I was supposed to talk about Kyana membership this month but to keep my article from taking up too much space I'm going to have to put it off until next month. But I will say that each year it gets more and more difficult to fill all the time slots at the swap meet. Thanks to all the members that work multiple shifts. It's your efforts that help make the Kyana Swap Meet engine run smooth.

Spring is right around the corner and that means driving our cars. Members have expressed the desire for more car driving tours so get the old buggy ready roll because that's what we are focusing on again this year.

MY 1941 DODGE... LIKE THE ONE DAD DROVE(BUT NICER)

My first remembrance of a car was my dad's 41 Dodge four door sedan. It was a very used car when he got it sometime in the early fifties. Being a very small person at the time I mostly remember the lower half of the car and sharing the seats inside the car with my brothers and sister. I do remember the heater hanging under the dash from the front seat. Once during the winter I put my foot near the little door that was opened that let the heat out. I didn't know the fan would cut a hole in the toe of my boot. (The screen was missing from the hole in the heater.)



Our favorite past time in the back seat was watching the road pass under the rust holes in the floor. Dad used old license plates, wood or anything else to cover those holes but they seemed to always grow larger. If we were going on a dirt road (which was often in those days) dust would blow up into the car. We were careful where we stood on that floor.

A few years later he traded the 41 for a 48 Dodge two door sedan. It was a very nice car, gray with a full unrusted floor. The rear end had the nicest hum while we went down the road. It never changed or got louder so that's the way it was. I went to sleep many evenings in that back seat on the way home from a long day out some where. A few years later Dad got a newer 52 Dodge Medowbrook four door. He kept the 48 to sell on his own so it sat next to the garage for a week or two. When I got home from school I would change clothes and go out and play in that car. I drove it many miles sitting there shifting the gears and clutch and brakes behind that big steering wheel.

Many decades later I went to a car show in the mountains of North Carolina. There I saw a 41 Dodge coupe. It brought back memories of those days gone by. The next summer I was in the same mountains and at another show and there was a 41 Dodge coupe for sale. The man even let me drive it around the field. As I never thought about having an old car I enjoyed the day and moved on. But the next summer we went to the same show and the 41 was there again and still for sale. The man remembered me and let me drive it again. As we talked my wife said" you should get this car" . I got the man's address and agreed to go look at it at his place.

The car was in good shape with new paint and a new interior from top to bottom. I crawled under it from front to back. It had no rust or bad things under all that dirt. It had no work done under it and still had a thick layer of grease and old oil everywhere. The man asked "what are you going to do with it?" I said drive it and enjoy it. After more talking he asked if I would put a V8 in it. I said why would I do that. Well we closed the deal. The following week a friend and I went down there and picked it up and brought it to it's new home in LaGrange. That was in the fall of 1996.

After driving two years, a seven year restoration, it's been on the road over twelve years. I still drive it as much as I can. We did a tour at the end of last summer of 119 miles with the original engine still in it. Yes' I did a lot of work for seven years, but it is in original condition right down to 6 volts and still running points. That's the way it was back then and that is the way it's going to be now.

Salvage Yard Tour

Mark your calendar for March 30 when the salvage yard tour returns to the KYANA activity list. This year we will make a return visit to a site north of West Fork, Indiana that we visited many years ago. The yard has expanded since our last visit, adding more vintage cars and trucks to their already large inventory. Rob Johnson and I made a scouting run in late January and confirmed that this yard should keep most KYANA members busy for at least a couple hours. The yard operator is very accommodating and is looking forward to our visit in late March.

Most salvage yards in early spring can be very muddy, messy places, and this yard is no exception. Please plan accordingly, dress in old clothes, and wear boots or other footwear you do not mind getting muddy and dirty. You may want to bring a change of shoes to wear on the return trip. If you plan to remove some needed parts, please bring your own tools. There is limited parking at the yard itself so it would help to keep the cars in the caravan to a minimum. Please carpool with your fellow Club members if possible and leave your car in one of the parking lots close to our morning meeting location.

After we have worked up an appetite at the salvage yard, we will venture southeast a short distance to dine at The Overlook Restaurant in Leavenworth, IN. KYANA has eaten as a group at The Overlook before, and like then, we will dine as a group in one of their private rooms. We will be served a buffet style meal of fried chicken, roast beef with gravy, green beans, mashed potatoes with white gravy, baby carrots, two flavors of cobbler for dessert, and coffee, iced tea, or water.

On Saturday morning, March 30, we will meet at 8:45 a.m. at the McDonalds restaurant located at Georgetown exit 118 of I-64 west in southern Indiana. McDonalds is located just north of I-64 at 1051 N Luther Rd, Georgetown, IN 47122. There is adequate parking in the McDonalds lot as well as additional parking at the grocery store across the street. Again, please consider carpooling with a fellow member or two and leave your vehicle in Georgetown.

We will depart McDonalds at 9:15 a.m. so plan to arrive a little early if you wish to eat breakfast at McDonalds. Breakfast will be on your own. We will provide detailed directions to the salvage yard before departing the McDonalds.

If you plan to dine with the KYANA group, cost per KYANA member is only \$8.00. Cost for non-members is \$18.75 including water, iced tea, or coffee. There is no cost to attend if you decide not to eat with the group, however, if you plan to attend this tour and will not be eating with the group and therefore not sending a check, please extend the courtesy of notifying me that you plan to attend. This will allow me to know how many members and guests to

expect at the salvage yard.

Please note: KYANA's salvage yard tours take place rain or shine! There is no rain date, and since we must commit to The Overlook on March 28, NO REFUNDS will be granted if your plans change after March 27. Thanks for your cooperation and understanding.






