## **SPRING REFLECTIONS.**

Words have associations in our heads, sometimes positive, sometimes negative and sometimes neutral. What 'springs to mind' (no pun intended) when we hear the word 'spring'?

My first reaction is that the word is positive. One thinks of the season, when the darkness of winter gives way to the light, growth and hope of spring. Perhaps the most well-known of all poems about spring is Willam Wordsworth's 'I wandered lonely as a cloud.'

Focussing on different meanings, there are mountain springs, which can grow into streams, rivers and even feed oceans. This reminds me of the concept behind the ancient proverb, 'From little acorns mighty oak trees grow'.

Alluding to another meaning of the word 'spring', there are the springs, for example, in our sofas. They help us to sit more comfortably when relaxing. There are springs that can help propel us upwards when we need to achieve a greater height. Springboards are used by divers, such as Tom Daley, who achieve remarkable feats as they leap into the air.

So what are the negative aspects of the word 'spring'? These can be divided into two categories, the first being the uses of the word 'spring' already alluded to, and the second being other meanings.

In the first category we have reference to the word 'spring' as a source of water. Consulate cigarettes, we were told in 1966, were 'as cool as a mountain stream'.
