



Action Kintore - The Bothie Repairs

It is very humbling when a local charity experiences the financial and volunteer support and contributions received from local companies.

The Bothie youth facility had experienced ongoing problems with the straw bale / rendering cracking repeatedly, resulting in the need for a more permanent solution.




Again, this support is amazing where local companies, assist local community projects, and an enormous thank you goes out to them.

Working to an OFT approved Code of Practice



Choosing the right puppy for you

I am often asked advice on how best to choose a puppy. Of course a dog is for life, so it is a major decision and one you should spend time over and involve the whole family with. Most people will choose a breed that they have owned previously, one that a friend may have or simply a breed they like the look of.

However, if you are considering a breed that you do not have any experience of, it is very important to research the breed well. Try and match the breed's energy level with yours. If you like exercise and take regular long walks go for a high energy dog e.g. a medium sized working breed. If you prefer shorter walks consider a more laid back breed.

The majority of behavioral problems we see stem from the fact that a high energy dog is not able to use it all up and the dog becomes highly strung. For example, we sometimes see behavioral problems affecting collies. This is because they have been bred to round up sheep, which takes up a lot of energy, and are therefore not suited to some domestic lifestyles.



If you have a breed in mind research it on the internet, there are a lot of good websites out there giving advice on individual breeds. However also speak to your Vet; we would have seen all different shapes and sizes of breeds over the years. We also can advise you on the more common medical problems to affect the breed you may be considering.

Once you have chosen a breed, you will have to find a pup. Many breeders advertise their pups for sale for example, online and you can also get lists of local pedigree breeders from the kennel club. Try and find a breeder via recommendations. Eventually you will want to go and see the puppies. Ask to see the mother, and father if owned by the breeder. If they are friendly, calm and well behaved this could give an idea of the pup's nature when he/she grows up! Also, ask about worming and feeding.

A good breeder should be worming the pups every 2 weeks with a Veterinary wormer until they leave. When pups are in for their first vaccinations, we always ask when they were last wormed so we can tell you when they are next due. Pups should obviously be fed a <u>complete</u> puppy food, however I have come across pups that have been fed adult food which has resulted in medical problems so do check.



If possible, take the whole family along once you have decided to choose a pup. A pup that seems interested in the whole family is always a good start. Whether to go for a bitch or a dog is always a personal preference and something your Vet can help you with.


Once you have signed up for the puppy, don't forget to puppy proof your home! The first few months can be hard work but great fun too. A puppy will give you years of companionship and will grow up to become a very much loved member of the family.

Do remember, however, that Mrs. Murray's Dog and Cat home in Aberdeen does a great job at re-homing stray dogs. They often have many stray or unwanted dogs, (cats and rabbits) looking for homes. So unless you specifically want a puppy do have a look around; I have seen some beautiful dogs in the practice having been re-homed from the dog and cat home!

Kintore fully engaged with plans for Town Park

There can be no doubting the public interest in the plans for a Town Park at Midmill, Kintore. The recent announcement of the latest plans for an enabling development received a combined 10,000 engagements (not just views) on the Kintore and District Community Council Facebook page.

The reason for this level of interest is obvious. As the original Town Park brief recognised, Kintore lacks many of the facilities that the other nine of Aberdeenshire's ten largest towns take for granted. The Town Park plan needs to offer Kintore some redress to counter the Royal Burgh's chronic lack of community facilities.



Kintore and District Community Council, in their response to the latest plans, reiterated that Kintore lost a large area of public open space and sports facilities when the new Kintore Primary School was built. It sees no other current opportunity to provide public open space anywhere near the centre of Kintore. So, we only have this one chance to get this right for the people of Kintore. With continuing housing development the need is increasingly urgent.

"The only beneficiaries of the housing explosion in Kintore are the developers in terms of business, Aberdeenshire Council in terms of increasing local tax revenue and landowners who have sold land for housing development. The losers are the Kintore residents who are suffering progressive deprivation as the ratio of outdoor amenity area to population declines," the community council said in its submission.



Out of 76 written public responses to the planning application, only five were supportive.

One of the recurring points is that a Town Park should have attractive open space at its core. Landscaped parkland, with a picnic area, where the residents of Kintore could meet informally to enjoy the park and socialise with friends and neighbours.

