# **Kintore and the Community**

# **Lungworm - An emerging disease**

Lungworm is an emerging potentially lethal disease – more and more cases are seen each year. There has been a lot of coverage about this disease in the doggy press, so here is an update.

Snug and snails are the problem here. To the gardeners out there, they are a nuisance; to the Host, they are a plague; but to the dog, they can pose a health risk because they act as a carrier of one of the most serious types of worms that he or she can catch. The worm is called Angiostrongylus Vasorum – or the lungworm. It affects dogs and foxes, and has slowly moved up from France and around Europe into southern England via the fox population. Thankfully our cold climate has slowed the spread of the parasite north of the border, and there have been only a handful of suspected cases in Scotland thus far – there have to be some benefits to the weather!

Awareness is key with lungworm. It is an emerging disease, and there are likely to be more cases in the future, but if vets and dog owners are aware of the signs, we stand a good chance of effectively preventing infection. The dog can become infected by the larvae of the worm by accidentally (or deliberately, in some cases) eating slugs or snails. They can also become infected by snail trails including, for example trails over their favourite outside toy.

Now for the gory bit, skip this paragraph if you are eating breakfast while reading the paper! The life cycle of this parasite takes place partly inside the dog (the host) and partly inside the snail or slug (the intermediate host). An infected dog or fox will have adult worms living in the lungs and blood vessels. These lay eggs. The eggs are coughed up and swallowed by the dog, and then passed out in the faeces. They are then eaten by the slug or snail, which completes the cycle of infestation when eaten by another dog or fox.

The symptoms vary and can sometimes be difficult to pick up. The worms may affect the lungs and cause coughing or breathlessness on exercise. Sufferers can also develop clotting disorders can be serious and show themselves as pinprick blood blisters (or haemorrhages) on the tummy.

Diagnosis is difficult but a combination of tests can sometimes give us the answer, e.g. physical examinations, x-rays, blood tests and faecal tests (to identify the larvae).

#### **Treatment**

The good news is the treatment is available and if caught early we can get rid of the worm before too much damage has been done. However dogs with more serious symptoms will need hospitalisation often in intensive care with blood transfusions and other drugs.

#### **Prevention**

The best way to prevent the problem is to consult your Vet for the best parasite prevention program. Regular worming, as usual, is a must. In general, products that you can buy 'over the counter' from a pet shop or supermarket wont have any effect against lungworm. Try to stop your dog eating slugs and snails if possible. Pick up your dogs faeces and dispose of them properly (so they are not spreading lungworm and other worms to dogs and humans).



Coming full circle, awareness is key. If your dog is a snail eater and you are worried that he or she has symptoms that could represent lungworm, do contact your vet as soon as possible.

# **Aberdeenshire Councillor's Report**

#### Councillor Glen Reid

#### Kintore Flooding - Northern Road Improvement/Solution

I have been working with our senior flood engineer for the last couple of years on the issue of the Lochburn. He thinks there is a solution or an improvement at least to the current situation. It involves the culverts at the railway line and requires the permission of Network Rail.

It has been extremely problematic getting Network Rail to come to the table and authorise works. However, after I applied pressure to their senior management last year, their project team did begin meetings with Aberdeenshire Councils Flood Team. I initially sat in on these meetings, but as they are operational matters, I left it to the two teams to progress. However, in October, when I heard there was to be bad weather, I chased it up to find that our team had made little progress with Network Rail.

I immediately wrote to the senior management at Network Rail and asked for another meeting asap to iron out any issues and progress this so that some improvement can be found for the residents affected on Northern Road. That meeting took place in mid-December and I insisted on being present to push things forward.

In advance of the meeting, I wrote to Network Rails senior communication manager, whom I had been dealing with and who had been the most effective person at pushing the project team into action and, with permission, shared affected residents stories to humanise this situation. It worked and elicited his commitment to, "push for progress."

I also wrote to Richard Thomson MP, gave him a full brief on the situation and timescales so far. I thought that it might add extra pressure if he became involved and he wrote to Network Rail.

I attended the meeting with our senior flood engineer and three members of the Network Rail team and it was productive. Our engineer and I both spoke at length, outlining the situation from an engineers perspective and from the affected Kintore residents perspective.

Network Rail first and foremost apologised for the delay and length of time that it has taken to get to this point. They agreed that action must be taken as soon as is practically possible.

Network Rail agreed to procure an Options Study via a framework contractor to assess the best option for intervention at the railway culverts. This work, including surveys, was anticipated to take approximately three months to conclude and should provide an approved solution. It is currently on going and near completetion.

