

# KINTORE COUNCILLOR REPORT - Glen Reid

#### Wellpark Road/Co-op junction

A constituent made me aware of an accident at the junction between Wellpark Road and the Co-op when a vehicle exiting the Co-op collided with another driving past. He had mentioned that there had been other such incidents and asked what could be done to improve safety here.

I wrote to the Roads team and asked them to investigate, however, the local and road safety team inspected the junction and stated that they do not see any issues with the junction in question, saying:

"There are edge of carriageway 1009 markings to inform drivers that they do not have right of way when exiting the car park and as such as the visibility splay meets with our standards then nothing more to be done here.

The issue appears to be with patrons of the co-op, and as such the team suggest that the co-op is contacted to request that they put up a courtesy message within their private grounds to warn drivers to take care exiting the car park which may assist with any potential accidents here."

I then wrote to the manager of the Co-op asking for assistance and received a positive response saying that their Health and Safety Manager is going to do a store visit to see what they can do, with the possibility of them erecting a sign to warn drivers exiting the car park.

I hope that this proceeds and I thank the Coop management for their assistance.

# Kingsfield Road - Please turn your pavement facing mirrors inward during cold weather

I received a complaint from a constituent who had discovered during a recent cold spell that "the pavement clearing and sanding had stopped at Howieslap." He was raising concerns due to the "high number of elderly residents, some disabled, East of Howieslap who have to walk on very uneven ground to get to the village."

I asked officers to investigate and they initially told me that the whole street was a F3 rating (Footway Priority 3) and therefore would be done when resources allowed.

I queried that this did not explain why the operation stopped at Howieslap when the whole road was a F3.

After a few more emails, they said, "We spoke with local colleagues about this matter and they stated that in this instance the gritting team experienced an inability to do the full length of this footpath due to parked cars and mirrors sticking out which was further compounded by increased size of footpath tractors we are now using. As such if residents can keep this in mind for future winter periods they should be able to cover this full area next time."

I asked for clarification on whether there was pavement parking involved and was assured, "According to our colleagues the vehicles were too close to the kerb and their mirrors were protruding too far out in this instance. Hopefully this helps clarify it."

I know this is not ideal, but could residents please be mindful, in cold weather spells, to turn their pavement facing mirrors inwards and not to park right on the edge of the pavement - this will hopefully mean that the pavement gritter can access the whole street.

# Northern Road - Lochburn Flood Prevention Scheme

I thought I would provide an update on the outcome of the meeting that was held on the 24th of January between; Network Rail (NR), SEPA, Aberdeenshire Council's Flood Team and myself.

NR said that they had appointed JBA as their contractor and were to have a meeting with them at the beginning of February, and that the programme for the design would begin week commencing the 5th of February, concluding at the end of March, with a design being submitted to SEPA for their approval.

From w/c 05.02 to w/e 29.03, NR/JBA are to have conversations/meetings etc with SEPA to provide them with as much preapplication info as possible to ensure that the design goes through as quickly as possible with SEPA.

The meeting on the 24th clarified a few things that NR were not sure of with SEPA so it was also productive from that point of view. I pressed on the timeline as SEPA have a statutory duty to process applications within four months. This would mean the end of July, and NR had indicated the end of June. SEPA are confident that if NR provide the info required pre-application, then the three months, or quicker is achievable.

I pressed NR on when their contractor would be able to mobilise on site as these works are urgently required and we must take advantage of the summer weather window. This was to be discussed when they met at the start of February.

The funding that is required for the project is part in place. Essentially the council will be funding the design, as long as it leads to the project being implemented, and NR are funding the works leading up to this point. Transport Scotland (TS) will be required to fund the building of the scheme and NR are working on this just now.

I pressed NR on the funding and TS commitment to the construction and they said that the project had been flagged many times to TS, they were aware that it had to be built this year, that there is effectively a budget line for it, but they need the details of how much etc. NR said that they had "no

reason to believe that TS won't fund it."

I have asked how long it will take to construct, but NR didn't know and were to ask JBA at their meeting at the start of February.

I emailed NR on the 5th of February to see how the meeting went with JBA, and to confirm that the design stage had started with their contractor, and I will continue to press as best I can as timelines need to be adhered to.