Many objections questioned the need for more football pitches. But we know there are questions about the future viability of the pitches at Midmill, because of changes to ground levels being proposed by SEPA. The responses included suggestions of tennis, basketball, multi sport, outdoor gym and a skatepark. There were also concerns expressed about the adequacy of 20 parking places.



At the time of writing we anticipate an announcement that may mean Kintore will have tennis facilities on another site. A genuine consultation should examine all the above factors in determining the sports that should be incorporated into the Town Park.

Although the detail of the 184 houses has yet to be revealed, a number of objectors raised concerns that the housing mix did not seem to be in tune with an aging population, with an apparent total lack of bungalows. There were also questions about how many of the homes would meet disabled accessibility standards.



Increased traffic was an inevitable concern. More specifically, with the proposed roundabout, traffic from the B994 Kemnay road, plus the Town Park housing, will have priority over traffic from Kintore on the B987 School Road. The concern is that this could result in long rush-hour tailbacks for Kintore residents, heading for the Broomhill roundabout and the A96.

Lack of verge cutting/maintenance

Many residents have been in touch with me from Kintore, Blackburn and Newmachar to complain about the condition of the verges in their communities. I have been chasing, and chasing this item and was stunned when I received the following reply from the local Landscape Services Officer:

"Good Afternoon.

The verges around all Aberdeenshire have been stopped for a budget restraint from Roads until further notice we will not be cutting the verges if you require any further details, please contact the Landscape Manager."

I am sure that I will not be alone in finding this not only disappointing, but an unacceptable level of service from the Council. I therefore took the step to write to the Director of Environment and Infrastructure Services (see below) to express mine and my constituent's dissatisfaction, and to urge that this decision be reversed:

"I am sure that I am not alone in being inundated with complaints relating to Landscape Services and what I thought was a reduction in the verge cutting service due to the £80,000+ budget cut. I have been chasing various areas that are looking incredibly unsightly and have just received the following response (see attached) from our local manager. I am stunned to say the least. This is one of the most visible services that the council provides and to completely stop it is causing many, many residents some great degree of upset. From what I can gather, this is an internal cost reduction between Roads and Landscape Services that was approved at the last budget, but not taken onboard by both depts until recently. I know money is tight, but I would urge that the decision to implement a complete cessation is reversed and either the normal or a reduced service is restored asap. I believe the full implications of this budget saving were perhaps not understood by the Administration when they took it and if you cannot decide alone, I would urge that you have a conversation with their leadership team to reinstate this service. I can happily send you on the plethora of photos of the frankly horrendous growth throughout my ward, but I am certain that you will have seen the evidence yourself when you have been driving throughout the Shire.

I look forward to hearing from you, and I am hoping for a positive response."

New A2B Bus Service for Kintore and Blackburn - Success

In May, at one of my surgeries, a constituent raised the poor level of provision of A2B bus services to Kintore in comparison with other areas in Garioch such as; Inverurie, Westhill, Turriff, Huntly and even Echt/Dunecht. I immediately looked into it, found it to be correct and wrote to the officer in charge asking for an urgent review to achieve a fair and equitable division of resources across Garioch:

"When the decision, quite rightly, was taken to stop the Hatton of Fintray service, it was decided to redeploy the bus to Echt/Dunecht/Westhill. Why has no consideration been given to expanding the service provided in Kintore/Kemnay, and whilst I am on this, why is there no provision in Blackburn and Newmachar? There are significant proportions of population in these settlements with mobility issues and it seems that the resources are not being spread out equitably. I am seeking an urgent review of this and improvement to the level of service provided. I am aware that we have limited resources available, and that other areas may have a reduced service, but what we provide should be fair across Garioch/wider area."



After many emails between the officer and I, the review has been carried out, and I received the following news yesterday:

"I refer to your previous request that A2B dial-a-bus serve Kintore on a second day each week in addition to the current Wednesday shopper service (Kemnay – Kintore – Inverurie) which is detailed on the website at Inverurie rural A2B - Aberdeenshire Council. Having reviewed vehicle availability in the area I am pleased to advise that from next week, we will offer a shopper service from Kintore to Inverurie on Mondays, as well as Wednesdays. The service is available for residents who find it difficult to use other bus services due to infirmity or disability. We have written to Kintore customers to advise them about the extra day, and the service is open for bookings now. As can be seen in the attached guide timetable we are taking the opportunity to trial a shopper service from Blackburn to Inverurie, as this fits in with the Kintore service. This door-to-door service will hopefully benefit residents of Fechnie Brae sheltered housing and other older residents of Blackburn who find it difficult to walk to a bus stop or carry shopping. Passengers must book to travel by calling A2B on 01467 535333 and choose option 3 for general enquiries."

isn't used, it will be withdrawn.


