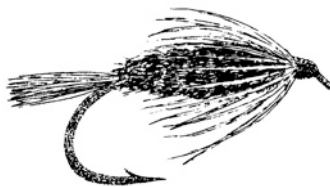

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# Conservation Report

It's been a banner year for the Conservation/Education activities at 4CFF. From the Conservation standpoint, we almost have reached an annual maintenance position as far as work goes at 10 Mile Creek School site. Most of the difficult pruning, weed control, and berry removal have been accomplished over the past 2 years, and I want to take this opportunity to personally thank each member who has been involved at our work parties out there. In October we also had another planting party with the students and came away from that event



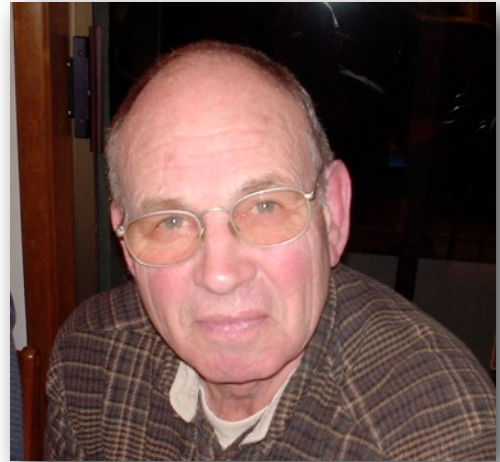
with the strong feeling that many of those students will take an active interest in conservation efforts even as they move along in life. Along this same line, several of us attended a stream rehab day on the headwaters of the Samish River south of the Acme Valley which was sponsored by the Whatcom Land Trust, CCA and the Skagit Salmon Enhancement Group. A lot was accomplished and we hope to participate again next year. General maintenance as well as some new improvements were accomplished at the Squalicum Lake access site this year. Terry McEwen repainted the parking lot sign, collected and tabulated the creel census forms, and generally gave me a lot of help when needed. Thanks to you, Terry, for stepping up when asked. On a downer note, as you know Pete Lamb underwent major spinal surgery this past year and will no longer be able to serve as an active member of the Conservation group and has stepped down as my assistant. Thank you so much Pete for being there when you could be, and so I'll be looking for a new "right hand person" to fill his shoes. With the help of Darrell Gray at NSEA we are currently looking into taking on a bit more of 10 Mile Creek if he can obtain the permission from certain landowners near the school site.

On another note, Frank made me aware of a great opportunity to help local hatcheries to refertilize nearby chosen streams with spawned out salmon carcasses. I am hoping this will take shape for next year's runs.

Your Conservation Committee met recently to vote on where conservation monies should go in 2012. The most exciting aspect of our budget is to donate some of our monies to the preservation of the wild fish populations once the dam on the Elwha River is taken down near Port Angeles. Our club is rarely given an opportunity to so directly help a wild salmon population. Our entire committee wishes to sincerely thank Hugh Lewis and Joe Kelly for taking the time to inform the 4CFF Board and our Committee about this rare opportunity.

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Before your eyelids close for a short nap, I will step over the organizational line (Klaus is out of town) and hit the high spots for the Educational portion of our organization: Numerous fly tying /flycasting sessions at Ferndale HS, Blaine HS, Lynden HS, and 4H Super Saturday at Meridian HS etc. Liam Woods Flyfishing School via WWU, as well as Squalicum Lake outings with Options HS.. Then there are the Christmas Ornament making session with children of the BP company held at Lynden, Club member fly casting instruction with Scott Christensen, and learning sessions for students of other schools again under the auspices of Nooksack Salmon Enhancement . I'm probably just scratching the surface of Klaus's repertoire, but he has done a wonderful job of placing education and community outreach at the forefront of our club's activities. The best way you can thank him for his huge contribution to our club is to make a resolution to volunteer for one or more of his activities.

Maybe next year we will get there.

We also rolled out the first "impromptu" outing to the "Flybar" on the Skagit River.

These are trends we will build on next year.

Not include were the 2 biggest events the club has ever hosted. Our picnic had 95 attendees and the conservation auction had 101 of us in the room!!! Just the other day I was checking directions on Google maps and it was near Dan Coomb's house so I just checked it out. We have made a mark, although only a temporary one. The aerial view of the house was updated the day of our picnic and you can see everything set up for the event including the lamb on the cross! You guys are over the top, really! Thank you!!!

# December Culinary Corner

I find myself spending a little time each day trolling the internet and the library looking for new and old ideas about food. It could be regional (Argentinean BBQ), ethnic (Asian), an ingredient (celeriac) or in this case, a new way to accomplish a task.

There is an axiom that says that taste begins long before anything reaches your mouth. I was working with something else when I got a look at the picture. You can see the flavor resting on and under the chicken. You can also see that the bird is "butterflied" that is, the backbone is removed. All good reasons to jump to the recipe and see what was happening!!

This was all on a blog I have mentioned before FOOD52. The subject was roasting chicken. I have been recently reviewing techniques other than the old reliable "Beer can". Amanda is one of the primary editors and she covers some of the background in the dish. This is one that has everything. The meat comes out moist, the skin is crispy, it is easy to carve, and you have a great basis for a sauce. ( I did make on change and went to Meyer lemons to drop the bitterness.)