We have arranged a follow up meeting for early March where Network Rail will provide Aberdeenshire Council with an update on the progress of the Options Study.

Network Rail have agreed to increase their funding contribution to undertake the Options Study and contribute towards a solution over this and the next financial year.

In brief, Network Rail's options survey will be concluded by mid-March. They will then meet and brief Aberdeenshire Council, before then making it publicly available. After the study is concluded, the solution will be costed, and if it is within budget then implementation will be progressed.

I know that there is a question mark over the budget/cost, but I'm sure you will understand that until it is costed, nothing can be committed to. However, both Aberdeenshire Council and Network Rail were positive about this progressing. The initial survey cost, which Network Rail had mentioned at the last meeting, has been reduced by over 50%.

Although I cannot guarantee anything, this is the biggest step forward, and the most positive that I have felt re this horrendous situation, since I began campaigning for a solution over two years ago. #### New Zebra Crossing - Gauchhill Road

These hard won works were due to be completed by the end of this financial year and therefore I have been chasing this for some time. However, I received this response from the Head of Roads in Garioch:

"I was at a project update meeting today, as related to various Capital projects and it was confirmed that they are almost at the stage of issuing a contract to take this work at Gauchhill Road, forward.

There were issues with relocating the nearby bus stops and underground utility apparatus, but they appear to have these now resolved.

I can't see the work, which will be going to external contract, being completed this financial year now but would hope that it will progress from April/May time."

I have continued to push on this, and in my discussions with the service, it has been clarified that the project may take 12 weeks from the contract issue. Materials may take 6-8 weeks and construction 3-4 weeks. I therefore asked that the contract be issued before 26.05 so that, at the very worst, it will be finished by Friday 18.08 before the children return to school the following week.

My pressure seems to be working as I have recently been informed that it is anticipated that the council will go out to tender in mid March, with a contract award mid April and that construction should take place in June/July.

#### **Kemnay Academy Bus Park and PROPOSED Extension**

Earlier this month, a project to provide Kemnay Academy with a much needed bus park was approved by the Garioch Area Committee.

As well as a bus park providing 16 bays, space will create for a drop off and pick up facility. Kemnay Academy has 70% of its pupils using some form of school transport, the second highest in Aberdeenshire, and buses currently have to use limited layby space on Bremner Way.

However, as many of you will be aware, Kemnay Academy has consistently been over capacity and I have argued repeatedly that action needs to be taken to address this situation. Education officers agree and plans for an extension have been drawn up.

Currently, there is no identified budget for this extension (details below) that Education officers, pupils, parents and the community know is needed. I am in opposition and am doing my best to argue for it's inclusion in the capital plan.

# **Aberdeenshire Councillor's Report**

#### Kemnay Academy Bus Park and PROPOSED Extension - cont.

I have asked that the Administration councillors (Tory/Lib Dem and Independents) who represent this area, go to their groups and argue the case for this vital extension.

Money was found for new academies in Ellon (£36 million, 2015) and Inverurie (£55 million, 2020) and there is a new academy planned for Peterhead.

This project will be expensive, but it is an extension, not a new build

It is urgently required and in it's entirety.

It is time that this was delivered for Kemnay, Kintore and Blackburn.

The background and proposals are below:

Last year, Education officers presented plans for a new extension to address the issues of over capacity and 'temporary' accommodation. I was quite frustrated that these plans were not advanced last year, but earlier this month, officers firmed up their proposed plans to extend the academy.

#### Their rationale is that:

- Permanent accommodation is required to replace non-linked accommodation.
- Enable an increase in published capacity.
- Accommodate rising roll within future accommodation.
- Support fluctuations in pupil subject choice by offering increase in flexible accommodation.
- Refurbish Practical subject areas to improve Suitability Core Fact Assessment.
- Increase accommodation in practical areas in line with curriculum demands and anticipated school roll.
- Improved collaboration opportunities between school based partners and organisations in fit for purpose facilities.
- Align academy accommodation to Learning Estates Strategy principles and secondary school brief

The scope of the proposed extension/project is:

- Replace the non-linked accommodation with a permanent structure which includes sufficient general teaching classrooms supporting future growth at the academy.
- Increase in practical subject spaces in areas of Drama, HE and Technical, including learning spaces to support the delivery of Foundation Apprenticeships.
- Collaborative spaces for school partner agencies are also required to enhance the support offered to young people.
- Creation of a bus park.