I fought hard for a service to be provided to Hatton of Fintray, as they have such poor public transport, but not one single person used it and it was therefore redeployed. Please use this as this is a great addition to Kintore and Blackburn.

Underpass Project - The Happy Tunnel

Kintore - are you ready? We need you, or to be more accurate, your children's help! Let's take community ownership of the underpass and make it into something we can all be proud of.

After two and a half years, Rachel (The Bothie) and I have finally managed to get everything organised to tackle the underpass. Permissions are in place with Amey (big thanks!), graffiti artists/teachers and all round good guys Outlines Collective (Kirsty & Naomi) were set up and raring to go.

The theme for the wall is Happiness. What makes you smile when you feel down, what do you enjoy doing, yourself, or with friends - what can lift your mood?





In response to a social media post, I thought that I would just briefly summarise what has happened and is happening to address these issues.

Living in the community, I am well aware of the speeding that goes on. In my first term (2017-22) as a councillor, I asked for a traffic speed analysis to be carried out at Kintore School and it evidenced significant speeding at the three times when the 20mph part time zone was operational.

The council would not intervene with traffic calming so I, along with councillors Hood and Ford, raised a Member Promoted Issue to try and tackle the issue. I successfully argued and won the case at both the Garioch Area Committee and then at Infrastructure Services Committee and finally, after three years, it came in front of the Garioch Area Committee for the approval of the design of the traffic calming. Once chosen, it would have been constructed within 6 months, however, Conservative and Liberal Democrat councillors asked whether they could simply not approve any design and essentially stop it. When officers said that they could, EVERY SINGLE Conservative and Liberal Democrat councillor voted to stop it. I argued for it to be implemented, but lost the vote 6 votes to 8 votes.

This was just in January 2022 and this is why there is no traffic calming in Kintore. Three years of work was thrown out the window and disappointingly, two 'local' councillors voted against it. If they had voted for it, we'd have it built and doing it's job by now. However, that is in the past and I am still trying to tackle this issue. The council won't consider any speeding issue without evidence, and the evidence comes from officers conducting traffic speed analysis at the locations in question.

On the back of the success that I was having near Kintore School, I placed requests for traffic speed analyses to be carried out in the following locations (as constituents had raised them with me):

- 07.10.20 Midmill School, Kintore
- 29.09.21 Kingsfield Road
- 29.09.21 School Rd (slope down from Midmill School junction and Torryburn Hotel)

Unfortunately, the council cut the resources which carry these analysis out and I have been chasing and pushing for these resources to be restored ever since. My pressure has paid off and resources was restored earlier this year. I have chased these locations three times this year, the last time being just last month (and I have just done so again, so four times now). I have also just last month submitted an analysis request for the Blairs stretch of road heading to Kemnay from Kintore. I will do everything I can to support and push for traffic reduction measures in all of the communities that I represent, and I welcomed the relatively recent addition of a rotational Safety Camera Unit on Northern Road.

Nestrans E-cargo Bike for Sustainable Roots Kintore

When I joined the board of Nestrans last year, I became aware of a programme where they were allowing businesses to trial e-cargo bikes out. They had a fleet of six and the idea is that businesses get the bike for a substantial length of time to encourage them to move away from petrol/diesel delivery vehicles.

One bike was unallocated and I immediately suggested what I thought was the perfect business for it, Sustainable Roots Kintore. I spoke to both Nestrans and Carole Taylor (Sustainable Roots Kintore) and they both loved the idea. It has taken a while, but the bike arrived in the first week of August and Carole, her team (and myself) all had a wee try on it.

It is perfect for meeting the aim of 20 minute neighbourhoods and will enable Sustainable Roots Kintore to make local deliveries without impacting the environment.