#### **Drains – the Square**

A constituent contacted myself with detailed concerns about the drains around the Square area of Kintore saying, "the whole network, particularly around the Square (low lying) needs attention."

I passed all the information on to officers and asked them to investigate, to which they replied:

"Thank you for your email. I can see we have a defect for the drainage system at The Square for inspecting the flooding issues, however it is rated as a 'Monitor' defect. Considering the comments made by your constituents I will notify this to local colleagues so they can look into this further and may ask drainage colleagues to visit the area sooner than their usual routine clearing. It may just be that the drains are reaching capacity due to the extreme amounts of rain but we will investigate."

They followed this up shortly with:

"Local colleagues have informed me that they will send out an inspector to this area to perform a fresh site visit to the drains here and will raise any additional defects they can find."

I hope that this will result in the drains being returned to their normal function.

# KINTORE COUNCILLOR REPORT - Jim Gifford

Thank you for the opportunity to contribute to this edition of the Kintore Konnect.

As I type this, we are already well into February of yet another new year but sadly 2024 looks like having just as many, if not more, of the challenges we have all had to deal with over many previous years – not least the effects of the weather!

#### Local development Plan

Previously, I have mentioned that the new Local Development Plan (LDP) is now in place for Aberdeenshire Aberdeenshire Local Development Plan 2023 - Aberdeenshire Council and highlighted the opportunities for individuals, groups and communities to contribute to the process of developing the next LDP - a five-year process that starts as soon as the current plan is signed off.

Another element of community input to local planning are the relatively new processes of Local Place Plans (LPPs).

LPPs are a new right for communities to produce their own plans as part of the planning system. They contain the community's proposals for the development and use of land and provide a new opportunity for communities to feed into the planning system with their own ideas and proposals. The aim of the provision is to significantly enhance engagement in development planning and effectively empower communities to play a proactive role in defining the future of their places. Communities can bring forward their own proposals and suggestions for the development and use of land that reflect national and local outcomes.

The LPPs that are currently being developed are generally being taken forward by community councils but other groups can also take the lead and work up a LPP for their area.

#### **Energy Projects around Kintore**

On the topic of planning, many people have been raising issues and concerns around the number of energy-related projects that are around or are planned to be around Kintore – especially around Leylodge. There at least 11 not counting the proposed pylons and cables for the proposed Peterhead to Tealing grid upgrade.

I have raised this issue with planning officers at Garioch Area Committee (GAC) and at the Infrastructure Services Committee (ISC).

Kintore is a particular hot-spot but renewable energy projects are appearing all over Aberdeenshire – onshore and offshore. I have asked for, and been promised, a comprehensive briefing on how the council is dealing with these applications and especially on the cumulative impact of developments on people and our communities.

#### **Financial Challenges**

By the time you are reading this, the council will have set its budget for 2024-25 including the Council Tax for next year. This is the 16th budget process that I have been involved in and it has been by far the most difficult and challenging.

Years of under-funding are really catching up on all of our council services which has been accelerated and exacerbated by the continuing aftermath of all things Covid, the high rate of inflation, supply chain volatility and increased interest rates that have affected all of us for the last few years.

The cost of living affects councils just as much as individuals and we are only too painfully aware that decisions that we make to get the numbers in our budget to stack up directly affect many people who depend on the many services that the council provide or pay others to deliver on our behalf.

To get the budget to balance – as we must do – we will have had to make a raft of the least-worst choices from a list of unpalatable options.

Having set the budget, we must then ensure that, as far as that is possible, our residents and communities are supported through the coming months while we hope for better times to come.

#### KINTORE'S AED NETWORK

KDCC continue to promote the Defibrillator Circuit part of the British Heart Foundation. If you have an AED that you'd like to add to the support network of AED around Kintore, (See below link).

https://www.defibfinder.uk/ Defib Finder Web App.

The Circuit is where public access defibrillators get registered, and they've launched an app where you can find the nearest registered public access defibrillators to you, as well as showing you the times it is accessible and directions to it. The ambulance service tie into this system to help direct the public to the nearest AED.

Anyone can also use this app to determine the nearest public AED anywhere in the UK.

It also lets you know immediately which are available, and which aren't.

Unfortunately, it also painfully highlighted looking at the app, the number of unavailable AEDs currently within and around Kintore.

