At our September meeting, Scotia Homes presented their findings from the Public Consultation on the Midmill proposal held earlier in the month.

The top 10 ideas/suggestions were Skatepark/BMX - 39
Tennis - 32
Playpark - 20
Additional Consultation - 14
Inadequate parking - 11
Basketball - 10
Park area too small - 10
Outdoor Gym - 9
Picnic area - 4
Support of football pitch - 3

They provided images of what the equipment in the playpark could look like keeping to a natural look using wood. Following the feedback they are having another look at the best layout inside the pavilion, not just changing rooms.

The flooding threat was quite severe on at least three occasions, particularly on Northern Road, with several homes in danger of a repeat of last November's flooding which forced them from their homes and were only able to return earlier this year.

Kintore and District Community Council were available to provide sandbags for many residents in Kintore who were in fear of water entering their homes and were part of the team manning the Public Hall for a few days during Storm Babet.

However due to the hard work of the many many volunteers who worked all night and day managing to pump water away from the homes in danger, those houses did not flood. The residents of these properties are immensely grateful for all your efforts. We cannot thank enough the very many volunteers who manned the pumps and others who monitored the water levels at various at-risk points throughout the town. We must also say a massive thanks to Allan and Aty Miller who worked tirelessly overnight pumping water into a huge tanker approximately 200,000 litres were removed in total, lain Campbell for his work with his famous snow blower on Kingsfield Road and Roy Leith who assisted by pumping water with his tractor and tanker.

Thanks must also go to local businesses, the Co-op and Dossetts butchers for providing food and Kinellar Plant Hire for supplying extra pumps. We also appreciate the support from staff at the Council who manned the Hall, day and night during Storm Babet in case people were evacuated. Kirsty and Debbie special thanks for the bacon rolls on the Sunday morning for the team who had been working overnight.

We cannot finish this piece without a special mention for Jim Reid who was the Mastermind who coordinated all the efforts, well done Jim.

Kemnay Academy Mock Interviews

Along with others, I carried out 10 mock interviews in November to help our S4 pupils at Kemnay Academy gain some valuable experience to carry forward into future 'real' interviews.

I just wanted to say how impressed I've been with these young members of our communities. They came across as; thoughtful, caring, intelligent, insightful, passionate and hard working.

This is the second time that I have done this, and in times when you hear so many negative comments about young people, I just wanted to share something positive about these youths who are a credit to themselves, their families, their school and will be great assets for our community.

Castle Hill clean up before Sunday's Armistice parade

Moira Moran, the Chair of Kintore & District Community Council, alerted me to an appeal from the organiser of November's Sunday's Armistice parade.

The post service parade was to form up on Castle Hill then march past the war memorial, along Kingsfield Road, then return to the starting point via Castle Hill. He was concerned that there was a significant quantity of wet and dirty straw lying at the bottom of Castle Hill. It had been washed through the railway underpass during the recent flooding and presented a slip/trip hazard for those taking part in the parade.

I immediately contacted the Area Manager at Gordon House and asked if the Waste department could treat this matter as urgent and have it cleared before Sunday.

I had an almost immediate response saying that Waste had advised that they will get street cleaning onto it the next day as a priority.

I would just like to pass my thanks onto the council for their quick response.

Kintore School Flashing Signs

I noticed when the schools returned after the tattie holidays, that one of the part-time 20mph flashing signs was operating at the wrong time, probably as a result of the clock changes on the Sunday.

I reported it and asked for it to be resolved asap and am pleased to say that it was reset very quickly.

Overgrown Vegetation

I am pleased to say that, following letters from myself to Malcolm Allan and Scotia Homes concerning overgrown vegetation from their private land onto public footways, both have sent maintenance teams out and dealt with it. I have written to Stewart Milne Homes, re the land that they own at Lochburn Drive. It had been so badly overgrown that a frustrated member of the public actually cut it back. I have requested that they commit to regularly maintaining the area that they own as such overgrowths are an obstacle for pedestrians, especially those with a disability.

Gauchhill Cottages, Kintore - Pot Holes and Road Adoption - Success

A constituent who resides at a property at Gauchhill Cottages, Kintore wrote to me in June to say that he had been complaining about the potholes in his road for quite sometime, but getting nowhere. In an unusual twist, the road is unadopted by the Roads dept, and is actually the responsibility of the Housing dept as the cottages used to be council properties.

After many emails to Housing and Roads, I am now pleased to say that the following has been agreed:

Housing have a work plan now to meet the expenditure of bringing this road up to adoptable standards this financial year (2023/24). Roads are reviewing the Bill of Quantities for the adoption of this road and progressing to have tender documents prepared.