If you see Carole or one of her team out and about, please give them a wee wave!



New Zebra Crossing Update - Gauchhill Road, Kintore

I have been chasing and chasing this for some time and did so again as soon as I returned from leave as I know many parents are desperate to know the status with school restarting in a few weeks.

I received the following update from one of our principal engineers late yesterday afternoon:

"I met with Hunter Construction today at the new Gauchhill Road zebra crossing works. They have started excavation on the south side footpath and we have SSE lined up for the 7th August to provide the electrical connection for the new crossing. We anticipate a three week programme for the main crossing works but it may be that some of the final road markings etc may have to follow on slightly later. The site is operating under traffic lights with half carriageway traffic flow and this seems to be operating well."

As you know, I have been pushing for all the works to be completed before the schools return, but it looks like they may miss this by one or two days. This is slightly disappointing, but I'm sure, in the bigger scheme of things, the imminent completion will be seen as great news to assist the safety of pedestrians, especially children making their way to school and around Kintore.

B994 Kintore and Kemnay (Blairs) Road Safety - Success

I wrote to senior officers within Aberdeenshire Council and the local Chief Inspector of Police Scotland, following serious concerns raised by constituents about 11 accidents within the space of five years at this stretch of road. I asked for an urgent safety review, highlighting the actions that they took/are still taking at Rosehall, nr Newmachar, when I wrote to them about a similar accident occurrence there. At Rosehall, council officers put a temporary 40mph speed limit in place until actions could be taken. They have since carried out a road retexturing that restored skid resistance to the road surface, and they are now refreshing the centrelines and edge lines. Since these actions have been taken and there has been no incidents and residents feel much safer. The Chief Inspector replied in agreement that he is concerned about this stretch of road and I have liaised with senior Roads officers. They have conducted a safety review and they concur with local residents and my opinion and are in the process of actioning the following:

They have agreed to resurface the bends on this road section and have applied for funding from the Road Safety Improvement fund (internal Aberdeenshire Council process). They have issued a works order for further signage to be erected on the bend signs with advisory plates "max speed 40" as a warning to drivers. I do not have a date yet for the erection of the signs, but when I queried the timescale, they said, "As soon as we have available resources once the signs have been manufactured." I have had it confirmed that these signs will remain in place until the resurfacing works are completed.

After querying, they stated that they are confident in receiving the funding and after further pressing re the timescale for the resurfacing, I received the following reply, "It depends if we can do it with our own resources, or more likely have to put it to tender. Either way, unlikely to be this year."

This is a positive step forward and, although I obviously wish that this could happen quicker, I will press for it to happen asap. In the meantime, the speed reduction signs should help as they did at Rosehall. I would like to thank council officers and the local Chief Inspector for their assistance in progressing this matter.

Bus Service Changes - Kintore

I was recently made aware by a constituent that Stagecoach Highland, who run the number 10 bus route, were proposing reducing the service provided to Kintore:

Presently, the 10b/10c (Mon-Fri) departs: 19.00, 20.15, 21.15, 22.15 and 23.20.

Proposed to become: 18.30, 20.35 and 23.00.

Presently, the 10b/10c (Sat) departs: 18.00, 19.00, 20.15,

21.15, 22.15 and 23.20.

Proposed to become: 18.30 and 20.30.



Unfortunately there was nothing that I could do re this, but through discussions with Stagecoach Aberdeen, they have made the following improvements which will compensate to a degree:

They have added a service 9 at 21:40 from Union Square to operate via Kintore (it will go straight through and will not serve Hallforest) and the 22:35 From Inverurie to Aberdeen will do the same. The 9 does not normally serve Kintore, but as this is a late journey, it will be a one off in this case to close a gap in the Timetable.

Kingsfield Road - Dog Poo/Waste Bin - Success

Following complaints from residents about the amount of dog waste that was left on the pavements of Kingsfield Road, I had a quick check of the road, and, for such a long road and popular dog walking route, it did not appear to have any waste bin provision.

In asked officers to investigate and they concurred that there was a problem, and it was a suitable location for an additional bin. The bin has just been installed at the far end of Kingsfield Road, beside the grit bin as officers felt it was the "most unobtrusive spot for other pedestrians."

Please pick up after your dog and use the bins provided. To not do it is not just disgusting anti-social behaviour, but it poses a health risk as well.

