## Covertry Beautification

So, how's your Summer going? I know it just started. Hot, cool, dry, rainy? Actually, I was referring to your lawn.

Most lawns in our area are Tall Fescue seed that is sown in the previous Fall. It's considered a cool season grass that generally struggles with hot and humid (temperatures in the upper 80's and 90's) conditions that will soon be upon us. How can you, the Homeowner, help?

- 1. Mow, with a sharpened blade at 4 inches. Like the name implies, Tall Fescue. This helps shade itself, and reduces weed seed from germinating.
- 2. Use a recycling mower. Cutting your grass one-third off each mowing helps feed nitrogen back in the soil. It also helps reduce grass clippings from going to our local landfills. Clippings do not build up if cutting at this height.
- 3. Water one inch per week. That's not a daily 10-15 minute daily waste of water but a once or twice deeper watering. Grass roots grow towards the precipitation. Of course, if Mother Nature helps out like more recently, turn off sprinklers.

Your lawn will thank you.

## Critter Corner Eastern Gray Squirrel






The Eastern gray squirrel, we see them all the time and usually don't give much thought to them. Their usual color is gray, but not solid, it's white with gray tips. Their chest and belly are white. However, it is possible to see an all-white or all black squirrel. If you see an all-white or all-black squirrel in North America, it's probably a gray squirrel, or a fox squirrel in disguise. Some places are more prone to white squirrels, like Brevard, North Carolina, where as many as one in three squirrels have white fur. The daily movement is mostly within about 200 yards, unless the area gets to be overpopulated, then some will relocate. Sounds a bit like us humans. They do not hibernate but cold, rain, snowstorm and especially high winds cause this species to remain in the den for several days.



Squirrels reproduce February, May, August, and October. Squirrels are capable of giving birth as young as 6 months old. The potential longevity in the wild is 6 years. Did you know more than 278 species and 51 genera are living and thriving everywhere from tropical rainforests to farms, suburbs, and big cities; even in the Arctic tundra! Squirrels are native to every continent except Australia and Antarctica. The earth is home to a variety of tree squirrels, flying squirrels as well as ground-dwelling species like chipmunks, prairie dogs, and marmots. Squirrels are typically loners, but they are sometimes seen being social. A group of squirrels is called a "scurry" or "dray." In the 1850s, gray squirrels in urban city parks, like New York's Central Park were rare. Tree squirrels had been nearly eliminated from many U.S. cities by the mid-19th century. Cities responded by adding more parks and trees—and by adding squirrels. Now we have an abundance of squirrels. This is another case of humans inserting themselves into the ecosystem and disrupting the normal cycle of the food chain. It is important to recognize that squirrels are an important food source within the ecosystem for snakes, coyotes, hawks, and owls.





### **Eastern Gray Squirrel Continued...**




If you find squirrels are in your attic during their mating season, it's possible that babies are present. If mother squirrels are sealed out of an attic with their babies inside, they will cause an extreme amount of destruction to enter again. Find a removal service that will remove humanely and relocate if possible. If you are willing, consider waiting until the young are old enough to leave on their own; this is typically when they are about 8-10 weeks old. When in the road, or near the side of the road, give them a brake, honk the horn so you don't hit them. They escape predators by darting in a zig zag pattern. This explains why they don't always get out of the way of your car like you expect they will. Slowing down is an important action for all animals, even birds. Be humane.



Squirrels are primarily herbivorous but do eat insects, eggs and young birds. They will move when the nut supply is exhausted. These industrious little neighbors can bury up to 10,000 nuts in a season, but usually only recover a quarter. This is vital to deciduous tree growth. To protect their main food source, they are known to dig fake holes to fool onlookers and throw off thieves. This involves a squirrel digging a hole and covering it up again but not depositing a nut. A classic bait-and-switch; also known as "deceptive caching." Squirrels will share their food when there's enough to go around.

Squirrels communicate using complex systems of high-frequency chirps and tail movements. Sound is used to intimidate rivals in their territory, to alert neighbors to predators in the area, to scold a predator so it will be inclined to leave, to initiate mating, and, in the case of offspring, to ask for food.

We're lucky to have these clever, charismatic creatures living among us, but like most wild animals, the best way to appreciate squirrels is to watch them, not interact with them. Feeding any wildlife is generally a bad idea since it portrays people as a food source and could discourage natural foragin