There are numerous AEDs located around Kintore which could be registered with the circuit, providing a faster response time during a cardiac event. Unfortunately, AEDs unknown to the Scottish Ambulance Service could mean vital time being lost accessing an AED further down the road that is known.

KDCC kindly ask, that you only access the AED informed by the Scottish Ambulance at the time of an emergency, as accessing another unit will remove two AEDs from the register. The AED informed by the Scottish Ambulance and the unknown AED which has also been removed. This could result in another AED being assigned in an emergency when it's not actually available.

If you're a local business located in or around Kintore, please register your AED with the circuit https://www.thecircuit.uk/ and help grow our public AED network within Kintore. Knowing where to find the nearest public defibrillator could save a life.

### KINTORE CHURCH

#### The Old, Old Story

Tell me the story slowly, That I may take it in—That wonderful redemption, God's remedy for sin; Tell me the story often, For I forget so soon. - Kate Hankey

As I write this season's reflection (in February), in the supermarkets Easter Eggs are wrestling for shelf-space with Valentine's Day chocolates. Soon our church buildings will pass through the Lenten spring-clean so that they're ready for fresh flowers and bright ornaments to welcome the dazzling light of Easter Morning. And we'll tell again the "Old, Old Story" of Jesus' Resurrection. Except that we won't

Instead, we tend to tell cleaned-up stories of Jesus at Easter. Laced in high theology of the wonder of Resurrection we usually try to emphasize the transition from earth to heaven. "If Jesus could make it out alive and become good enough for heaven – you can too!" we seem to say. Depictions of the Resurrected Jesus in art show him aglow with holiness and perfection. We want him to look impressive. It's also the picture we imagine of what we should be like once we are saved / redeemed / become Christian / heaven-bound. It's funny though, because the Bible tells us that Mary, the one person who actually did see him at his Resurrection, mistook Jesus for the gardener. No disrespect to gardeners, but most gardeners are not resplendent in white robes, attended by hosts of angels. Maybe she mistook him for the gardener because he was still covered in the dirt from his own tomb.

Lutheran pastor, Nadia Bolz-Weber points out that the Easter story is not about Jesus becoming impressive and shiny, but about him becoming new. Similarly, the Good News of the Resurrection is not about us being made nicer, but about us becoming new. And, as anyone who has ever held a newborn baby knows, "new" is often messy and fragile. As Bolz-Weber puts it:

"New looks like recovering alcoholics. New looks like reconciliation between two family members - neither of which actually deserve it. New looks like every time I manage to admit I was wrong and every time I manage to not mention when I'm right. New looks like every fresh start and every act of forgiveness and every moment of

letting go of what we thought we couldn't live without and then somehow living without it anyway. New is the thing you never saw coming ...never even hoped for, but ends up being what you needed all along and it happens to all of us. Because God simply keeps reaching down into the dirt of humanity and pulling us out of the graves we dig for ourselves through our violence, our lies, our selfishness, our arrogance, and our addictions. And God keeps loving us back to life over and over."

I hope that this year you will take the time to hear or read again the old, old story of God's love in Jesus. And, messy as it may be, I wish you the blessing of a new beginning – however you may be longing for it.

# KINTORE'S UNSUNG HERO

### Meet Ken McEwen



#### Do you originally come from Kintore

No, my father moved the family from Edinburgh to Aberdeen to become a professor at the University of Aberdeen. Our move to Kintore came much later, in 1999.

# Can you give us a bit of background on your Career?

My career has been dominated by communications and media. I started with the P&J and Evening Express, leaving to become press officer at the City of Aberdeen, then regional business development with NESDA.

That gave me the spur to set up my own PR business which grew to be one of the leading PR companies in Scotland. I was also chair of the Aberdeen branch of the Institute of Directors and a Burgess of Guild of the City of Aberdeen.

After 24 years, with retirement looming we sold the business to AVC in 2008 and I worked solo, from home for my final years in business.

# What local Kintore Groups are you involved with now and have been involved with in the past?

When we moved to Kintore, I saw the need to raise the profile of Kintore. It was treated as part of Inverurie - a perception not helped by having "Inverurie" as part of the Royal Mail postal address.

