

From the desk of the Pastor...

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord: A blessed Advent and Christmas season to all of you!

I don't know about you but, this year in particular, I find my-self saying "Come, Lord Jesus!" more than I ever have before. After a year that has left many of us feeling frazzled to the core, the celebration of his birth in Bethlehem and the prospect of his imminent return is something I am holding onto like a life preserver. ...Many of you have invested in us and prayed for us and we want you to know how grateful we are for your support! We cannot do what we do **WITHOUT YOU!**

There has been a great deal of activity at the Mission since I joined as the Executive Director at the beginning of the year. Here are a few highlights that stand out this year in our ministry:

- In May, our new long-term Women's Recovery Program opened, with 22 beds now available to meet the needs of these under-served members of our community.
- This summer we also opened transitional houses on campus for men continuing their recovery journey.
- Our food pantry, the Sparrow's Nest, served an increased number of families since the onset of the pandemic (from 550 to 600, an increase of nearly 10%).
- We are about to open The Mission Marketplace a new retail shopping experience on campus that is focused on the specific needs of our community.

We are truly blessed to have the dedicated, passionate staff members that are called here to do the Lord's work. And we are fortunate to have a beautiful, pastoral campus at which to do it. But it is the prayerful love and support of our friends and supporters that make all of this possible. Additional ways you and your congregations can support the Mission's ministry include:

- Prayers for those suffering from addiction or food insecurity to find the resources they greatly need!
- Continued prayers for protection of the health and safety of our clients and staff as we navigate this unprecedented pandemic.

Sign Up for Worship Today!





A Note From and For the Community...

Governor Hogan has issued a number of new orders in the last few days- it is hard to keep up with everything. Below is a synopsis of each order.

Governor Hogan's NEW ACTIONS in effect as of November 20, 2020:

- **10 PM CLOSURE FOR BARS AND RESTAURANTS STATEWIDE:** All bars, restaurants, and venues serving food and alcohol must close between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., except for the purposes of carryout and delivery.
- LIMITED CAPACITY FOR RETAIL ESTABLISHMENTS AND RELIGIOUS FACILITIES: Capacity at retail establishments and religious facilities will be reduced to 50% [the Baltimore-Washington Conference has limited church attendance to 25%], bringing them into line with indoor dining and personal services businesses, as well as bingo halls, bowling alleys, pool halls, roller- and ice-skating rinks, fitness centers, and social and fraternal clubs. The 6 foot social distancing and mask rules are still in effect.
- NO FANS FOR RACETRACKS AND STADIUMS: No fans will be permitted at racetracks or professional and collegiate stadiums across the state.

ACTIONS ON HOSPITAL SURGE MANAGEMENT AND VISITATION:

- HOSPITAL VISITATION PROHIBITED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE. State health officials have issued an emergency order to prohibit all hospital visitation until further notice with some exceptions—including end-of-life care, obstetrics, parents or guardians of minors, and support for people with disabilities. Read the order.
- NEW HOSPITAL SURGE MANAGEMENT ORDER. State health officials have issued an emergency order allowing hospitals that are either full or nearing capacity limits to transfer patients to hospitals that are equipped to provide them with the care they need. This will help alleviate the overcrowded hospitals in some areas of the state, and place patients in hospitals where beds are available.
- GUIDANCE ON ELECTIVE PROCEDURES. State health officials have issued guidance warning hospitals and other medical facilities to avoid any elective procedure admissions that are not urgent or life-saving—especially if they are likely to require prolonged artificial ventilation, ICU admissions, or may have a high probability of requiring post-hospital care in a skilled nursing facility. Read the guidance.

ACTIONS ON HOTSPOTS AND NURSING HOMES:

- NEW LIMITATIONS ON NURSING HOME VISITATION. Until further notice, indoor visitation at Maryland nursing homes will generally be limited to compassionate care, and all visitors must have proof of a negative COVID-19 test result within 72 hours prior to their visit. Read the order.
- NURSING HOME TESTING SURGE. State health officials have issued an order instituting mandatory twice-weekly testing for all staff at Maryland nursing homes, as well as mandatory weekly testing for all nursing home residents—effective no later than Friday, November 20. Read the order.
- MORE RAPID RESPONSE TEAMS FOR HOTSPOTS AND OUTBREAKS. To tackle acute outbreaks, Governor Hogan is doubling the number of rapid response teams deployed to provide an extra level of triage and supplement local staffing needs.

