and the Community. I rode with him to the Chicago Hospital giving rides to patients many, many times"

The man pointed to a maroon felt hat sitting on the casket pillow next to the dead man's head. "That was probably his favorite Masonic thing," the man said. "It was his Fez as Past Potentate."

"It actually looks kind of shabby," the dead man's son said. "It's kind of dirty around the edges and all smoothed out."

The other man smiled. "It should be. He wore it a lot and wore it well. I see there's quite a line here, but I'd like to tell you both more about your father. I'll see you at the lunch after the funeral." He shook hands with the man and his son and moved on.

A long line of visitors passed by the casket and eight foam core boards with dozens of pictures and certificates displayed. There was a memorial service and a funeral. As the son and grandson watched, dozens of men, some wearing fezzes, some wearing funny white pillbox hats and others, no hats at all, walked up to the casket. Some deposited roses. Others deposited a small piece of an evergreen tree branch. They saluted the body by extending their hands over it and saying farewell.

After the funeral, the mourners convened in a dining room for a light meal. The dead man's son stood chatting with his friends and cousins. The grandson sat at one of the tables, sipping at a glass of water and nibbling on a piece of chocolate cake.

"Your grandpa really loved a good chocolate cake," the grandson heard, as the Mason who had spoken to him earlier settled into the chair next to him. "Actually, maybe he liked it too much," he said with a laugh.

"You must have known grandpa for a long time," the grandson said.

"About sixty years," he said. "We were initiated into Masonry at the same time. We did a lot of things together. He was one of best men and finest Masons I've ever known."

The young and the old man talked for half an hour, the older man recounting stories of the grandpa running a Lodge as Master, marching in parades as a Shrine clown, acting in degrees as a Scottish Rite Mason, and, driving to Chicago with children going to the Shrine Hospital.

"But most of all, what I loved about him was that he was the best friend you could ask for, and not just to me," the man said. "To anyone. If someone needed help, that was all he needed to hear. He was always there for his brothers, his neighbors, his community. For the hospital."

"I thought grandpa didn't have any brothers," the young man said.

"He didn't have any biological brothers," the man replied, "but he had hundreds of brothers, including me. The best kind of brothers, the ones who choose to be your brother even though they don't have to."

The young man's father walked over. "You two have really been chatting a lot," he said.

"There was a lot about grandpa I never knew," the young man said.

"I'm sure that's true," the father said. "Say," he said to the elderly man, as he reached in his pocket and retrieved a small brown paper envelope, "these rings of my Dad's...what should I do with them? And his Fez?"

"They're yours, son," the elderly man said. "Keep them to remember your father and the man he was."

"No one else can use them, then?" the son asked.

"Hold on to them," the elderly man said. "They belong in your hands."

The lunch crowd dissipated. The family packed up the foam core boards, jammed with dozens of pictures from the dead man's life. They went home, totally exhausted from the strain of the festivities. The son would go back to his work, the grandson, to the college he attended. The fez and rings wound up on a dresser in the son's guest room, next to the foam core boards of pictures.

A few weeks later, spring arrived, and with it, the grandson from college for spring break. He found himself home alone one afternoon and wandered in to the guest room. He picked up the foam core boards, one at a time, and sat on the bed to look closely at them.

He saw his grandfather, a young man, standing wearing a white apron, surrounded by other men. Handwriting on the edge of the picture said, "Raised to MM, May 21, 1963." Another board had a picture of his grandfather wearing a fez with no words on the brim. Handwriting on that picture read "Spring Ceremonial, May 8, 1964." There were pictures of grandpa as a clown; pictures of him in costumes; pictures in tuxedos. There were pictures showing grandpa in a bowling shirt, with several other men and women all holding bowling balls. And there were pictures of grandpa with kids the grandson did not recognize, kids in wheelchairs, with braces on their legs, using arm canes and crutches.

He heard the door open wider, and was startled into sitting up straight, as his father walked in to the guest room "Checking out grandpa's old pictures?" he asked his son.

"Yeah dad," the young man said. "He was really something, apparently. He did so much. What was it like?"

"I don't remember much of it," his father said. "What I remember was thinking that grandpa was always gone, always at some Masonic thing or another, but I really never paid much attention to what it was all about."

