Greetings Everyone,

I am pleased to announce that the Nanticoke Valley Historical Society has assumed ownership of the J Ralph Ingalls School on Church Street from the Michael McKilligan Estate. Mike was generous to us, and we are working to fulfill Mike's vision of turning the school into a vibrant and community serving property. To make it easier to achieve this vision, we have created a new 501c3 charitable corporation (separate from the Nanticoke Valley Historical Society) to facilitate the increased activities and responsibilities that accompany such a project. The new organization is called the J



RALPH INGALLS PRESERVATION SOCIETY.

In the near future, we will be looking to establish an Executive Board and Trustees to guide this organization. We hope many of you will be involved or volunteer to serve. We will be asking for volunteers. In the meantime, an ambitious group of volunteers have made great progress in getting the building ready for a series of next steps that will allow the public to come into the school for some upcoming sales or clean-up activities. The building needs a lot of work, so we will need support.

In addition to the J. Ralph Project, Kerin Flannery and Bill Austin have led an ever-growing team of volunteers who have stabilized the Mill foundation and updated the electric service. They have put electric service behind the one room schoolhouse (for future activities) and have started renovations for a handicapped accessible bathroom and improved the lighting and storage functionality throughout the museum. The teams have also cleared out the Norton Wagon Works barns and safely relocated the contents that were inside so we can begin renovations there.

Joanne Weir, Lynn Ross and Jim Tokos are doing an unbelievable job organizing the Memorial Day Weekend activities planned for the Town of Maine's 175th Birthday celebration, or it is fondly known as, the *Demisemiseptcentennial* Celebration of Maine, NY. My parents were talking about moving closer to town as the commute was hard especially in winters. Plus time away from home was a consideration also. But my gramma grew the best gardens. Huge was an understatement. Meticulous kept and weed free. As a child growing up in Ukraine her job was to pick potatoes all day long for the boss. Her wage were a few coins which she sewed in the hem of her apron for safe keeping. So one morning we headed down to the lower field where she grew potatoes, I'm not sure if she was hilling the plants or plowing the plot to grow. But I distinctly remember with the turn of the spade this red item glistened in the morning sun. I picked it up and stared in amazement at my new found treasure, wondering how it got there. Only to be told later it probably was a remnant of some slag glass. Nevertheless it was a treasure to me. So as the years passed with the decades, I've kept this treasure with me! It's been my constant companion and a sweet reminder of the many people I've had loved in my life, to have to love but for a



season. My gramma lived a long life but when she died, I felt the first real sting of death from losing someone very close to me. With many more to follow, that love is now safely tucked away in my heart with the promise of being with them when I will fly away. Please be gentle with one another, may your days be filled with the genuine love than only comes from above. As you ponder the purpose of life here on earth, always remember what is the greatest of these! LOVE

It's funny how time passes so quickly here in the Nanticoke valley. I feel like I just met Anita Shipway but it really was in 1992. To meet the needs of a number of schools in our area we started to offer school tours. Local children would come to the museum to learn how people of the past hand washed their clothes, made butter, planted crops, played games, and, of course, the secrets of the outhouse. One day I received a note attached to an old fashioned hoop and stick. The note came from Anita Shipway, a teacher who soon was retiring and would be coming to help me with the school tours. Well, Anita came and did help with many school tours through the years as well as anything she felt that needed doing. No one had to ask, if she saw there was a need, she and her sidekick, Dick Shipway, would do it.



They wrote the newsletter for a number of years. Anita and Dick measured our electric usage to determine how we could save electricity and get our rates down so we could have meetings in our own building instead of the Federated church or Town Hall.

When I was writing MAINE AND THE NANTICOKE VALLEY Anita and Dick just showed up one evening and fact checked the whole chapter on the Maine Community Band. Thank you!

And finally, in January 2014 a pipe froze and broke on the second floor of the museum that caused a lot of damage and flooded several rooms. I called the National Archives to ask what to do with all the wet books. On their advice Anita took many of the books home to store in their freezer. She also took the Dudley family Bible that was soaked through. Because of Anita and her neighbors in Park Manor we still have the Dudley Bible because Anita asked all her neighbors to donate paper towels to put in between the pages to aid in drying it out.

These are just a few of the wonderful things Anita and of course ,Dick did for our organization. That doesn't cover what she did for every place else in Broome County too. Anita will be sorely missed by us all. Goodbye for now Anita and thank you! Sue Lisk

Inducted Year: 1998 to the "Toy Hall of Fame"


"Play-Doh modeling compound started out as wallpaper cleaner. Joe McVicker learned from a teacher that kids usually found modeling clay too hard to manipulate. Discovering that the squishy cleaning product he manufactured could substitute, McVicker shipped some to the school. After teachers and kids raved, he offered to supply the product to all Cincinnati schools. More rave reviews followed. McVicker showcased the modeling clay at a na-





tional education convention in 1955, and word spread to Macy's and Marshall Field's. By 1956, the wallpaper cleaner had become Play-Doh. A year later, the manufacturer offered a softer Play-Doh in primary colors. Kids mixed these to make other colors, ending inevitably in brown. Captain Kangaroo endorsed Play-Doh, and so did Miss Frances from Ding Dong School. Play-Doh Pete appeared on product cans in 1960. The Fun Factory let kids extrude the material into interesting shapes, making mock hair, colorful spaghetti, and pretend ice cream that wouldn't melt. In the 1980s, Play-Doh expanded its palette to eight colors. Later versions sparkled with glitter, glowed in the dark, or smelled like shaving cream. Recent estimates say that kids have played with 700 million pounds of Play-Doh"
