Foakes hits form but champions fall short

BEN Foakes spearheaded Surrey's commanding display at Emirates Old Trafford – but the champions could not launch their new campaign with a victory.

Setting Lancashire 444 to win, they were held off on the final day by Lancashire's stubborn resistance, having to settle for the best part of a draw in their bid to retain the LV County Championship Division One crown.

Foakes, subject of much speculation about whether he will retain his place in this summer's Ashes series as England's wicketkeeper, played a central role in ensuring Surrey were in charge for much of the match.

Sent in on day one, they were in peril at 77-4 but Foakes (76) and Jamie Smith's 54 – full of beautifully timed strokes from one of England's most talented young players – added 87 for the fifth wicket to grab the initiative.

Their work was built on by Cameron Steel, handed a key role in balancing the team. The leg-spinning all-rounder has been on the fringes of the side since arriving at the Kia Oval two years ago via spells with Middlesex, Durham and Hampshire.

A highly successful winter spent playing grade cricket in Perth has produced a massive boost to Steel's game and he took charge in hammering 141no, including 14 fours and three sixes, driving the visitors to the commanding heights of 442 all out

Runners-up last season, Lancashire's reply owed much to opener
Keaton Jennings making 76 but Surrey chipped away on a pitch which

Australian Sean Abbott, having made 42 earlier, offered the main cutting edge in claiming 5-50 as the hosts declined to 197-8. New Zealand's Colin de Grandhomme – who enjoyed a spell at The Oval last year – cracked 67 in reducing the deficit before they were dismissed for 291.

Steel added another useful 31, Burns conservatively set Lancashire 444 in 11 overs of the third day plus the whole of the last, Surrey chasing their first win at the ground since 2004.