"Didn't grandpa tell you about it?" the young man asked.

"Well you know some of it is supposed to be secret," his father said, smiling. "But he did. He did try to tell me about it. He suggested several times that I should join without ever asking me to."

"Why didn't you join? This looks like it was fun."

"I don't really know, son," he said. "None of my friends joined anything when we got older. It wasn't our thing. Maybe I didn't want to be gone all the time, you know, miss what was going on with you kids."

"Did grandpa miss what was going on with you?"

The father thought for a minute. He shook his head. "No. Now that you ask me, I have to say, he didn't. He was at my school concerts. My softball games. My birthday parties. Maybe he left to go to some meeting after a game, but he was always there for me."

"It looks like he was always there for a lot of people," the son said.

"Yeah, he was, wasn't he?" his father answered. The two of them pored over the foam core boards for more than an hour, laughing at some of the silly costumes grandpa had worn, marveling at how sharp he looked in his tuxedo. Finally, they put the boards back and went to make dinner.

The son returned to college. The weeks flew by, finals ended the school year and he returned home for the summer. He had found a job in a garden center, watering and moving plants and otherwise helping during the busy season. A few weeks after he started, he was paged to the checkout. That usually meant he needed to help load something heavy. He walked in from the display yard, enjoying a brief blast of air conditioning. He approached the checkout and was surprised to find that the customer was his grandpa's Masonic buddy.

"Well, young man, what a pleasure!" he said, extending his hand. "How did your school year end up?" They chatted amiably as the older man finished paying for a cart load of plants and mulch. The young man pushed the cart outside and loaded the purchases into the old man's car. They talked a minute more, and then, the young man excused himself, citing the need to return to work. He turned away to walk back to the yard. He found himself stopping, turning back to the elderly gentleman.

"You want some help spreading that mulch and planting those flowers?" he asked the older man. "You looking for more work, young man?" was the response.

"No, I'm offering to help," he said. "I can come by your house after I get done at 3:30. You shouldn't be doing all that alone."

The older man arched his eyebrows. "Just like your grandpa," he said. "Sure, I'd love your help and your company. It's awfully quiet at my home since my wife passed away."

The young man drove over to the address given him by his grandfather's friend. Together, they unloaded the mulch, dug holes for the flowers and planted them. The young man carried the bags of mulch and opened them, so they could spread the mulch.

As they planted, the older man told the younger how his wife had always insisted on planting flowers in front of their house. They talked about his memories of her and of the young man's grandfather. The young man asked the elder why he had become a mason.

"When I was your age, it was a given that a young man who wanted to amount to something would join a service club," he said. "Whether it was Kiwanis or Elks or Moose, everyone did. I was lucky that I was able to join the Masons, which always was the best one to join. I had an uncle who signed my petition. They were picky about who could join back then," he said.

They worked on as the sun began setting, finishing the work about 6 pm. They shared some iced tea, and the young man indicated he needed to go home for dinner. The older man understood. "You want dessert young man?" asked one of the Masonic group as they sat in a small room off the main area of a restaurant. "Sure, some blueberry pie," the young man replied.

As the older man had stated, the group was almost all elderly, just a few middle aged men joining them. But the conversation was light, personal and intimate. The young man liked the complete comfort the men had with one another, and the positive way they talked. They had great lives, whether as salesmen, lawyers, realtors or managers.

"So maybe you might want to join this group and cut our median age in half," one of the men said to the young man. The group laughed, but another said, "That wouldn't be the worst thing you could do, you know."

The young man turned to his grandpa's friend. "Do you know why my father never joined?"

The elderly man nodded gently. "I think so. He and his friends though it was a different era. The Masons were old fashioned, traditional. Which is true. And it was true when I joined."

Another man interjected, pointing his finger at the young man for emphasis. "We were slow to change. But important things don't change. We didn't explain that to our sons.

"There comes a point in a young man's life when an older man has to say to him – 'It's your turn!" he continued, his voice rising in excitement. "The government won't do it all. It can't do it all. A lot of what needs to get done doesn't get done, cannot get done, without love. Without God.


