## LEARNING LIFE LESSONS...through bicycles



At Community Bike Works, we teach life lessons through bicycles. We use classes in bike mechanics as a hook to engage youth and, once engaged, influence their behavior and their outlook on school and life. In our most recent program year, we continued to strengthen our flagship Earn a Bike program while finding new ways for students to connect with mentors and learn life skills.

#### Earn a Bike

In our flagship Earn a Bike program, students ages 9 to 17 complete a 12-week bike mechanics course. Through working on their bikes, students learn work skills by arriving for class on time, following manuals and writing in their journals, working as a team, and seeing the satisfaction of turning a broken bike into one they can ride. In the end, students earn their refurbished bike and a new helmet.

Angel, who completed the Earn a Bike program at Central Elementary, was asked whether he found the program worthwhile. "Yes," he answered, "because at the beginning you learn about the bike, how to fix it. It takes a long time to learn about the bike but it's worth it because at the end you get to

a freshman at Temple University.

fter moving to Allentown as a young boy, Josh –whose family had recently come from New York– hung around the neighborhood for several months before working up the courage to let staff know he wanted to join Bike Works. Once he arrived as an 11 year old, however, Josh stayed earning his bike and becoming a youth volunteer and then a paid apprentice. Josh gained skills and confidence along the way, while also making a positive difference in the lives of dozens of younger students.

Josh graduated from Allen High School this spring, and he is now

For 2013-14, we continued to hold Earn a Bike classes at our Allentown bike shop, in Allentown and Bethlehem schools, and at KidsPeace. This spring, to provide more opportunities for students to connect, we offered a **Saturday Earn a Bike** class.

We also drew explicit connections between skills students are learning and future job skills. A spring class at Lincoln Elementary was sponsored by Just Born, Inc. As part of the **My Bike is Just Born** class, Just Born employees described their work and how it relates to skills students learn in Earn a Bike.

#### Earn a Book

In our reading & homework program, students are paired with tutors from Cedar Crest College to build skills and develop an enthusiasm for reading. Twenty students participated regularly in each of the fall and spring semesters. "Tutors can help you in academic skills, and at the end, you can get a book," says Erick, 11.

This year, we renamed the program **Earn a Book** to create synergy with Earn a Bike. Now, students who spend 18 hours with a tutor earn a **trip to a bookstore**, where they choose books for their home libraries.

#### Drop-In

In afterschool and summer Drop-in, students work on bikes, go for rides, or participate in engaging group activities. Highlights included a bike ride in Easton, visits from the Da Vinci Science Center, sessions with musician Dave Fry, and weekly cooking lessons.



After graduating from Earn a Bike, students may join the youth volunteer program and serve as peer instructors. The capstone of the Bike Works experience is Youth Apprentice, in which students receive their first paying job as an Earn a Bike instructor.

"I love volunteering," Jose said. "I get to serve people. I get trusted with stuff. It's awesome."

This year, staff and two youth leaders headed to New York City for Youth Bike Summit. Kyle and Breeanna spent the day in workshops that included telling their stories through videos and zines.



#### **Our Programs\***

287 students in Earn a Bike classes; 76% graduated.

More than 80 students attended Drop-in and Earn a Book each semester. 12 students served as youth volunteers.

Students made 4,770 visits to Bike Works and spent more than 9,500 hours with mentors.

#### hat an exciting year! In the first year with a new executive director, the Bike Works board committed to a strategic plan that calls for retaining the strength of our programs while focusing on increasing opportunities for student engagement. The plan's top two goals are:

- Ensure our programs remain effective and youth have the tools they need to succeed.
- 2. Increase our engagement with youth. Provide opportunities for deeper connections to mentors and more meaningful learning experiences.

I am happy to report significant accomplishments in both areas. Based on student

feedback and staff evaluation, we implemented a number of changes:

- We developed and instituted Pumped Up!, an organizational-wide system of expectations and consequences to help promote positive behavior.
- We revised our Reading & Homework program to create Earn a Book, creating synergy with Earn a Bike while helping students build a home library.
- We developed Food for Fuel, in which students have access to fresh fruit every day upon their arrival after school, and a volunteer helps students prepare healthy snacks.

## **GEARING UP FOR THE FUTURE: YOUTH LEADERSHIP**

More than 200 guests joined Community Bike Works at the IronPigs' Coca-Cola Park in March for **Gearing Up for the Future.** We honored retiring founder Stefan Goslawski and celebrated our youth leaders.

At stations around the room portraying a student's journey through Bike Works, guests saw students' work and spoke with them about their experiences. In a brief program, current and former students described, in tribute to Stefan, what Bike Works means to them. In his speech, Youth Apprentice Kyle, 17, summed up the evening's sentiment: "Community Bike Works is more than learning how bikes work. It's learning how life works."

The 18 students who attended listed the highlights of the evening as meeting Mayor Ed Pawlowski and other community leaders and, of course, the food. A few days after *Gearing Up*, Xavier, 11, told staff that he'd "like to rewind back to the gala. It was really fun and the food was delicious."

The benefits to the students will extend past the evening. Thanks to our sponsors and supporters, Gearing Up raised a net \$38,000, which will be used to expand our youth leadership programming.

Since the gala, we have been able to hire an additional Youth Apprentice to join Kyle. We have also developed curriculum for a new youth leadership program that will debut this fall. Participating students will explore what leadership means, connect with local leaders, and develop a project that allows them to give back to Bike Works and their community.