## **Spatchcocked and Braise Roasted Chicken**

About a decade ago, I went to a cooking demonstration at Macy's by Christopher Hirscheimer. She showed the crowd her trick for making it easy to carve roasted chicken -- she simply cut out the chicken's backbone before roasting, then she reshaped the bird and trussed it to hold it together. Spatchcocking is a similar technique except instead of re-shaping the bird, you flatten it, making it possible to grill or saute a bird in one layer. Fast forward to this fall. At a dinner with some fellow food52ers in Boston, our conversation touched on chef Gordon Hammersley's technique of "braise-roasting" poultry -- where he submerges the meat in broth and leaves the skin exposed to the oven heat. I thought it was time to get in the kitchen to try the combo of spatchcocking and braise-roasting. As usual, rather than do any research, I winged it, occasionally calling out to Merrill for advice. Here are the results!

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## (Spatchcocked Cont.)

### Serves 4

One 4 to 4 1/2 pound chicken  
Salt and freshly ground black pepper  
1 1/2 tablespoons unsalted butter  
1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil  
2 large shallots, sliced  
4 garlic cloves, lightly smashed (skins left on)  
2 rosemary sprigs  
8 sage leaves  
1/2 cup fino sherry or dry white wine  
About 1 cup chicken broth  
1 lemon, cut into thin slices (skin left on; seeds discarded)



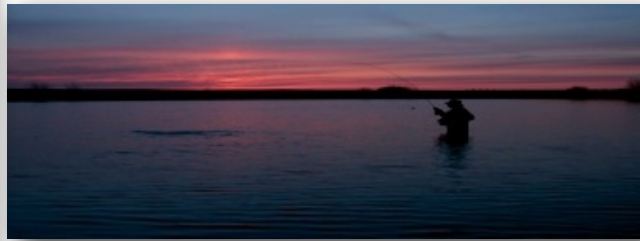
### Method:

1. Heat the oven to 425 degrees. Using poultry shears, cut the backbone out of the chicken. Reserve the backbone. Turn the chicken skin-side-up and press down on the breast bone to flatten the chicken. Generously season the chicken all over.
2. In a casserole pan or other low shallow pan large enough to fit the flattened chicken, melt the butter in the oil over medium high heat. When the foam subsides, add the chicken skin-side-down, and the backbone, and brown well, 4 to 6 minutes. Remove to a plate. Pour off all but 1 1/2 tablespoons fat.
3. Set the pan back on the stove. Add the shallots and garlic, and cook over medium heat until the shallot has softened, about 2 minutes. Add the rosemary, sage and sherry. Increase the heat and boil off nearly all the sherry. Add 1 cup chicken broth and the lemon slices. Gently lower the chicken back into the pan, again skin-side up.
4. If needed, add more broth to come 1/2-inch up the side of the pan. Transfer the pan to the oven, and braise-roast until the chicken is cooked through (an internal temperature of 165 degrees), 30 to 50 minutes.
5. Transfer the chicken to a cutting board and let rest for 10 minutes -- uncovered, or the skin will soften! Carve the bird. Strain the pan juices and adjust the seasoning. Serve bird and cooked-down broth, and enjoy!

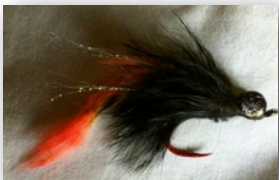
# Two Fish, One Fly...

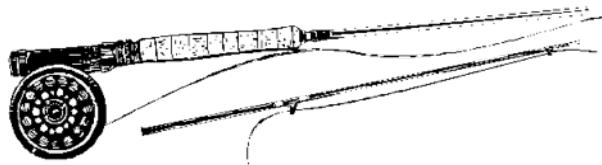
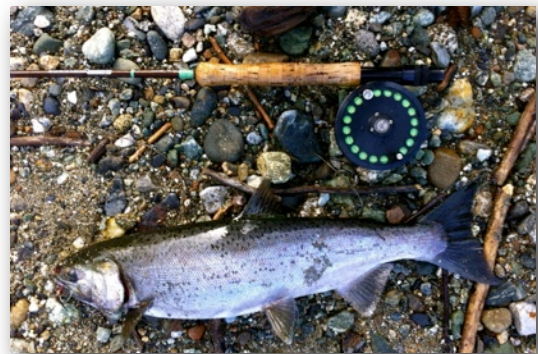

- To work for the betterment and preservation of angling waters and surrounding lands.
  - To promote the creation of fly only and/or quality fishing waters and encourage appropriate management of these waters.
  - To practice and advocate protection of the resource and the natural environment.
  - To improve the state-of-the-art of fly fishing and keep members informed of developments of interest.
  - To maintain high standards of membership by selecting as prospective members those persons who are dedicated to fly fishing, are good sportsmen, and are conservation oriented; and to temper organizational growth consistent with the maintenance of quality membership standards.
  - To develop and implement programs of education designed to encourage individuals of all ages to become fly fishers and better sportsmen.