Think of your community and do the decent thing - bag it and bin it.

Emergency, which service?

These are the three words delivered calmly to you when you dial 999 in an emergency.

Answering this question and the questions that will inevitably follow will help assist the Emergency Service to find you or your address more easily. This is especially important if you have a rural address or a house with a name rather than a number. Every second counts when it comes to responding, any time lost can be the difference between life and death therefore it's very important to be clear, calm, and concise with your replies.

Emergency services urge the public to make their house numbers visible.

As the nights start drawing in it means shorter daylight hours and dark evenings and nights. This comes with its own challenges to identify a house name or number on a street for the Emergency Services. Put bluntly if your house name or number cannot be seen from the roadside then this could cause a delay in getting help to you.

5 Top Tips to become more visible to Emergency Service's during a night time callout.

- 1. Ensure your house name or house number can be seen from the roadside.
- 2. Trim any garden foliage which may prevent it from being seen
- 3. If it's dark, make sure the house is lit up as it's easier to spot, especially in the early hours
- 4. If someone fit and able is with you, ask them to keep a look out for the Emergency Services, a simple and basic of waving your arms to attract their attention is a massive help.
- 5. It is now even possible to update your location on Google Maps.





It is a tricky situation when emergency services are ready to help somebody who might be minutes away from dying but their property number is not clearly visible. Losing vital life-saving minutes can be avoided if these few simple measures are put in place. In cases of sudden cardiac arrest, minutes can mean the difference between life and death. The likelihood of surviving decreases by 10% with every minute that passes without defibrillation. Usually, you cannot plan for an emergency, but you can prepare. All Emergency Services hope you never need them but just in case, PLEASE help us find you.

Our Kintore Community Defib saves a life.

Our AED's (or Automated External Defibrillators to give them their Sunday name or to give their nickname Defib's) have been used a number of times in Kintore over the years but it's always great to share a positive result following their use.

Earlier in June this year, Henderson Drive resident, Eva Lamond and her family were enjoying some quality time together with her father-in-law who had been visiting from Perth when he suddenly went into cardiac arrest.



Eva's husband quickly ran 'bare footed' to retrieve our AED located at the school, whilst Eva and friends performed CPR. Their quick action, and timely use of the AED saved the life of Eva's father-in-law.

More poignant was the fact that had Eva's father-in-law taken ill when he was at home in Perth, his nearest AED was over two miles away, therefore the outcome may well have been very different.

Well done everyone involved.

You too could save a life

AED's have built-in voice instructions which help many people make proper use of them in an emergency however, what happens when there isn't an AED close by or you have nobody else around. Would you be comfortable delivering CPR?

Kintore & District Community Council - Community Resilience Plan

Over the last 12 months KDCC have been working hard to pull together the very important Community Resilience Plan which is designed to automatically kick into life in the event of a local emergency, like localised flooding, power outages or any other natural disaster that may affect our wee community.

This plan is delivered by local volunteers who will work closely with the Emergency Services to provide local knowledge and assistance during a local emergency. This will provide better communication and will also be the first response to the likes of flooding.

KDCC have applied for some grants to help fund much-needed equipment which can be used until the Emergency Services arrive and could be the difference between life and death.

Aberdeenshire North Food Bank

I wish I could tell you that things are quietening down at the Food bank in Inverurie, that donations are flooding in and that we are receiving fewer requests for food parcels from our community. How I wish that! However, you all know that every single one of us is feeling the impact of the current cost of living crisis, whether through our supermarket receipts, our visits to petrol stations or reading utility bills and it is no different when it comes to the Food Bank.

From January to June, 2022, the Food Bank in Inverurie provided 299 households with food parcels which fed 430 adults and 248 children. For the same period this year, 441 households, comprising 547 adults and 270 children, received food parcels from ANFB in Inverurie and surrounding local communities (Kintore, Kemnay, Blackburn, etc). In the latest month for which we have the statistics (July), the Inverurie volunteers despatched 54 food parcels to help 74 adults and 50 children. A more sobering set of numbers is that across our network of 5 food banks (Inverurie, Huntly, Ellon, Peterhead and Fraserburgh) in July 2022, we provided 284 households (406 adults and 149 children) with food parcels. In July 2023, we provided 438 households (591 adults and 205 children) with food parcels. None of these households wants to be getting help from a food bank, I am sure, but they are living in food poverty in our communities.

