Covertry Beautification

It's spring! The time you get this newsletter, so many beautiful flowers will be in full bloom: Azaleas, Daffodils, Forsythia, and native Dogwood trees will all make an appearance. The Beautification Committee (BC) has been busy with numerous projects. The Coventry Boulevard entrance sign was finally reinstalled on our beautiful stone monument. New LED light fixtures are featured along with transplanted flowers and shrubs. This season, the BC plans on adding more seasonal color including shade loving Hosta (Plantain Lily), Helleborus (Lenten Rose) and Impatience to areas where a lawn is difficult to grow. A new Azalea bed was installed along the walking path on Owen Davis Boulevard which enhances the park bench and hardscaping. What's next on the BC list? More clean up of overgrown and declining trees. The BC is working with a certified arborist as work will be done in phases. We welcome two new members to the BC, Goioa (pronounced Joya) and Diane. If you would like to help improve our neighborhoods, consider simply picking up trash or gather falling limbs on your next walk. Critter Corner Cormorants By resident Kelly Myers



Cormorants

Cormorants are native to North America and the double crested cormorant is common along the Chesapeake Bay, but they also live along the banks of rivers and lakes. With their matt black feathers and gangly appearance, they tend to look pre-historic. Often, they can be seen perched on rocks, logs, piers, and pilings with wings out drying their feathers, regulating their body temperature, and napping. A cormorant's feathers are not as waterproof as other waterfowl. They lack the preen oil that waterproofs the feathers and thus the feathers become waterlogged. Notably, they have teal eyes and mouths that are bright blue on the inside. In terms of size, they average 32 inches in length and their wingspan averages 52 inches. These birds roost in evergreens or deciduous trees. The double crested cormorants can dive up to 25 feet under water. There are other species of this bird that can dive up to 150 feet. Dense bones and solid bodies contribute to their expert diving abilities. A cormorant will eat up to a pound of fish each day.

The male chooses a nest site and then works to attract a female. The couple work on building the nest together. The male brings the nest materials while the female builds it. The sticks used are finger-sized and mixed with seaweed, flotsam and lined with grass. These birds are not above stealing nest materials from other nests that are not being guarded. Nests average between 1.5 and 3 feet in diameter. Females lay between 1 and 7 pale blue eggs and typically two broods in a season. It takes 25 to 28 days for the egg(s) to hatch and then another 21 to 28 days for the birds to mature.

The population of these birds in the 1800's and early 1900's declined. Due to hunting and persecution, they were often shot. They continued to decline in the mid-1900's for Currently the global population is reasons attributed to the use of pesticides. approximately 630,000 and is a low conservation concern.

Children are more susceptible to traffic accidents and injuries when there is no adult supervision. In addition to never allowing your children to play near roadways unaccompanied, you may lessen risk by teaching them to: look right, then teft, then right again before crossing the road, and only cross the road if they are holding the hand of an adult or older kid.




