That we, the undersigned, all of whom are residents and citizens of the State of California, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a non-profit corporation under the laws of the State of California and we hereby set forth, declare, and certify that:

FIRST:

The name of said corporation shall be The Obedience Club of San Diego County.

SECOND:

Said corporation is organized pursuant to the General Nonprofit Corporation Law of the State of California.

THIRD:

The objects and purposes for which said corporation is formed are:

(a) To educate the public to the value of the well-trained dog and to bring about the better understanding between the dog and master through proper training; and by holding Obedience Test Trials under the rules and regulations of the American Kennel Club.

(b) To incorporate a formerly non-incorporated association known as the Obedience Club of San Diego County and to carry on all of the purposes and functions of said association and to that end to promote the merit of obedience training for the purebred dog for the community at large; to hold meetings where obedience problems may be discussed and innocent amusements engaged in with the privilege of providing and furnishing at any and all times to its members, or others, for pay, or otherwise, diet and refreshments

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of any and all kinds and any and all drinks that are commonly known as "soft drinks" and with the further privilege of providing and furnishing at any and all times to its members and others for pay, such other articles and things and such services that may desire and, to that end, to purchase or otherwise acquire, own and hold such real and personal property of whatever kind and description within and without the State of California suitable, necessary, useful or advisable in connection with any or all of the objects hereinbefore or hereinafter set forth and to convey, sell, assign, transfer, lease, mortgage, pledge, exchange or otherwise dispose of such property.

(c) That this is a corporation which does not contemplate pecuniary gain or profit to the members thereof.

FOURTH:

That the place where the principal office for the transaction of the business of said corporation is San Diego, County of San Diego, State of California.

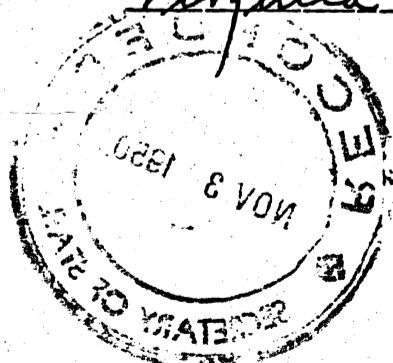

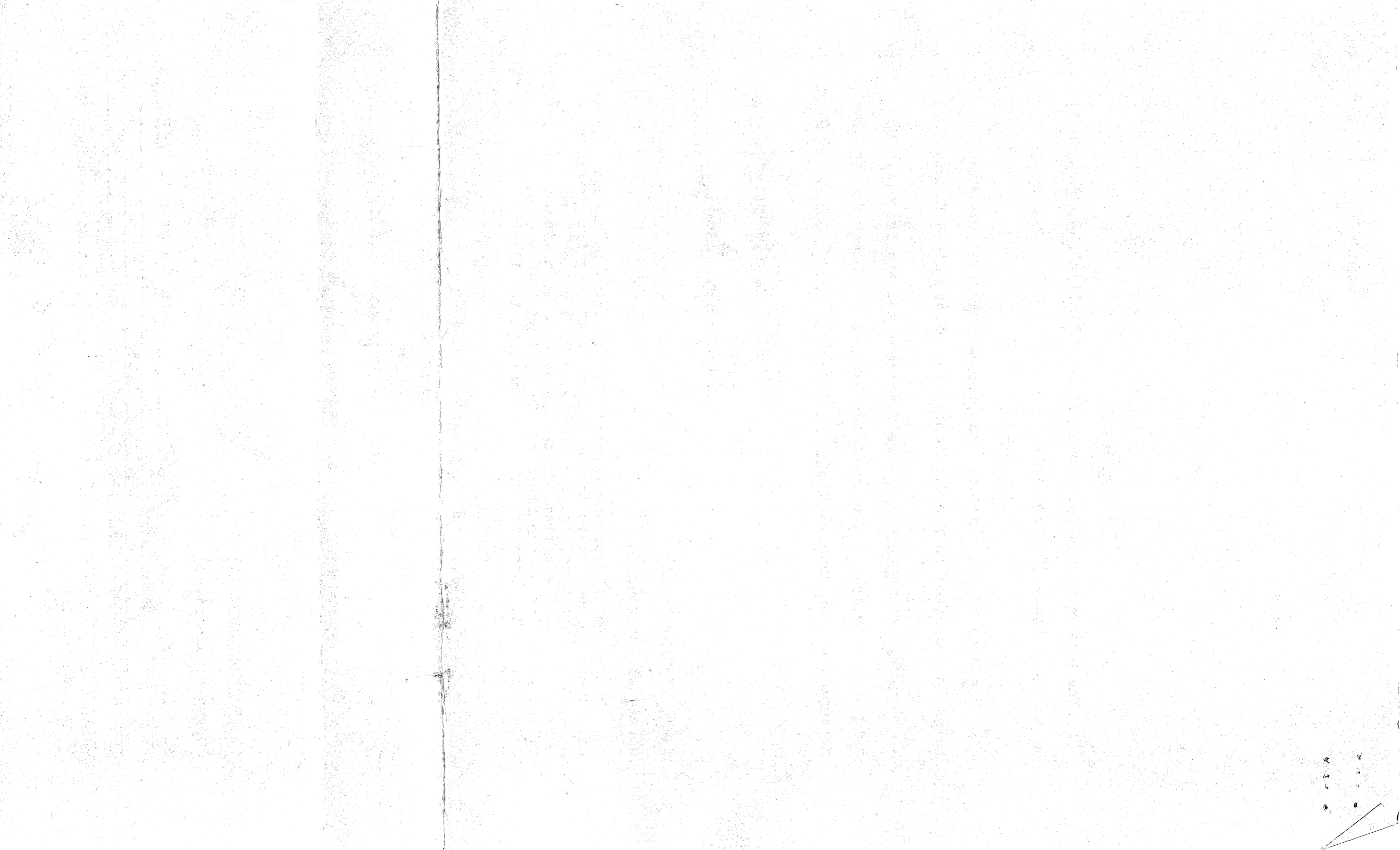

A NON PROFIT ORGANIZATION

The Obedience Club of San Diego County, ~~is~~ is primarily concerned with training dogs, and showing trained dogs in Trials to earn AKC degrees as a hobby.

With volunteer teachers we run training classes for one hour every week, opened to associate and regular members. Associate membership is for six months, followed by Regular membership on a yearly basis.

Our membership varies between 350 and 400 members at all times because we sign up new associate members twice a month, and many of these do not carry on to Regular membership.

We host an AKC licensed Trial once a year, and Graduation fun matches four times a year. Training for more advanced degrees is offered for those who choose to go on with this hobby.

A General meeting is held once a month as a social gathering for all members, with a business meeting followed by an educational or informational program planned each month.

We use the Zoo parking lot for training classes, and support the Zoo by donations. We also support the Humane Society (we donated \$10,000 for the spaying-neutering program this year) and have recently donated to Guide Dogs of the desert.

We have an Awards-Christmas party, a summer picnic. We encourage members by subsidizing entries in Regional events. And this year AKC Tracking trials have been added to our activities.

Associate and Regular members differ only in the degree of interest. Most of the Associate members take the six months of classes and feel their dogs are as well behaved as they wish. So we feel we are offering a community service to the average pet owner, while hoping to encourage more in our sport.

Funds are solely from dues. When we have a social event we subsidize the cost to the members from the treasury, and always come out in the red. When we accumulate some money we donate to a dog related cause.