This does not make for happy reading, I know, but, while our donations are understandably down overall (so far this month we have taken in across our network 1663 kg of food but we have put out 3712 kg in food parcels), we continue to be extremely grateful for all donations that come our way, whether through donations of money via our website

Welcome to Bennachie Parish Church of Scotland

On the 3rd of September 2023, a union of congregations will take place at Kintore Parish Church to form a new, larger parish: Bennachie Parish Church. The new parish boundaries will extend from Kintore south to Echt and west as far as Chapel of Garioch. It will encompass the former parishes of Kintore, Kemnay, Blairdaff/Chapel of Garioch, Monymusk, Cluny and Echt/Midmar. There will initially be 8 places of worship in the parish although the buildings at Blairdaff, Cluny and Midmar are set to close in the coming years. And there will be a team ministry comprising Revds Euan Glen, Sheila Mitchell and myself as well as our Assistant Minister, Revd Tose Shayamunda.

The union is part of a much larger restructuring process that the Church of Scotland is undergoing nationally. Earlier this year the participating congregations all voted in favour of the union and there has been a lot of work behind the scenes to join up all the dots administratively. The important thing I wish to share with you here though is how this change will affect you as members of the congregation and parish.

Firstly, weekly church services will continue at Kintore. We do occasionally close the service at Kintore in favour of a joint, parish-wide service but this only happens about 4 times a year and notices are posted of where the service will be held. Other important worship services at Easter and Christmas as well as our monthly Messy Church will also continue. Moreover the pastoral care of our parish, including weddings, funerals, Baptisms, school chaplaincy and care of the sick and poor will all continue to take place as before

So what is changing then? As a church organization we will benefit from being part of a much wider family, sharing resources, outreach projects and opportunities for fellowship, learning and spiritual formation. Local communities like Kintore will in turn benefit from having a team of ministers serving them. For the past nine years, I have had the tremendous privilege of serving the Kintore community. Your welcome has always been warm. I'm confident that you will be just as welcoming to Euan and Sheila as you have been to Tose and myself. We look forward to serving you and our neighbouring communities in the new parish together.

Kintore Church - Walk the Parish Pilgrimage

On the 3rd of September, the congregations of Blairdaff/Chapel of Garioch, Cluny, Echt/Midmar, Kemnay, Kintore and Monymusk united to form Bennachie Parish Church of Scotland. Nothing unusual there — many congregations are entering unions all across Scotland. But this group of churches decided to celebrate their forthcoming union in a slightly different way with a Walk-the-Parish Pilgrimage.



The river Don which flows through the new parish along the foot of the Bennachie range in Aberdeenshire was one of the routes of St Machar's early mission to the local Picts in the 6th Century. On the weekend of 12-13 August, the congregations followed in the footsteps of some of these early Christian missionaries. Over two days a total of 40 members from all the constituent congregations walked all or part of a 31 mile trek from Kintore to Echt, stopping to worship at each of the eight church buildings in the new parish.



Seven walkers covered the full distance, many more participated in one or more stages and even the Presbytery Moderator, Rev Stella Campbell, joined in for part of the walk. Apart from the walkers, many more joined the services along the way, sharing in the prayers for the new union and providing refreshments for the journey. A fair crowd gathered at Echt church to cheer on the 20 walkers who finished the pilgrimage together and the weekend concluded with a lavish BBQ at Echt Hall.



The pilgrimage was led by Rev Neil Meyer and his daughter, Christine, who walked the Camino de Santiago from St-Jean-Pier-de-Port in France to Santiago de Compostella a year earlier.

Rev. Euan Glen led the team providing logistical support for the pilgrims and cheering them on at each of the pilgrim services along the way. And Rev Sheila Mitchell led the team that provided the hospitality at the BBQ on the Sunday. A real team-effort by the newly formed Ministry Team that will lead the congregations into the new union!



Kintore's Unsung Heroes

At the end of June The Rotary Club of Kintore, Blackburn and Kemnay revealed local butcher John Dossett as winner of annual Citizen of the Year Award 2023. So we decided to meet up with John (pardon the pun) to find out a wee bit more about this quiet, humble local hero.

