New March Classes Filling Fast: The new session for beginning and intermediate obedience starts the week of March 14, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Remember that week #1 of beginning is without dogs. Intermediate includes dogs on first class. Trainers will send out welcome letters this week.

OCSDC also offers specialty classes.

Bridging the Skills, with trainer Kathy Marmack, is designed for handlers in between beginning and intermediate.

This class will focus on polishing up the beginning foundation skills such as better heeling, attention work and control. This is a great class for dogs that have taken beginning obedience but are not yet ready for the intermediate/CGC class. Collars required, no harnesses. No Aggressive Dogs Allowed

What is CGC Urban? Urban CGC is a title in the Canine Good Citizen family of awards and titles that also include AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy, Canine Good Citizen and AKC Community Canine.

AKC Urban CGC requires that the dog demonstrate CGC skills and beyond in a setting that includes traffic, crowds, noises, smells, and other distractions that are present in a city or town. As with Canine Good Citizen, AKC Urban CGC is a 10-step test of skills that dogs must pass to earn the official AKC Urban CGC title. This is a title that appears on the dog's title record at AKC.

AKC Urban CGC is a test that demonstrates dogs are well-behaved and well-trained when in public settings. All skills are tested on leash. AKC Urban CGC should be administered in a place where there are cars, streets to be crossed, noises, elevator/public buildings, and distractions. This test is administered in the real world.

Prerequisites:

To participate in the Urban CGC (CGCU) class, dogs must meet the following two requirements:

- Must already have a Canine Good Citizen (CGC) certificate or title on record at AKC.
- Must have an AKC number of one of 3 types (AKC registration number, Purebred Alternative Listing (PAL) number, or AKC Canine Partners number). All dogs, including mixed breeds, can get an AKC number. The reason for the AKC number requirement is that this is how we create titles at AKC; we attach the titles to the dog's number.

Class Length: 4 weeks Cost: \$50 (current members only)

Class Size: Minimum of 5, maximum of 8 dogs

When: Thursdays, March 31 - April 21 (class times vary, see below)

Where: This class will meet in 4 locations to meet the requirements of the class:

• Night 1: Zoo parking lot (7:30 pm)

• Night 2: Shelter Island (7:30 pm)

• Night 3: Liberty Station (7:30 pm)

• Night 4: CGCU Evaluation- UTC shopping center (6:00 pm)

Rally Drop-in moves to Tuesdays, 7 to 8pm: The rally drop-in class is for members who have some experience in rally. A practice course includes all levels of signs, Novice through Master. Course maps are provided and questions answered. If you have issues with a particular skill, ask for help, polish your skills, and prepare for rally competition. An instructor will observe and offer suggestions. A leash is required. Positive reinforcement is acceptable (you can use food).












Temperament Testing Goes on Despite Wild Weather: The ATT tests how a dog reacts to a variety of stimuli. Desirable traits are that the dog will be emotionally stable, inquisitive, cooperative, appropriately social for its breed, biddable and demonstrates the ability to recover from a startling situation in a reasonable amount of time.

Undesirable traits are fear, shyness, lack of cooperation and an inability to recover from unfamiliar or unexpected situations. Examples of undesirable behaviors include being afraid of friendly strangers or unfamiliar stimuli, obsessive barking, and aggression.

In the ATT, dogs are tested in 6 categories of stimuli that include:

- 1. Social
- 2. Auditory
- 3. Visual
- 4. Tactile
- 5. Proprioceptive (motion)
- 6. Unexpected stimulus

Our group on Feb. 21 had to endure weird noises and surprises (umbrella opening, vacuum cleaner, man in big hat, child in a blanket, and walking on metal fencing and an air mattress. Many dogs are trained to not go on beds and thought it was a prank. After some coaching, they pranced over it.

Virtual Scent Work Test: Did you know you can earn a scent work title at home?

The Virtual Scent Work Test (VSWT) provides dogs and owners a way to engage in an activity which utilizes a dog's natural ability to detect search items from the comfort of a home environment. This test is a basic way for owners to bond with their dog or to help get started in Scent Work. Teams can work incrementally at their own pace while developing skills and confidence. When a team is ready, they can demonstrate basic competency in locating an item based on scent by taking the VSWT.

Can my dog earn a title?

Yes! The VSWT consists of three levels – Beginner (VSWB), Intermediate (VSWI) and Experienced (VSWE). Each level has its own set of testing <u>criteria</u> and titles must be earned in order. It takes two passes to earn a title at each level. **More information and guidelines here** <u>Virtual Scent Work Test</u> (VSWT) – American Kennel Club (akc.org)



Dogs show pain in ways we don't always understand. Learn the signs that indicate your dog may have pain.

Signs of pain a in dogs

- Knowing that something undefinable simply 'isn't right' with your dog.
- ✓ Depression.
- Behavioural changes your dog becoming grumpy or snappy, not wanting to be touched, not wanting to be near humans, becoming distant or disconnected, avoiding other dogs and children, not wanting to play.
- Tremors, trembling, shaking.
- Slow to get up and down from lying stiff and awkward. Often their eyes will be wide open and worried looking as they do this.
- Flickering and twitching of the skin when patting or stroking your dog.
- Warm or hot areas along the spine or anywhere on the body.
- Your dog reacts uncomfortably to being touched in certain areas.
- Sensitivity to touch and/or movement from people or other dogs (possibly also unexpected or out of character aggression).
- Not wanting to play at all (or as much as usual).
- ✓ Being stiff and slow after play and/or exercise.

- Seeming to not want to eat or drink (sometimes they will eat and drink happily if you put their bowls up on a low bench - this is because it hurts to bend their head down so far).
- Having trouble going to the toilet (which may lead to constipation and/or urinary tract infections).
- ✓ Lameness if your pet has a chronic limp and x-rays etc can't find a problem, it may be neuro-fascial pain.
- Tail held down low in an unusual position, not wagging the tail, guarding the tail from being touched.
- Not shaking from the head all the way down to the tip of the tail (this is an important one!).
- ✓ Not stretching regularly.
- Changes in posture, holding their body differently (e.g. hunched back).
- Reluctant or unable to jump on the couch/bed or into the car like they used to.
- And finally-tension in the facial muscles the 'pain grimace' this will become noticeable with moderate pain, and becomes more pronounced the worse the pain gets.

The following signs indicate a serious problem, if you see them get to a vet ASAP!



Obvious lameness or a mild lameness that lasts longer than a week.

Won't or can't get up at all.

Aggressive when you touch or try to move them. Yelping or moaning when moving or when touched.

Wobbly, weak, unable to walk properly, may fall over.

Dragging a foot or feet.

Collapse, unable to rise. Knuckling over of a foot or feet, progressing to not noticing when this is happening.

Paralysis of limbs, possibly of the whole back end.