#### The project would deliver:

- Additional an additional Drama Studio and Wood Workshop
- Replacement of all temporary accommodation
- Increase in classrooms/learning plaza
- Art department storage
- Partner collaboration space
- Catering and dining considerations
- Bus Park

Total Non - Practical - 41\*
\*includes 10 classrooms within non-linked accommodation

Kemnay Academy Future Accommodation: Total Practical - 29 Total Non - Practical - 45 The published capacity is 730 and the current working capacity is 980, however this would be increased to a target capacity of 1200.

#### Report from Cllr. Jim Gifford

Thank you for the opportunity to contribute to this edition of Kintore Konnect.

It is hard to believe that by the time you are reading this, it will be getting on for a year since the council elections in May 2022. So much has happened in that time locally, nationally and internationally.

Since the election, I have enjoyed getting to know the Garioch Area in more detail and trying to understand the particular challenges in every part of the area and I am enjoying working with our local communities on issues that most directly affect then – and that of course includes Kintore and the surrounding area.

At the beginning of February, we finally got the new Local development Plan 2023 (LDP) signed off by the Scottish Government. As you will be aware, this is the masterplan for the whole of Aberdeenshire for the next five years and details for this area – and the whole of Aberdeenshire – can be seen under planning on the council website at Aberdeenshire Local Development Plan 2023 - Aberdeenshire Council.

As usual, the ink is barely dry on this new LDP when the process for creating the next one starts. This is the opportunity for every resident, business and community in Aberdeenshire to try and shape what they want their area to look like in the future. There will be many opportunities to participate in the various consultations so watch out for those being advertised over the coming months and years.

Also by the time this is being read, the council will have set its budget for 2023-24 including the Council Tax for next year. This is the 15th budget process that I have been involved in and it has been by far the most difficult and challenging.

Years of under-funding are really catching up on all of our council services which has been accelerated and exacerbated by the aftermath of all things Covid, the high rate of inflation and increasing interest rates that have affected all of us.


The cost of living affects councils as much as individuals and we are only too painfully aware that decisions that we make to get the numbers in our budget to stack up directly affect many people who depend on the many services that the council provide or pay others to deliver on our behalf.



The ministers meet regularly to share ideas and support; the congregations meet to share worship in one place whenever there is a 5th Sunday in a month; the ministers and congregations shared resources during the Covid lockdowns; and the congregation of Blairdaff & Chapel of Garioch has been cared for by the ministers of the other congregations while they have been without a minister.

With changing patterns of ministry and drops in staffing levels across the Church of Scotland, this grouping of churches will experience a reduction of ministry positions to just  $2\frac{1}{2}$  (2 ministers and 1 half-time assistant) over the coming years. This will take effect as ministers retire or leave and are not replaced

The Ministers and Elders of our congregations have been meeting together over the past two years to consider a way forward that will ensure we continue to deliver meaningful, mission-driven ministry to all the Congregations and Parishes in our area. We are confident that by working together as one united congregation, led by a united Kirk Session with a team of ministers, we will be able to sustain and grow mission and ministry across this large new parish for the foreseeable future.

All of the participating Kirk Sessions (church councils) have voted in favour of the union and it is part of the future mission plan of the Presbytery (regional church council). The next step in the process is for the members of each congregation in the grouping to approve the union.

This will take the form of a proposal at a congregational meeting. If all congregations approve the union, we will proceed to union at the start of September this year.

At the Stated Annual Meeting of our congregation to be held directly after 10am worship on Sunday, 23rd of April, 2023, in Kintore Church, our congregation will be asked to vote on the proposed Basis of Union with the five other churches to form the Bennachie Parish Church of Scotland, and to vote on the accompanying Basis of Team Ministry which will establish a team of ministers to serve the new parish.

If you are a member of the Parish Church, I would encourage you to be with us for the vote, and if you are not a member, I would ask that you pray for us as we discern God's will for this next step in our journey.

#### Meet Emma Davies of 'Sustainable Kintore'

Originally from Edinburgh
Emma moved to the Aberdeen
area to further her education at
Aberdeen University,
eventually settling here in
Kintore about 8 years ago with
husband Paul. Mum to Joshua
6 and Ethan 3, she is the
founder of 'Sustainable
Kintore'.



#### What is 'Sustainable Kintore' and how did it start?

Sustainable Kintore is a small group of locals who want to make a difference in Kintore and the wider community by raising awareness of the Global Climate Emergency at a local level and work to improve our natural environment in Kintore. As well as running our own events, we are trying to support other community groups to think about sustainability and make positive changes.