Have you always been in Kintore?

"Although I actually stay in Kemnay I always feel Kintore is my real home."

Born and bred in Kintore, John's family has an amazing connection with our town.

John's Granda was the Town's Officer for the Kintore Council until 1974 when there was a major change to Aberdeenshire Council. Based at the iconic Town House in Kintore Square where he would have collected the rent money from the town's residents and local businesses. A time when Kintore had its Doctors surgery within the Town House and a Provost of Kintore responsible for the Town. John's dad owned the Fish & Chip shop in Rosehill, Aberdeen and his mum was a legal secretary based in Kintore. He stayed with his mum in Kintore and spent his formative years locally, educated at Kintore School before moving up to the larger Inverurie Academy.

Have you always been a Butcher?

"I started my butchery career right here in Kintore. Only a few residents will remember Sinclair McIntosh Butchers where the Turkish Barber is now, but that is where as a 14 year old I started work as the Butchers loon, progressing to the art of butchery at 17 years old but I've had breaks from being a butcher over the years working for Kennerty Dairies for a period and also being manager at Kelly's of Cults for a number of years"

Having worked for a number of employers over the years and burning no bridges when he moved job he built up a respect within the trade and local community so it came as no surprise when Kintore butcher Asti Neish decided to retire due to ill health in 2006 that he contacted his former employee John and gave him first opportunity to buy the butcher shop in the Square. John grabbed the chance with both hands, the rest as they say is history.



From taking ownership on the Friday night, he and his late wife Gillian worked all the hours possible during the weekend to ensure it reopened on Monday morning as J&G Dossett Butchers.

Dossett's Butcher is known as the Local Family Butcher, but is it a true family business?

"Absolutely, three of my four children work in the business at the moment with my daughter Emma being the most well known to most customers. "We are lucky to have such a fantastic team here and regard them as my extended family"

What is the secret sauce to a successful business?

"It's really quite simple, you have to consistently deliver the highest quality personal customer service and free advice at the same time as making sure you sell the very best quality local products available to you"

I'm sure we will all agree that John and his team does this consistently.

At 67 years old are you looking to retire soon?

"I've got no plan set in stone, however I am looking to take more of back seat and free up some time to do some walking, fishing and looking after my two dogs when I am at age and fitness level that I can enjoy these"

Lastly John, what did it mean to you winning the Citizen of the Year Award?

"I am delighted and humbled to have won this award. My wife Gillian and I started the business together 17 years ago and very much worked as a team. It was devastating when we lost her to cancer in 2020.

The community helped us all get through this loss with their patience and kindness which I could never fully repay but I always am grateful of."

A hundred years of Kintore Pipe Band

Kintore Pipe Band are celebrating a belated anniversary this year, marking over a century of entertaining the local community. The band should have celebrated their 100th birthday in 2021, but the Covid pandemic put a stop to their planned events. Two years later than planned, the band are now set to celebrate this significant milestone with a Centenary Dance at the Thainstone Exchange on Saturday 30th September. Their big birthday bash will feature a three-course meal, music from Starsky, and, of course, a performance by the pipe band.

The band was formed by the Gordon Highlanders just after the First World War, making Kintore one of the few North-East bands to have survived and entertained year-on-year since the early twentieth century. Founding Pipe Major, Isaac Ogg, took up post in 1921. Following Ogg's lead, in the intervening century, the pipe band has been led by a total of thirteen different Pipe Majors (two of whom were brave enough to take on the job twice!). The current Pipe Major is Kintore local, Claire Napier - the first woman to lead the band.


A regular on the Highland Games circuit, the band also frequently plays at local festivals, fairs, corporate functions and weddings. The band has also previously travelled further afield,



with performances at traditional music festivals in Belgium, Ireland, Italy and the Czech Republic, as well as participation in such prestigious events as the New York Tartan Day Parade and Shetland's famous Up Helly Aa fire festival. Currently comprised of 35 members, and with a healthy cohort of learners, the Kintore Pipe Band continues to thrive, promising a healthy future as it enters its second century of serving the local community. The band is run entirely not-for-profit, with all earnings being put back into the band so that they can offer free piping and drumming tuition for the local community, and cover the band's running costs.
