THE WESTERN NORTH AMERICAN RHODODENDRON SPECIES FOUNDATION PROJECT



CLARICE CLARK, a professional surveyor, is currently Project Manager of a 16-year volunteer research effort begun by Rhododendron Species Foundation affiliates Hank Helm and Dr. George Ryan in a time when the Global Positioning System and the internet were in their infancy and used by government agencies, such as the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management – not in general use for projects such as organizing and cataloging locations of Rhodendron species native to Western North America. As GPS and the internet became common everyday tools, the identity of plant locations became much more accurate.

Now the health of rhododendron plants can be tracked through years of climate change and other factors affecting the rhododendron species. How much information is required and should it be stored on paper, or "in the clouds"? Who better to lead the project than a professional surveyor.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Ali Sarlak

The January weather was kind and allowed us to meet without misadventure, despite icy roads here and there. The Presenter was Harold Greer – who needs no introduction – most of us know him as the Rhododendron Encyclopedia man. His slide show was for all rhodie lovers, plus the people who think rhododendrons are only attractive when in bloom – actually they are beautiful plants in all seasons.

First, he told about how the Genus Rhododendrons is composed of Lepidotes and Elepidote. Lepidote are with the smaller leaves most of the time, with scales underside, and bloom earlier in the season. Elepidote are without scales and grow taller, some becoming large trees in time. As matter of fact, in 1996 the Greers, the Wylies, the Burnses and I all attended the Scottish International Rhododendron Convention in Oban and experienced how big trees and rhododendrons grow in the large estates in that country.

Harold also educated us that Rhododendrons come in various colors, sizes, foliage, different bloom times, textures, forms, and different landscape usage, such as alpines, providing different leaves textures to add year-round interest. As owner of a landscaping business, I love rhododendrons for various reasons – first of all for their low maintenance, their use as privacy barriers, and for their year around interest. One should study them in advance of placement in ones yard. Harold's presentation was impressive!

GROUP will present Sadafumi Uchiyama, Garden Curator for the Portland Japanese Garden, on Tuesday March 12, 2013 at 7 p.m. at the Campbell Community Center, 155 High St., Eugene, OR.

Sadafumi (Sada) is a third generation Japanese gardener. His family has been involved in gardening since 1909 in Fukuoka Prefecture, Japan. His traditional apprenticeship in Japanese gardening combined with formal training in Western landscape architecture has enabled Sada to design and build a unique and wide range of private and public landscape projects.

Prior to becoming the Garden Curator, he taught landscape design courses at Clackamas Community College and lectured on Japanese Gardening at both Mt. Hood and Portland Community Colleges. Sada has written for the "Journal of Japanese Gardening" since its inception, as well as for "Inspired House" and "Oregon Home". He served as a secretary of the International Association of Japanese Gardens from 1996-2000. He was invited to speak at the 5th International Symposium on Japanese Gardens in Tokyo, September 2007.


