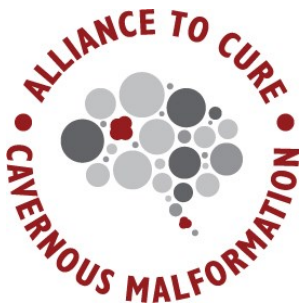
Guided Historic House Tour—Saturday, March 2, 11am

Highlighting Cerebral Cavernous Malformation (CCM)—

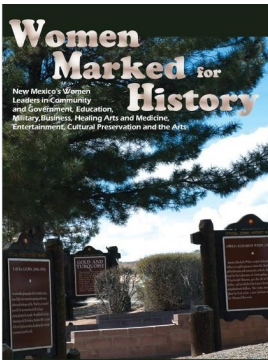
Friday, March 8, 2024, 4-6pm

The Pajarito Mesa area has been home to many of the descendants of Josefa Baca, Barbara Duran y Chavez and Juliana Gutierrez Hubbell. Three women that span over 200 years. These women were land grantees, heiresses, merchants, mothers and grandmothers, living in an often unforgiving frontier, frequently alone managing business and family affairs. Henrietta Martinez Christmas, a native New Mexican is a well-known genealogical and historical researcher and author of several books which relate to New Mexico's small towns and history.
