MAKING A DIFFERENCE...One Child at a Time



"Community Bike Works is about KIDS, not bikes," is an often-heard refrain at Community Bike Works. We use bikes and bike mechanics as a hook to engage youth and, once engaged, influence their behavior and their outlook on school and life. Here are some of their stories:

We help students build confidence. M, 9, lacked personal confidence and was frequently picked on by other students. The small nature of Earn a Bike classes allowed M to enjoy the program while being free from bullying. He also received constant encouragement and praise for the things he did well. One day he said excitedly, "I am going to be so good next time that you are going to be amazed." Every class after that, M continued to express his desire to be

ject in Indianapolis that used bicycles to build self esteem and turn inner city kids away

from drugs. Two weeks later I received a letter at my bike shop from an 81 year old woman. She included a copy of the article and added "wouldn't it be neat if Allentown had such a program." I felt the message was clear.

I spent the next two months developing a business plan. In late August, Gail McMakin, a customer at my bike shop, and I met with Bill Seaman, Executive

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JUST FIXIN': Program Highlights 2012-2013

Earn a Bike

In our flagship Earn a Bike program, students between the ages of 9 and 17 who complete a 12-week bike mechanics and safety class earn their refurbished bike and a new helmet.

Upon joining the program, students sign a contract that outlines their commitments. They are then assigned to a group that includes a maximum of four youth and a minimum of two adults. While students learn mechanics, they also use their manuals and journals to work on reading and writing.

At the same time, kids learn work ethic skills by being required to show up for class on time, working at a task until it is completed, and seeing the satisfaction of turning a broken bike into one that they can ride.

Earn a Bike classes are held at our Madison Street facility, at schools in the Allentown and Bethlehem districts, and at the KidsPeace Orefield campus. We continued this year to expand our partnerships to better serve youth. The first Earn a Bike class at Lincoln Elementary in Bethlehem graduated this spring. And in an emerging partnership with Allentown nonprofit Casa Guadalupe, kids in Casa's afterschool program participated in Earn a Bike classes at Bike Works.

CONTINUING ENGAGEMENT

Once a student is engaged, the connection to Community Bike Works can last for years, with students returning to participate in a range of programs. In 2012-13, 45% of students who attended classes onsite participated in additional activities.

Young people earn CBW bucks for hours spent with mentors. This year, kids earned 647 items, including bike parts, snacks, school supplies, and board games.

Afternoon Drop-In
In our afternoon Drop-in

program, students have the opportunity to work on their bikes or to participate in group activities designed to engage and educate. Highlights from the program year included a trip to Last Chance Ranch to meet rescued animals, a liquid nitrogen demonstration by Air Products employees, and a magic show and workshop by magician Phil La Porta.

Reading & Homework

Kids have the opportunity to be teamed with a tutor from Cedar Crest College's America Reads program to work on their reading skills. Two dozen students participated regularly. For elementary and middle school students for whom standardized reading scores were available, 56% improved.

Youth Volunteer & Apprentice

After graduating from Earn a Bike, students may join the youth volunteer program, which allows them to serve as peer instructors and to participate in bimonthly leadership workshops. Eighteen young people served as youth volunteers this year.

The capstone of the Bike Works experience is the Youth Apprentice program, in which students complete additional training and then receive their first paying job as a CBW instructor. This year, two students served as youth apprentices.

Our Students

77% are male; 23% are female

56% are Hispanic; 20% are black/ African-American; 22% are white

The median age of students is 12. Approximately 40% are in elementary school; 32% in middle school; and 28% in high school

89% live in families at or below half of the area's median income

65% live in female-headed households

48% heard about us from a teacher or counselor; 44% through word of mouth

The success of our programs is due to a low youth-to-adult ratio that allows for the development of meaningful mentoring relationships between youth and adults. These relationships are possible only because of the dedication of our team of volunteers. In 2012-2013, adult volunteers served more than 2,200 hours, with a value of more than \$50,000.

In addition to mentoring youth, volunteers organized Community Bike Works' third Family Fun Fest, held at the Valley Preferred Cycling Center in September, which raised \$7,000 for programs. Eight volunteers participated in an instructor training course in January, and, with staff, four volunteers became certified in first aid and adult CPR as part of an onsite Red Cross training.

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"even better" than he was the last class. He even studied bike parts at home in order to impress his instructor.

We help students learn practical skills.

L, 16, and C, 14, participated in an onsite Earn a Bike session. English is a second language for both students, and both were hesitant to read from their EAB manuals during the initial classes. After continued assistance and encouragement, L and C became much more

comfortable reading aloud in front of others. Both students also increased their understanding of English as the hands-on teaching provided practical reinforcement for the words and concepts they were exposed to in the instruction manuals.

We help students give back. N, 10, was excited about earning her bike and her new mechanical skills. She felt proud when she used what she learned to help fix her grandmother's bike.

We help students grow as leaders. B,

13, wrote about her experiences as a youth volunteer. "As a youth volunteer, I've learned what the staff expects of the volunteers. I help people to know what they need to make them a good leader.

"A good leader is someone people can rely on. Volunteers are responsible for helping kids make the right choices and being a good role model."

Director of the Lehigh County Conference of Churches to discuss a partnership. Although Bill was enthusiastic, he said it would take his board six to nine months to approve us. On September 13, 1994, after presenting the business plan, the Conference of Churches board voted to take us under their wing. The message and the mission were reaffirmed.

The fall and winter were used to create the program materials, recruit a steering committee, find and equip a site, and train volunteers. We opened our doors at 639 Turner Street to the first Earn a bike classes in June 1995.