I saw Kintore's history as one of Scotland's

oldest royal burghs, helping to overcome this "suburb" and "dormitory town" perception. Hansard confirmed we were free to continue using the historic royal burgh title. 'So I set up the Royal Burgh of Kintore (kintore.org.uk) website and, later, the related Facebook page. (I transferred ownership of the website and Facebook to Kintore and District Community Council in 2021.)

I also got involved with the first Kintore Summer Festival, an initiative also intended to strengthen the sense of community.

# Have you always been involved in the Kintore community?

Our first meeting with the Kintore and District Community Council was when it still met in the Town House in 2000. It was 2013 before I was co-opted onto Kintore and District Community Council, because Balbithan technically was not part of Kintore, as it is now.

I was elected vice-chair during Fiona Cooper's time as chair. When she, sadly, lost her battle with cancer in 2019 I took over as acting chair, until 2021.

My period in the hot seat included the Covid pandemic and I'm proud to say that - despite having to establish new remote ways to meet - we didn't miss a single meeting. It was also during this period that a consultation was held into whether Thainstone - which had been part of Kintore Parish, then Kintore District, for 300 years - should be handed over to Inverurie. At the same time the consultation asked if Balbithan should become part of Kintore. I was delighted that the public's verdict was that Thainstone should remain in Kintore. It also concluded Balbithan should become part of Kintore.

My involvement with the Action Kintore charity began with handling PR for the opening of the new building for The Bothie in 2013. Since then, I have become a Trustee with a particular interest in the plans to bring our magnificent 18th century Town House back into community use.

The sad state of the old Torryburn Hotel shows what can happen to a disused building even in a strong community like Kintore. My recurring nightmare is that something similar might happen to the Town House if it is not brought back into community use. But raising the funds and motivating volunteers needs the community to come together to make it happen.

# Would you recommend readers to get involved with the community and what would success look like for Kintore in your eyes?

Kintore is a remarkable community. You only have to look at the number of volunteers who volunteered when the community council and churches were formulating plans for Lend a Hand Kintore in response to Covid. Or, more recently, the amazing response for the Kintore Resilience Group during the October flooding. Success would be that sort of involvement and support replicated across all community activities.

#### How long have you been married?

Lesley and I got married, in her home state of California, in 1996. She loves living here and is even quite at home with the Doric dialect!

# Can you tell us a bit more about MND, your personal challenges and living with the condition?

The first sign something was wrong was when I developed a bit of a limp in 2020. After initial tests and scans, the consultant told me that he was most keen to rule out motor neurone disease. After a year of further tests and scans the news was not good. In February 2023, I was diagnosed with PLS, a variant of Motor Neurone Disease.

The late Doddie Weir said of his MND diagnosis that it: "put a wrecking ball through our dreams, our plans, our future". I now know only too well what he meant. MND is a terminal disease that interrupts the signals from the brain to the muscles, which get weaker and weaker, until they stop working. That progressively affects the limbs, speech, swallowing and, ultimately, breathing.


I am now reliant on a wheelchair, which means I have a focus on accessibility. Most recently MND has started affecting my voice, which is so frustrating for someone who has always enjoyed lively conversation.

The MND Scotland charity paid for the University of Edinburgh spin-off Speak Unique to take recordings of a radio programme I used to present and recreate my voice electronically. Trouble is I have type (or use eye gaze) to input what I want to say... by which time the conversation will have moved on!

My MND affects both of us, because Lesley finds herself being my carer and having to do the household chores we used to share. But despite all these many frustrations, laughter still dominates the soundtrack in our house.

There is, currently, no effective treatment and no cure for MND. Kevin Sinfield - who has raised an incredible £15 million with his friend and former teammate Rob Burrows - says "MND is not incurable, it's just underfunded".

# **HISTORY - COUNTESS OF KINTORE**

An Aberdeen clipper of 1866. The ship and its owners had connections to Inverurie, Kintore, Monymusk and Kinaldie, as well as to Aberdeen and New Zealand.

A three masted wooden vessel, rigged as a 'Ship' with square sails on all its masts, it had a main deck, a forecastle and a poop, with a three-quarter female figurehead on the bow.

Not 'Fittie' built, as you might expect from the builder's name, but at the William Duthie yard on the Inches in Aberdeen. It was launched into the Upper Dock on the 2 nd of March 1866. Designed as 'clipper' for fast sailing, the 182-foot vessel was built at a cost of £11,888 (£1.1m today) to carry passengers and cargo to New Zealand.