Although the exact timescale is not yet available, the potholes should be filled as an interim response to my constituent's complaint.

Flooding

I would like to thank Kintore & District Community Council for organising the Kintore Resilience Group and to all the volunteers who helped out repeatedly during the recent storms.

This certainly is a community to be proud of.

Carole Allan, Kintore's Post Mistress

Earlier this week I grabbed the opportunity to interview our very own Kintore Post Mistress Carole Allan before she hangs up her Post Office keys for the very last time. With everything going according to plan, the new owners will take over by early 2024 nearly 17 years after Carole opened up for the very first time.



Have you always worked for the Post Office?

I was born in Turriff then moved to Crimond in my formative years and educated at Fraserburgh Academy. Due to my love of working with numbers I left school after accepting a career opportunity at the Clydesdale Bank in Woodside, Aberdeen. After having a break to have family, I returned to the bank before moving to Johnston Carmichael then onto Simmers Ardmedden Farms as a bookkeeper. The opportunity to run a Post Office came up so I grabbed it with both hands. Not only running Kintore Post Office but also Oldmeldrum PO up to 2016 which was also an outreach position (mobile PO) for Longside, Stuartfield and Auchnagatt and a partner to Methlick, so as you can imagine a busy old time.

What do you like best about your job?

I love numbers and love people. There is no better feeling than getting the books to balance on a daily, weekly and monthly basis or helping a customer with the reward of a wee smile or a big thank you. I'm so lucky in Kintore to have such lovely loyal customers, and this customer base is now growing since the main Post Offices in Inverurie and Blackburn have closed. I feel that as Post Mistress it's my duty to help protect my customers against the ever-increasing risk of scams and fraud and making it easier for older clients just by offering an ear or a wee bit of useful advice.

You mentioned you had a break in your career to have family?

Yes, I have three daughters and 4 Grandkids two boys and two girls aged from 14, 9, 9 and 6 and despite not all of them living locally we make a point of meeting weekly normally at a weekend with me feeding them.

Am I right in saying you also ran the Crafty Café next door?

That's right it was a joint venture with local resident and Councillor Glen Reid and I loved every minute of the 3 years we owned it, only selling up after the sudden death of my husband. It's a very rewarding business however be warned for anyone starting up in the food industry, it's very very hard work.

It must have been a really tough time when you lost your husband Arthur?

It was the suddenness of it. Arthur had hardly ever been to the doctor in his life however, he died of a heart attack in front of me without any sign or warnings of that happening. We had been together for almost 40 years, and he was my soul mate so losing him was life-changing. What kept me going was my family, my friends, my staff and my customers. Everyone was so lovely and was exactly the type of support I needed at the time.

So what's your plans for the future?

My plan is to have a very active retirement. I absolutely love dancing and am already heavily involved with a local Line Dancing club and a Ceros Dancing Club, it keeps me active and fit and is a fantastic social event too. So more dancing along with seeing a bit more of the world, with trips to Barcelona lined up and other trips already at planning stage. With 4 grandkids, there will be the obvious 'Grandma' duties to keep me busy including babysitting but I would also love to keep involved with the Community through Voluntary Work, whatever that may look like. But one thing I know, I can't just sit still.

What will you miss most about Kintore, the Community, and the Post Office?

I've been very lucky in businesses with attracting the absolutely best people to work alongside and this will be a massive miss. To mention only a few, Eddie who looks after the retail shop side is an absolute star as was Linda Morrison who always kept me right and my former co -partners at Kintore Hazel and Janette. Kintore is such a lovely place the Community spirit is like no other place and all my customers I treat as friends and I will miss this daily contact with these lovely people of Kintore. The only thing I feel is that Kintore doesn't have enough facilities and always seem to miss out on opportunities. Despite not staying in Kintore I feel a massive part of the community and feel that Kintore deserves better.

Thank you Carole, I'm sure the whole of Kintore will join me in wishing you a long, happy and healthy retirement.

A FORGOTTEN HERO

With millions of War and Victory Medals struck, there's nothing new in World War One medals coming to light today, but some have a story behind them and the pair issued to William James Carnie recalled one Kintore local hero, what he did and what he wrote.

"Willum", as he was known in the family, didn't want to be at war and his messages record him wishing to be back on the 76-acre family farm at Broomhill, showing how ditches should be dug, "He says the drainer has not been altogether a success, but I think if this confounded war was finished. I'll beat the lot of them with a spade".



He also wrote from Dorset about tractors, "I am doubtful about good bits of ground on Broomhill. I wouldn't be afraid of one working here, for the ground is as soft and there isn't a stone to be found. I've been digging a lot of holes here". Advice was also offered on the setting of an engine which they had on the farm, showing that he shared the mechanical skills which many of the Carnies displayed.



