

Reverend Dr. Dickerson answered the call to serve as the pastor of




His pastoral experience includes serving the Chestnut Grove

The Ushers/Doorkeeper, What is your Position//Roles and Responsibilities
The dictionary defines an Usher as a doorkeeper who escorts people to seats
in a hall, an officer who introduces, strangers/ or walks before a person of
rank. This definition barely scratches the surface. An Usher is a very important
officer of the church who serves as the law enforcement agent, an orderly and
a caretaker of the Church and all its treasures; material and souls.

The work of Ushering is enormous, but the Lord who has called us into ministry would always supply the grace to be faithful. The Usher must continually emphasize the spiritual and must not leave out the Physical. He/she must be a faithful servant in the Vineyard and must ensure that he/she is available in the sight of God.

The Almighty God who has called the Usher is more than able to bless him/her as long as he/she pays attention to His words in Proverbs 4:20-27 and 11 Timothy 2:11-15. We must always be ready to adopt to changing circumstances and time frames and anticipate the unexpected. May God bless us all us all in Jesus Name.

The Work of the Church Trustee Rev. George Crews, III

Result Expected: Effective trustees will function as Christian stewards of property God has entrusted to the congregation. This includes supervising and maintaining both the physical property of the congregation and gifts made to the congregation so that the ministries of the congregation can be effective and all legal requirements related to the property are satisfied.

Trustees benefit from having one or more of these spiritual gifts: servanthood, helping, discernment, leadership, administration, and giving. The chairperson should show evidence of prior effective ministry leadership, especially in the area of stewardship of assets, and this leader should exhibit evidence of active and growing discipleship.

Useful knowledge and skills for this position are knowledge of property and asset management, ability to listen to and communicate with people of all ages and the ability to work with other ministry leaders. The chair should show prior ability to preside over meetings, the ability to delegate responsibility and to follow up to complete tasks.

Trustees should show genuine interest in responding to the hopes and concerns of people in the community and show willingness to partner with community interests.

The congregation's committee on nominations and leadership development may establish specific standards for this position.

The Traditional Church Deacon Johnny Pettiford

There are many traditional or established churches doing things well. And though we can't make categorical statements about any group of churches, it is indeed true that there are some elements in traditional churches we need to celebrate. Here are five of them.

- 1. The members have a deep love and concern for one another. Go into many traditional churches and you will see members caring for one another, taking meals to each other, and praying consistently for one another.
- 2. They are loyal to the institution. I have argued in other articles that institutional loyalty taken to an extreme is unhealthy. But the inverse is true as well. Members with no institutional loyalty will move from one church to another with little concern. Traditional church members tend to be fiercely loyal to the churches where they are members.
- 3. They are passionate about giving to missions. It seems to be in the congregational DNA of many traditional churches. If there is a mission cause put before the church, these members often give abundantly.
- 4. They offer stability to the congregation. Because of their loyalty and devotion to their church, traditional church members offer stability and steadiness to local congregations. They will continue to give, to serve, and to care for others even in challenging times in the church.
- 5. The members have a historical perspective that can be healthy for the church. Many of them have seen the best of times and the worst of times. The traditional church member has a healthy perspective that realizes God is above the crisis or the situation of the moment. Sometimes just hearing from these members about how the church survived a crisis in the past can be encouragement for the congregation to move to the future.

The Mission Minded Church Rev. Joyce Clayton

In missions today we may wonder, "Who dropped the ball?" Why are there so many who still have not received the good news of the Gospel? Who will replace the thousands of missionaries retiring by the end of this century? Where lies the responsibility of continuing to carry out the Great Commission of Jesus Christ? (Matthew 28:18-20)

"You are a chosen race," wrote Peter, "a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that you may declare the wonderful deeds of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." (I Peter 2:9 RSV) Peter speaks of God's people as having a privileged position: special, royal, holy. The privilege is for a particular purpose: that they might declare the wonderful deeds of the One who called them from darkness to light.

God's people must be the instruments to carry the Gospel message to the ends of the earth. The church, made up of ordinary but privileged people, must be the source of multitudes of "players" who will successfully "carry the ball." Such a church will be a mission-minded church—made up of mission-minded individuals. Is yours a mission-minded church? Are you a mission-minded Christian? How can you tell? What are the marks of mission-minded churches and mission-minded Christians? The church, made up of ordinary but privileged people, must be the source of multitudes of "players" who will successfully "carry the ball." Such a church will be a mission-minded church—made up of mission-minded individuals. Is yours a mission-minded church? Are you a mission-minded Christian?

Deacon/Deaconess Rev. Dr. Langston Logan

Deacon Role in Brief

The deacon, like the elder, is an elected and ordained role. The deacon's primary roles are the assistance in running of services, the visitation of members, the care of the sick and the maintenance of church property.

