


President's Page: While speaking with Sue Lisk, I mentioned that I was interested in writing a piece about Union Center hoping to get some information from her to use. She laughed and responded by suggesting that I look at what Shirley Long Woodward had collected. Sue provided me with three over flow-


ing "scrapbooks" filled with information, photographs, news articles and notes that Shirley Woodward had amassed on the history of Union Center. These volumes certainly made my job easy and it was then that I realized that so much of what I write about in this newsletter really came from Shirley Woodward and others. In science we use a quote attributed to Isaac Newton "If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of giants." Mrs. Woodward is this giant that enables me to "see". She has been working her entire life studying the history of our region. She was the Town of Maine Historian from 1960 to 1995. "She also served as Broome County Historian from 1971 to 1978. Her records are contained on 150,00 index cards housed at the Broome County Library" (Press and Sun Bulletin Article) She is the author of "A Short History of Maine New York, 125th Anniversary Celebration 1973" and even though she has moved to Sun City Arizona, she still strongly believes in the NVHS and supports us totally. Shirley worked in many other capacities including leadership roles in the Southern Tier Genealogical Society. Perhaps it is her heritage or her DNA that makes Shirley a great historian. Shirley Cayuga Long Woodward's father was County historian for 25 vears (1972 Tempo Apr19th), and the historical lineage of her husband Gordon H. Woodward, who was a member of Sons of the American Revolution and Mayflower Descendants, might also have influenced her scholarly approach to history. Gordon Woodward's obit: stated; "He met Shirley Anne Long, of Auburn, NY, at Cornell University in 1947, and they married in 1949. They were married for 64 years. Shirley Long attended Cornell University where she met Gordon Woodward of Union Center.

Sue Lisk keeps in touch with Shirley and as our curator she totally understands the legacy Shirley has left behind in our region. I see that Shirley has a Facebook page so perhaps if you wish you can friend her. Thank you so much Shirley...Phil Childs

THE WILD WILD EAST: Our Brush with History!

Father: William Alonzo Hickok

Mother: Polly Butler

Married 6/23/1829 in Grand Isle Co, VT They had seven children

Child 1;Oliver Otis Hickok Child 2:Lorenzo B. Hickok

B: 5/1/1830 in Union, Broome County, NY probably died as an infant

since Child 3 was given that same name

Child 3:Lorenzo Butler Hickok B: 11/23/1832 in Union, Broome County, NY

Child 4: James Butler Hickok B: 5/27/1837 in Homer (Troy Grove), IL

Killed 8/2/1876 in Deadwood, Dakota Territory He was buried there

He was known as legendary **<u>Wild Bill Hickok</u>**

After marrying in Vermont, William and Polly travelled to Union, NY (Town of Union) They most likely lived near Maine, NY

At that time the **Town of Union** was larger and included the area **around Maine**. While living there they had two children

1) Oliver Otis was born 1830

2) Lorenzo Butler was born in 1832.

In 1834 the couple and their two infant sons travelled from Union, Broome County, NY in a wagon drawn by ox-team, carrying what worldly goods their wagon would hold

They settled in Homer (now called Troy Grove), IL. On 5/27/1837 they had their 4^{th} child, James Butler Hickok

Wild Bill was killed by Jack McCall in Deadwood, Dakota Territory (now SD) while playing poker in Nuttal & Mann's Saloon.

When shot, he held in his poker hand a pair of aces and a pair of eights, all black. Forever since that hand has been known as "dead man's hand".





Halfway between Maine and Union is the cross road hamlet of **Union Center**. In the last census it was listed as having a population of 165 people with a total of 80 households. It would be difficult to imagine that in the 1800's it was a thriving community. Two churches, two large general stores, two saw mills, a rake factory, blacksmiths, two school house, a carriage maker, a cheese factory, creamery and along with a grange gave an indication of how prosperous this community was!. Driving through it today gives little indication of its former glories. The original settlers choose this location for its; old growth forests, abundant game, and a stream which one could harness its power to run saw and grist mills. At one time over seven saw mills were found along the Nanticoke and its lumber was rafted down its waters to the Susquehanna River and then south, providing wood for a growing cities along the east coast. Farms occupied the hills and valleys after the trees were harvested. Creameries supplied milk and butter to surrounding towns. Poultry was a large business and in Union Center the Woodward Poultry and Egg business, since 1921, was sold in 1982 to V.C. McGregor's & Sons of Maine, NY. Road names reflect the original families who settled here and if you look many of the early homes are still around. Check out Sue Lisk's and Ann Page Lewis' book for more about Union Center. PC



View looking North on current Route 26. Todays road still follows the same path. Lewis Brougham's store on right side (west) with Pitkin's store on the right side of the road. The road to the right crosses Nanticoke creek via a bridge. Circa 1906.



S. Pitkin and Son Store was the location of the Post Office in Union Center. Its location was at Pitkin's store if a Democrat were president. If it was a Republican president the post office was found across the street at Brougham's store.

C.L. Pitkin & Son store around 1906. It was destroyed by fire in 1931. It was located at the corner of Route 26 and Nanticoke Drive (east side of the road. Today you will find Doug's Automotive Service (1842 Union Center Maine Hwy), Across the street was Lewis Brougham's store which burned in 1938.



The Carman Mill (Old Red Mill) was torn down in 1939. It was situated at the junction of Nanticoke Creek and Crocker Creek, near the current Weber Road. The last owner was Wayne Woodward. It was originally built by Daniel and Nathan Howard in 1810 and rebuilt by T.W. Carman in 1856.



Lewis Brougham 1839-1928 built this home next door to his store and lived there with his second wife, Georgia (1859—1939). Its current address is 1859 Union Center Highway. His first wife was Hattie (1844– 1881). Twenty six Brougham family members are buried in Nanticoke the Valley Cemetery.

Union Center Congregational Church, photo below, taken in 1908, a recent photo is to the right. The church was built in 1841 and it sits next to the Nanticoke Valley Cemetery (1,150 interments). Many of the "original" families are buried here. Check <u>http: findagrave.com</u>. Its current address is 1921 Union Center Highway and it is no longer a church.





In the spring of 1896 the Union Center School was destroyed by fire. Two years later this new took school its place. The two original schools were the Brougham and Bradley Creek School The Bradley Creek School is now a private home.

This is a 1962 photo of Shirley & Gordon Woodward's home. The *Woodward Poultry and Egg* business was two houses north. The house was built ca. 1825/30. As you drive on Route 26 check out this home at 2016 Union Center Hgwy. Today Union Center is found in both the Town of Union and the Town of Maine. It stretches a little over a mile on NYS Route 26.