We started up about 2 years ago following a fundraising litter pick for Tearfund, organised by Kintore Parish Church. We now have 7 locals who meet every 6 weeks as a Steering Group to discuss & organise events. We are all Christians and motivated by what the Bible teaches us; to look after the world and to act justly. We have about 20 other super volunteers who help out at events and provide advice.

## Can you describe what type of events you organise & encourage locally?

Over the last couple of years we have organised a number of successful events. Last year we organised a Plant & Produce Stall, where we encouraged those who are lucky enough to be able to grow excess plants & produce in their garden to display these. Where money is raised this is donated to the likes of Christian Aid however we do encourage the exchange of goods for other goods, like a 'barter system' of old. We have received some very positive feedback and would like to see this event grow again this year.

At Sustainable Kintore we have a firm belief in the local circular economy and have also come up with some really creative ideas for reusing & upcycling household goods that would normally find their way to landfill. For example, we have previously organised book swaps, a warm clothes bank and a Summer recycled sculpture trail.

#### What are the wider objectives for 'Sustainable Kintore'?

Our priorities for this year are around the use of land/ greenspace in Kintore and reducing waste and litter. We already have litterpicker stations around Kintore and a seed/ plant swap box, which anyone can use. We often attend Kintore & District Community Council meetings to find out first hand what local planning is being discussed and if we can encourage house builders to become moreenvironmentally friendly and aware of the benefits of wider & better use of greenspace and areas where bugs & wildlife can be encouraged to live alongside the developments.

In the coming year, we hope to work more closely with Aberdeenshire Council and improve the biodiversity of some council owned land around Kintore. We also want to help make our local areas cleaner & tidier by helping organise Community litter picks etc.


#### Do you think you are making a difference?

# **How did Kintore earn its Royal status?**

More than a thousand years ago Kintore was declared one of Scotland's first Royal Burghs. Just how did a small village in rural Aberdeenshire come to be granted this exalted status?

The snappily-titled book "The Early History of Kintore: Extracted from Old Records and Charters" explains: "The Burgh (Kintore) is of very ancient date, claiming its original charter from King Kenneth II of Scotland, whose reign commenced about 834 and terminated A.D. 854."

Perhaps it is not surprising that there is some uncertainty about the details of events more than a thousand years ago. While "The Early History of Kintore" states that it was King Kenneth II who granted Royal Burgh status on our town, some histories say that Kintore was granted its royal status in the 9th century.

This could be due to uncertainty whether the Royal Burgh status was conferred by the first King Kenneth, Kenneth Macalpin or King Kenneth II. It doesn't help that Royal Burgh status, at this time, was not accompanied by a charter. The royal declaration was enough.

## But how did Kintore, relatively remote from the centre of royal life come to be granted royal status?

At the time, the Danes were invading Scotland and Kintore seems to have seen quite a bit of action.

The Danes crop up in two places in Kintore. One is the Dane's Burn which runs down to the Don from Balbithan. Apparently there was another battle with the Danes on this site, and again the Scots won. The name became the Danesy Burn and is now on the Ordnance Survey maps as the Densy Burn.

At Thainstone in Kintore is Camiestone (or Camus Stone) where tradition says that the Danish commander fell and was buried.

But the biggest battle seems to have been on Tuach Hill (shown below), where the invading Danes faced the Scottish army.



The citizens of Kintore are said to have ingeniously come to the aid of the king's army. They tied oak branches to the horns of their cattle and drove them at the Danish lines, turning the tide of the battle.

A grateful King Kenneth declared Kintore as one of the very first royal burghs.

As 'The Early History of Kintore' puts it: "Tradition says that in commemoration of a signal victory gained by that monarch over his enemies and that for the good services of the villagers turning out en masse, with their cattle covered with with oak branches, who made so formidable an appearance that a complete victory was obtained; and that for their good services the King granted them Royal Privileges."

The rout of the Danes is celebrated on the Royal Burgh of Kintore Coat of Arms. It has a shield, an oak tree and two horned bulls, with oak leaves, holding the shield.

Perhaps because of its royal connections, Kintore seems to have enjoyed an elevated status through much of its history.

The kings and queens of Scotland became frequent visitors to Hallforest Castle, which was built, possibly by King Robert the Bruce, as a hunting lodge in the royal forest.

Kintore's Royal Burgh status was renewed by King James IV in 1506 and this time there was a charter.

The official status of Royal Burghs ended in 1974 with local government reorganisation and the disbandment of town councils. But, the good news is that it is recorded in Hansard that Royal Burghs, like Kintore, can continue to use the Royal Burgh title.

With so much history attached to it, why would we not want to remain "The Royal Burgh of Kintore"?
