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Fighting Esher can take pride despite going down

BATTLING bravely to the end, Esher's defeat despatched them from National

A season of struggle, having been promoted 12 months ago, started back in September when they were beaten 38-21 at Rams, the first of nine successive defeats.

Peter Winterbottom's side staged a spirited recovery but another poor run in the new year effectively condemned them to finish in the bottom three.

They started the day just outside the

relegation zone but were aware Taunton would almost certainly beat Leeds – long condemned to the drop - which they did,

And although Esher took a 19-5 lead in the first half, the hosts could not withstand a charge from Rams – knowing they must win to keep alive their title prospects – after the interval, lacking the firepower up front, as has so often been the case. A crowd of 1,170, boosted by a large contingent of Rams supporters, were entertained throughout.

Having started so poorly a week ear-lier in their defeat at Darlington, Es were bang on the button, a superb break through the centre from second row Adam Bullett sending through Pierre Thompson for the opening try after just two minutes, although the conversion was missed.

Scrum-half Thompson was at his opportunist best to conjure the second try, spotting a gap from the breakdown and nipping past the cover to speed over from around ten metres out on 19 minutes, this time Morley hitting the target to make it

The Berkshire struck back almost immediately, flanker James McRae fielding a kick just outside his 22 and breaking through the centre before finding Axel Kalling-Smith to burst down the right and cross over, the conversion going

But Es were soon charging again, this time lock James Jordan peeling off the back of a maul to strike, Morley making it 19-5. It took the fly-half's points tally to 259 for the campaign, the best in the divi-

Could Esher spring a surprise and save themselves?

Their habit of conceding just before half time resurfaced again, proving unable to prevent lock Connor Stapley from forcing his way through and Drew Humberstone added the extras to make the dif-ference just seven points at the interval.

Thompson's day was to be spoilt by a yellow card for a deliberate knock-on, after 54 minutes as he intercepted full-back Henry Bird's break – although intent did not seem clear – and the visitors made the most of their numerical advantage in a flash. Having had one maul held up over the line, they struck when centre Humberstone barged over the line and converted to level the scores.

It was now becoming one-way traffic, Rams moving the ball about well to set up wing Zach Clow to score on the left after 64 as he bypassed two challenges, Humberstone squeezing over the conversion.

A delicately-judged chip from fly-half Rowan Grundy set up full-back Bird to charge through and send Ollie Moyne swan-diving in spectacular fashion over the line, Humberstone making it 33-19.

Es weren't giving it up, going close through a maul, but victory belonged to Rams, who must now wait to find out whether Cambridge can overtake them