Please note: Most of the above information came from Del. Susan Krebs, but is not intended to support any particular political party. It is meant to provide information on current standards set in place by the state government.

Library Notes



****Important to remember!! We have CDs of past church services available for you to take home and listen to, if you cannot make it to our service on a Sunday. No need to check out the CDs, just bring them back when you are finished with them.****

The month of December!!! Celebrating the birth of Jesus and preparing for Him to arrive here once again! How do others celebrate? What are some traditions, crafts, music, FOODS, festivities, and fun things that are observed and completed? We went to the bottom shelf behind the couch in your library and found in the 300's section a series of books on Christmas in different places. Enjoy these suggestions:

- Christmas in Washington, D.C. by World Book (300) Officially, the government of the United States does not celebrate religious holidays. Unofficially, of course, it does. There is a national Christmas tree; there is a Capitol Christmas tree; there is a White House decked out for the holidays; there is Christmas on the National Mall, a holiday celebration not quite like any other in the world. This book contains history, traditions, crafts, recipes, music, and pictures of Christmas in Washington.
- Christmas in the Holy Land by World Book (300) This book starts with: 'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government will be upon his shoulder, and his name will be called "Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." Isaiah 9:6.' In the text, we are treated to scriptures followed by explanation and history behind the scriptures. The back of the book contains carols and crafts.
- Christmas in Switzerland by World Book (300) Want to learn how to make a Chocolate Advent Tree? Or, how about a recipe for Anise Cookies? You'll find these and more about traditions and history of Christmas in Switzerland. Tourists make a pilgrimage each year to the small village of Einsiedeln in order to see the Black Madonna and the Bethlehem Diorama. The celebration of St. Nick is explained in detail. In a country where not only French, but also Swiss-German is the spoken language, a multitude of customs and history abound!
- Christmas in Spain by World Book (300) What is the history behind, and the traditions of, the celebration of the Feast of the Epiphany? Letters are written by children with requests of presents and are addressed to the Three Kings. A King's Day treat is a kind of fruitcake with a tiny, inexpensive toy hidden inside. Crafts in this book include Christmas tree ornaments and there is a recipe for Spanish-style hot chocolate.
- Christmas in the Philippines by World Book (300) December 16th is the true beginning of the Christmas season in the Philippines. This is the day that the church bells call the people to the very early "Mass of the Rooster" that begins at 4 am. Every morning from that day through Christmas Eve, people attend church for nine days of prayer. Also, to prepare for Christmas, Filipinos clean the house, old items are replaced by new ones, new clothes are bought, and the church and churchyard are cleaned carefully. The idea behind all this is to prepare for Christ by cleansing their houses and their souls. Music, recipes for a holiday feast, and directions for making a star lantern are in the back of the book.
- Christmas in Poland by World Book (300) In Poland, the anniversary of the first day of the life of Jesus is a very holy day. There is mass at midnight, called the Shepherd's Mass. Then, there is mass at dawn, called the Angel's Mass. The third mass on Christmas is the Mass of the Three Kings. Some Poles attend all three masses. There are directions for Polish ornaments in this book, as well as information about the fairy-tale stables (mangers) in Poland. Recipes and carols are in the back of the book. Twelve-Fruit Compote sounds yummy!

Our library is for you to use and enjoy. Remember to sign your name and date to the card found in the back of the book. File the card in the yellow box under the letter that begins your last name. When you return a book, find the card, put the return date on the card, and put the card in the pocket of the book. You can stack books on the shelf beside the yellow box or on the desk; the librarians will re-shelve them. Please return borrowed items within 6 months.

Donated items may be left stacked on the library desk. <u>Please</u> leave a paper with your name and the names of the donated items so that we can give you proper credit. Remember that we only take items suitable for a church library. The librarians reserve the right to determine suitability.