Volunteering in 1915 aged 19, he was mustered as a private into the Machine Gun Corps, which had been founded in the October of that year. He served in France and Flanders under this posting and was then transferred to the newly formed Tank Corps. In July 1917, he was at Bovington Camp, today the home of the Tank Museum, training to operate the "busses", his description of the new development in mechanical warfare, the tank.

One postcard, a view of Lulworth Cove, gives an insight into the training and shows that nothing changes in the Army. He was training to be a driver, but despite this, he wrote, "We arrived here after 2 hours sweating with full pack. Has my boots arrived?" Presumably after marching from Bovington to Lulworth. Did the second comment mean that this the same situation as happened during more recent wars, when British soldiers had to buy their own boots to keep their feet dry?

Another postcard has five views of Wool, the village beside Bovington and when I visited the area in 2007, I was able to identify four of these scenes. They had changed, but William would still have been able to recognise the places, even after a lapse of 90 years, surely the result he was fighting for. On the card he records that, "There is something in the wind right enough", a bit prophetic in view of what was to come.

In August 1918, he was in France and writing to his brother John, who was with the Royal Flying Corps in Egypt. "We only have another day or two to go now. We've been training for new busses and guns", but by the time John received the letter, Willum would already be dead.

The "new busses" were Whippet medium tanks. Weighing in at 15.7 tons, they were driven by two petrol engines, one for each track, and could reach 9 miles per hour. They were armed with Hotchkiss 0.303" machine guns in 4 mountings which allowed 3600 cover. The crew, consisting of Lieutenant Arnold, Gunner Ribbans and Driver Carnie, had unofficially named their tank "Musical Box", a name which is still remembered today in the history of tank warfare.

At 4.20 a.m. on the 8th August 1918 the Battle of Amiens opened and the 6th Tank Battalion, including Musical Box, were deployed in support of Australian and Canadian troops. They were to advance east over open country, cross a railway line and pass through the village of Villiers-Bretonneux.

After breaking through the German lines, "Musical Box" became detached from other tanks and infantry early in the advance and Lt. Arnold decided to act independently and harass any enemy he happened to find. In a B.B.C. broadcast in 1940, Lieutenant, now Colonel, Arnold, said, "I was young and it was very exciting, so we just kept following our targets. Really, we just went off to have a row with the Germans". There are many items about the action on the internet and it has since been described as "the greatest mechanical cavalry charge of the war".

Musical Box was eventually knocked out and while Arnold and Ribbans survived to be taken prisoner, William Carnie was shot and died. His body was never recovered and he is remembered on the monument at Vis-En-Artois. This memorial carries the names of over 9,000 British, Irish and South African men killed in this area between the 8th August 1918 and the Armistice and who have no known grave.

After the War, the Carnie family commemorated William with the annual award of a silver and enamel medal to the dux of Kintore Higher Grade Public School. The last medal was awarded in 1953, after which the prize became books and was later discontinued as the fund became exhausted.

The Carnie family are proud that William's medals and messages have been accepted by the Tank Museum for their permanent display and hope that all those from Kintore who suffered in World War One may be remembered.



Except that the questions raised by Remembrance Day are answered on Christmas morning. How will we end the bloodshed? How will we honour the memory and sacrifice of those who fought? Where will we find the peace for which they died? The answer lies in a manger in Bethlehem. For in Christ God was reconciling all things, making peace by the blood of his cross.

Our fallible human condition puts us at enmity with God, ourselves, others and nature. Hidden from God we despise ourselves, fear the "other" and abuse creation. Yet we were made for peace. So God makes the first move by sending Jesus, the Prince of Peace, to call us back to God's love, in hope that the love will spread.

Ok, let's be honest, it's a long, long way from individual inner-peace to peace in the Middle East. But peace must start somewhere and God started by making peace with us through Jesus – seeking reconciliation with us when we were the "other". This Christmas will you join the movement? Will you spread the love?

October 24th is when we celebrate End Polio Now, one of Rotary International's long standing causes, since 1988 we have seen a reduction of 99.9%, with a reported 10 cases this year it's ever closer to being eradicated. This is a cause we annually support throughout fundraising, to celebrate we light up the Kintore Church purple each year, as can be seen in the picture.



As we come up to the festive season, we will be launching our funds4U campaign, we welcome applications from any community groups in our areas, Kintore as well as Kemnay and Blackburn, and we will support up to £500 for qualifying applications, ask or look out for our Facebook posts on this. We made several contributions last year, one being the Kintore Scouts, where we funded the purchase of tents. 
