Guiding questions for learners to provide feedback to clinical teachers – Reflective Exercise Component of the Fundamental Teaching Certificate Program

Guiding Questions:

General comments and specific examples are encouraged and welcomed. Please do not feel limited to these questions or themes.

Question 1: What does your clinical teacher do that is particularly effective for you as a learner?

Question 2: Does your clinical teacher allow you an appropriate amount of autonomy and independence while still providing support when needed?

Question 3: What does your clinical teacher do that you would like to see other teachers do as well?

Question 4: When there has been a medical error or adverse outcome do you feel supported by your teacher? Does it feel like you have the opportunity to debrief and learn from the situation?

Question 5: Does your clinical teacher model professionalism? What does this look like for you?

Question 6: Do you feel like you get effective feedback from your teacher? What makes it useful?

Question 7: If you were going to have your supervisor/teacher do something differently what would that be?