This photograph, taken at Gravesend, is held in both New Zealand and Victoria state libraries and appears to be the only image of the vessel which remains.

As with all British ships, even today, ownership of the Countess was divided into 64 shares and while John Cook, the managing agent, owned 24 of these, George Milne of Kinaldie also owned 24 and his son-in-law, the Rev. Thomas Dawson, minister at Monymusk, owned 4. The other shares were owned, 4 each, by the vessel's master and the two owners of the Shaw Savill Line, which was later to take over the famous Aberdeen White Star Line of George Thompson.



The vessel would have been named in honour of

Louisa Madelaine Hawkins, 1828 - 1916

Wife of the 8 th Earl of Kintore, but this lady did not act as the vessel's sponsor at its launch, the vessel being named by 10 year old Martha Duthie, daughter of the builder.

A month after the launch, the ship was registered at Aberdeen and in the next 13 years made 11 voyages to New Zealand and 2 to the Far East. General cargo was carried out to New Zealand, as well as hundreds of passengers. Also emigrating to New Zealand on the ship were 50 rooks, carried in 1870 and 13 live salmon in 1876. As this was before frozen cargo, return voyages carried mostly wool, but in 1869 a Griffiths safe costing £7 was installed for bullion and in 1872 this was filled with £24,500 of gold (worth £2.3m today) from Auckland to London.

Held in the collections of the Aberdeen Maritime Museum, the John Cook papers include the Countess's ledgers, a fascinating history of the commercial side of ship management in the late 19 th century. Unlike a ship's log book, which records voyage details, these books document debits and credits, including the four stage payments made to the shipbuilder as work progressed, £11.13.8 paid to a London firm for 'arms and armour' and £3.1/- to Mitchell & Muil who supplied the bread for the maiden voyage.

By 1879, iron ships were taking over the New Zealand trade and Cook auctioned off the Countess at Birkenhead, realising only £1,800 from a William Thomas of Anglesey. The vessel remained registered at Aberdeen, but now traded to the Far East carrying coal out and rice home. On its 3 rd voyage for the new owner, it sailed out to Buenos Aires with coal, then crossed the South Atlantic and Indian Oceans to Rangoon (Yangon) in what is now Myanmar, where it loaded 940 tons of bagged rice. At Rangoon fire started in the cargo and after this was extinguished, some cargo had to be unloaded and replaced before the ship sailed for home on the 26 th May 1882, reportedly, "very heavily laden".

On the 13 th August 1882, a call was made at St. Helena for stores and water and the Countess sailed on the 15 th, meeting the Earl of Dalhousie at sea on the same day. This was the last ever heard of the Countess of Kintore, which, with Captain Roberts and an English crew of 16 men, disappeared without trace. The Earl of Dalhousie encountered a severe gale on the 1 st October, suffering heavy damage, and it is thought that the Countess of Kintore may also have been caught by this gale and overwhelmed.

**John Cook & Sons, Aberdeen** were shipowners and managers and carried on in business as stevedores in Aberdeen into the late 20 th century. John Cook was married to his cousin, George Milne's oldest daughter Margaret.

**George Milne (1794 – 1871)** born at Inverury (sic), was a successful road contractor and shipowner who bought the Kinaldie estate beside Fintray and developed its agriculture. He either owned outright, or had shares in, over 20 vessels.

Mary Milne (1838 – 1926), George Milne's second daughter, was born in Ferryhill, Aberdeen, married Rev. Thomas Dawson in 1861 and they had 3 children. The witnesses at their wedding were John Cook and Robert Catto junior, both important Aberdeen shipowners. After being widowed in 1867, Mary married again in 1873 to Provost George Jamieson of Rosebank (1808 – 1893), an Aberdeen tea and wine merchant and they had a daughter. Mary inherited Rev. Dawson's shares in the Countess of Kintore at his death, but in her own right, she owned shares in the ships Beautiful Star and Lochiel.

**Thomas Henry Dawson (1824 – 1867)** was born the son of a farmer at Culsalmond and was parish minister at Monymusk. As well as the Countess of Kintore, he owned shares in the Harmonia and the Rifleman. In November 1867, Rev. Dawson received £100 dividend on his shares in the Countess for its first-year trading, a sum which must have nearly equalled his stipend as a minister.
