# Deukmejian to Enlarge Little Saigon's Stature

Vietnamese Students Will Be Honored, Freeway Signs Announced During 1st Visit by a Governor

Gov. George Deukmejian will make the first visit by a California governor Friday to the county's Little Saigon, to honor 12 Vietnamese high school students and to announce that Caltrans has tentatively approved freeway signs saying Little Saigon, Vietnamese com-munity leaders said Wednesday.

Over the past 13 years, Little Saigon has gained a reputation as a center of Vietnamese business and culture in Southern California

Van Tran, a member of the Vietnamese-American Scholarship Foundation, said: "This is impor-tant for us not only because of the governor's visit but also because, in a way, the name of Saigon is being resurrected. We are proud of our achievement."

## Special Tourist Zone

Freeway signs directing motorists to Little Saigon were first requested in February, after business and community leaders won the support of the Westminster City Council to declare Little Sai-

gon a special tourist zone.

The declaration was part of a plan to help transform the area through redevelopment into the county's equivalent of Chinatown in Los Angeles.

"As you know, the Vietnamese

As you know, the Vietnamese Communists erased the name Sai-gon" from Vietnam, Tran said, renaming it Ho Chi Minh City. "But now it's going to be remembered here in the United States."

About 700 Vietnamese-owned

businesses, including herbal shops, fish markets and restaurants, are in Little Saigon, an area along Bolsa Avenue roughly bordered by Brookhurst and Magnolia streets in Garden Grove and Westminster.

### Signs on Two Freeways



said he has "no problem defending our company's hiring practices. We hire on performance and ability." Cockrum pointed out that the company still has "a very qualified Hispanic representative" out working every day, performing much of what Franco did.

Two other men who were part of the special marketing team—Rudy Rios and Gary Villa—resigned. Rios left in January, 1987, and Villa

last January.
Franco, a Santa Ana resident, said that about a year ago he was told by a supervisor that the marketing team no longer would be allowed to meet together behind closed doors. "They said 'no more than two Hispanics at a time, like we had to take a number or something. Then they said no meetings at all—we were supposed to meet in the hall."

Said general sales manager Cockrum, when told of Franco's

allegation: "That's a little ridiculous. I'm not aware of any policy like that."

Franco said his letter to Coors executives in Colorado complaining about the group's treatment resulted only in demands by his bosses that he see a company psychologist. He resigned shortly thereaf-

Bond says none of Franco's claims are true. "We don't discrim-inate, period," he said. "The budget [for the special marketing pro-

graml has increased every year for the last five years fivefold altogether."

Manuel Esqueda, a retired Santa Ana banker who now heads a scholarship program for Latino college students, said the company had given his group about \$40,000

"Actions are stronger than words," said Esqueda, who was attending the dinner for Bond. "I'm going to accept help from anyone who wants to support my people."