- Since the last Administrative Council meeting, I have officiated at one funeral (Shar A. Hohmes) on Friday, November 6, 2020. Robert L. Gunnarsson, Sr.'s funeral will take place on Wednesday morning, November 25, 2020 at 11 AM at Eline Funeral Home in Hampstead, MD. Interment to follow at Wesley UM Church cemetery immediately following the funeral. I have had not officiated at any baptisms nor weddings since the last Administrative Council meeting.
- Janet Martin, the Worship Committee, and I have been making plans for Advent and Christmas. We will be having a live nativity this year on December 13, 2020 (December 20 is rain/snow date). The live nativity will take place during the 10 AM worship hour. The community is invited. There will be scripture readings and Christmas carols. There will be one in-person Christmas Eve service at 7 PM on December 24, 2020. Bishop Easterling and the BWCUMC Cabinet will be having a First Sunday After Christmas service on December 27, 2020. There will be no in-person worship on December 27, 2020. All other Worship Committee details are in the November 5, 2020 Worship Committee meeting minutes.

More discussion ensued, including signing up and when to send out the sign up, service times, and possible numbers of attendees. At the conclusion of the discussion, one service at 7 PM remained in place, with the possibility to reconsider if necessary.

Membership Secretary: Sandy Cole

- Sandy is still working on the directory, making a few more modifications after providing it to certain people who required a copy.
- She is also adding old information into the Servant Keeper system.
- Sandy will be helping Jess Sichel in the church office with mailings.
- Sandy will also be doing advertising.

Seminary Student: Matt Sichel

- Matt has officially been accepted for a doctoral program with London School of Theology and Asbury Seminary. He still has an interview to do. Intake should be in February. He received positive feedback from his Master's degree leadership, but the doctorate is intimidating.
- Matt is still in the candidacy program [for ordination]; he is meeting every month with his mentor. His situation is contingent on the August 2021 General Conference.

Treasurer: Laura Waltrup [Financial reports are available upon request; feel free to ask Jess in the office or Laura directly]

- Laura gave a Financial report in brief.
- Our General Fund balance is in good position. Of note: our WIP (Wesley Improvement Projects) fund has almost the exact same as last YTD. The Bill Harris Music Fund has a positive balance, which may be used to purchase a new keyboard.
- General Fund Receipts are down some; after a bit of research by the Finance Committee, it was determined that this was for myriad reasons—no real, sole reason.
- We are under budget in just about every category, totaling under budget at around \$23,000.
- We have a decent amount of cash in the bank; much of it has to do with the PPP grant funds. Also, we have a three-month forgiveness of pension and medical expenses from the UMC for the last three months of 2020. Laura has a pretty strong feeling that we will end up with a good balance in the checking account at the end of the year.
- Finishing up with the PPP forgiveness looks pretty straightforward.
- The 2021 budget has several items that are a little/slightly less than 2020 (i.e., program expenses, salary & compensations, utilities, operating expenses, apportionments). Maintenance and repair has a bit more of a budget.
- The proposed budget was discussed a bit. The hope that we wouldn't have to cut staff was raised. No further discussion was held; the budget passed unanimously.

Lay Leadership

- Linda Yost asked if there would be a "retreat" (planning meeting) in January. Rev. Amy said that we would not; instead, we would have regular meetings. We could discuss goals in the first meeting. Rev. Amy has two main goals for next year: 1) Get us through COVID, and 2) Get us through the 2021 General Conference. Discussion followed about the inability to plan; we need to move step by step.
- There was also discussion about the probable separation of the UMC. The current Protocol for separation will be considered by the Judicial Council ahead of the Conference. It could, however, be amended from the floor.
- In the meantime, we still do the work of Jesus—feed the hungry, visit the sick.
- The church leadership was thanked for this year's work. Matt Sichel was thanked for pinch-hitting in Ad. Council role. There is rejoicing that mighty works of the Spirit are still being done now. There is much to be

grateful for—sticking with things, not giving up hope... Thanks were extended to Outreach; it has been a joy to see what has been going on. The meeting was closed in prayer at 8:51 PM.