Duties of Deacons

The work of the deacons involves a wide range of practical services for the church, including:

- 1. Assistance at Services and Meetings—At church services, the deacons are usually responsible for welcoming members and visitors as they enter the church, and for assisting them, where necessary, to find seats. They also stand ready to cooperate with pastor and elders for the smooth functioning of the meetings conducted in the church.
- 2. Visitation of Members—An important duty belonging to deacons is that of visiting church members in their homes. In many churches this is arranged by a distribution of membership by districts, assigning a deacon to each district, with the expectation that he will visit each home at least once a quarter.
- 3. Preparation for Baptismal Services—The deacons should do their part in making the necessary preparations for this service; there should be no confusion or delay.
- 4. Assistance at the Communion Service—At the celebration of the ordinance of foot-washing, the deacons or deaconesses provide everything that is needed for the service, such as: towels, basins, water (at a comfortable temperature as the occasion may require), buckets, et cetera. After the service they should see that the vessels and linen used are washed and returned to their proper place.

Following the Lord's Supper, great care should be exercised in disposing of any bread or wine left over after all have partaken of these emblems. Any remaining wine that was blessed is to be respectfully poured out. Any remaining bread that was blessed should be buried, burned, or respectfully disposed of in another appropriate manner but in no event returned to common usage.

- 5. Care of the Sick and the Poor—Another important responsibility of deacons is the care of the sick, relieving the poor, and aiding the unfortunate. Money should be provided for this work from the church fund for the needy. The treasurer, on recommendation from the church board, will pass over to the deacons or deaconesses whatever may be needed for use in needy cases. This work is the particular charge of the deacons and the deaconesses, but the church is to be kept fully acquainted with the needs, in order to enlist the membership's support.
- 6. Care and Maintenance of Church Property—In some churches, where the responsibility for the care and maintenance of the church property is not assigned to a building committee, the deacons have this responsibility.

Degconness: Role in Brief

The duties of a deaconess are very similar to the deacon, with particular emphasis placed on assistance in running services and the care of the sick.

Deaconesses were included in the official staff of the early Christian churches. "I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a deaconess of the church at Cenchreae, that you may receive her in the Lord as befits the saints, and help her in whatever she may require from you, for she has been a helper of many and of myself as well" (Rom. 16:1, 2, RSV).

Duties of Deaconesses

Deaconesses serve the church in a wide variety of important activities, including:

- 1. Assistance at Baptisms—Deaconesses assist at the baptismal services, ensuring that female candidates are cared for both before and after the ceremony. They also give such counsel and help as may be necessary regarding suitable garments for baptism. Robes of suitable material should be provided. Where robes are used, the deaconesses should see that they are laundered and carefully set aside for future use.
- 2. Arrangements for the Communion Service—The deaconesses assist in the ordinance of foot-washing, giving special aid to women visitors or those who have newly joined the church. It is the duty of the deaconesses to arrange everything needed for this service, such as seeing that the table linen, towels, et cetera, used in the celebration of ordinances are laundered and carefully stored.
- 3. The Care of the Sick and the Poor—Deaconesses are to do their part in caring for the sick, the needy, and the unfortunate,

cooperating with the deacons in this work.

MEDITATION FOR THE DAY

You cannot help others unless you understand the person you are trying to help. To understand the problems and temptations of others, you must have been through them yourself. You must do all you can to understand others. You must study their backgrounds, their likes and dislikes, their reactions and their prejudices. When you see their weaknesses, do not confront the person with them. Share your own weaknesses, sins, and temptations and let other people find their own convictions.

The Center Seat Rev. Dr. Herbert L. Dickerson

The goal of the pastor is to reveal the glory of God in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit to a people who need God's grace for life. The primary way the pastor will do this is by teaching the Word of God to the church. The gift of pastor is directly linked to the gift of teaching in Ephesians 4:11 and elsewhere. In fact, this gift could be called the gift of pastor-teacher. The ability to teach the Scriptures is also one of the many requirements of being an overseer (1 Timothy 3:1-7; Titus 1:6 9). By teaching the Scriptures to the church, the pastor feeds the "sheep" of God.

The Holy Spirit gives the spiritual gift of pastor to some in the church to humbly teach them, guide them, protect them, and to lead them in the mission that God has for His church, namely the Great Commission. The pastor loves the Gospel of Jesus Christ and puts it at the center of his life and ministry. Pastors do not seek fame or recognition for themselves, but they are placed in a position of authority by the Holy Spirit. The role of a pastor is one of humility and service as he is reminded daily of his overwhelming need of God's grace for the task at hand. See also Ephesians 4:11; Jeremiah 3:15; Acts 20:28; John 10:11-18.

The Second Seat Rev. Larry Wilson

"God Called You to Ministry. Now What?

This discussion would be around the "Call." Exploring the nature of one's call, the changing seasons of the "Call," and how to fully execute one's call. We will also examine both general and specific hurdles and obstacles faced by associate ministers, ministerial frustrations, and maneuvering through those frustrations. Weaved into the discussion as well will be the value of mentors, mentorship, and guidance by trusted friends or confidentes.

- Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, with a Master of Sacred Theology.


