Speaker Event: Francisco Uviña Discussing & House Tour on the Gutiérrez-Hubbell House Rehabilitation of the early 2000—Saturday, May 4, 11am

Francisco Uviña, Assistant Professor at UNM's School of Architecture and Planning will discuss some of the extensive rehabilitation work which took place at the Gutiérrez-Hubbell House shortly after Bernalillo County acquired the property in 2000. In 2006, Cornerstones Community Partnerships, a non-for-profit organization dedicated to preserving the architectural heritage of New Mexico was brought in to start the rehabilitation of the house and Francisco was the *Technical Manager* for Cornerstones on the project. Francisco has extensive knowledge of the rehabilitation effort and some of the fascinating history uncovered in the process.



Speaker Event: John M. Taylor The Civil War in New Mexico: Valverde and Glorieta Pass & the Impact the War had on the West—Saturday, May 11, 11am

John has authored and co-authored numerous books, including New Mexico: Bloody Valverde: A Civil War Battle on the Rio Grande, February 21, 1862 and The Battle of Glorieta Pass: A Gettysburg in the West, March 26-28, 1862. John will discuss not only the history of the Civil War battles but the war's long-term impact on the West.
