

APRIL 27, THE HILTON GARDEN INN

As you may have read in the last newsletter, Mookies, the venue for the past two shows and banquettes, closed in February, so we have found a new location and a new date for the 2013 Spring Rhododendron Show. We invite you to join us to celebrate the rhododendrons that we grow in our gardens on Saturday, April 27, at the Hilton Garden Inn located on Gateway St., just north of Beltline Rd, in Springfield. Bring blooming trusses and sprays, samples of interesting foliage, photos that you have taken, and bonsai or vireyas that you are growing and come for an afternoon of enjoyment of our favorite genus.

The show will look a lot like the very successful one from last year, though we have expanded the number of classes from six to seven - still keeping it nice and simple. Entries will be accepted between 3:15 - 4:30 p.m. with the voting at 5:00. The classes will be: Deciduous Azaleas (A), Evergreen Azaleas (B), Pink Elepidotes (Cp), Red Elepidotes (Cr), White Elepidotes (Cw), Other-colored Elepidotes (Co), and Lepidotes (D) - with each category having the hybrids and species separated.

At the entries table, each entry will receive a number to be written on the entry form in the upper right corner. Also, on the entry form, include the name of the rhododendron, your name, and the Class letters (see above). Each entry will entitle you to one ticket that will be entered in a drawing to win a free dinner for the evening. Terry has been the lucky winner of the free dinner for each of the past two years. We will have people at the classification table to help identify the plant and to place it in the correct rack.

Since foliage is such an interesting aspect of rhododendrons, we invite you to bring samples from your garden to share on a display table. Also, it would be interesting to see other items that you enjoy such as rhododendrons grown as bonsai, rhododendrons grown in pots, photos of rhododendrons that you have taken, or vireyas that you grow in your house or greenhouse.

Labels will be available to identify what you have brought. The idea is to broaden the display of how we enjoy our rhododendrons.

At 5:00 ballots will be distributed so that each attendee can be part of the judging. This seems to generate a lot of discussion and careful observation of the entries and is fun as well. On the ballot, you simply need to write the entry number for what you deem to be the best entry in the categories: - Azalea (deciduous or evergreen),

Pink Elepidote, Red Elepidote, White Elepidote, Other-colored Elepidote, Lepidote, Best Species (azalea, elepidote, or lepidote).

The ballots will be collected at 5:45 with trophies awarded just before dinner at 6:00.

February is often a dreadfully dreary month hereabouts with lowering skies and drizzle to fierce rain or even snow as winter struggles to seemingly strengthen, not loosen, its hold. Will the downhill slide following the holidays ever come to an end? Time to hibernate with a good book...or perhaps snooze to the mindless offerings on television. Thus, though I looked forward to the meeting itself as another important phase in the Hinsdale Garden recovery, the early February drive would likely be something to endure. But by golly, soon after turning off toward Drain, "Scenic Highway" 38 began living up to its officially designated status. Not only was the day benign in place of what late winter storm systems often fling our way, the sun was just right to reveal signs of nature's renewal. Swelling buds on roadside deciduous trees, bright green shoots from low growing plants—even some crocus blooms provided a tantalizing foretaste of Spring 2013.

Reedsport area residents, a half dozen ARS members and BLM staff thus gathered at the old ranch house east of the elk viewing area to explore the future of nearby O. Howard Hinsdale Garden. The reason for assembling this group is an ongoing push for formal organization of a community based 'Friends' group to add broad public support to the garden in perpetuity. Of course more immediate topics like enjoying the garden during this year's bloom season also drew comment as everyone took turns with remarks, questions and ideas.

Out of this came two more days during the crowded April/May period to red letter on your calendar: April 20 and May 11. We'll get started at ten each morning and continue until done, probably sometime in the afternoon.

A major goal for the April date, which won't be widely advertised, is a relaxed sort of learning (and enjoying) day for participants. Lists will be provided keyed to numbered tags on each garden specimen. Community members will also be eager to learn other things about our favorite ornamental plants from us 'experts' in all

things rhododendron. They will then be better able to begin taking on a role as docents during open garden days...and maybe we'll even get some new members on ARS rosters. May 11 will be far more generally advertised as this year's open garden date for the general public.

Please feel welcome to come on one or both dates, even if only briefly. Each visit to this beautiful riverside location yields personal pleasure, and brings nearer the time when the O. Howard Hinsdale Garden will be open throughout the blooming season in display of its historic role of rhododendrons in Pacific Northwest gardens.

# THE CECIL & MOLLY SMITH OPEN GARDEN DAYS

World renowned for its collection of species and hybrid rhododendrons, this garden will be open during the blooming season, Saturdays and Sundays, April 6 through May 19, 11:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. This three-acre natural woodland setting also features choice trees, shrubs, wildflowers, and bulbs, including Cyclamen, Trillium, Erythronium and Narcissus which complement the over 600 rhododendrons and azaleas. Established in the early 1950's, the garden contains many rare species grown by Cecil Smith from seeds Imported from China and cuttings from England, as well as hybrids he developed.

The Portland Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society purchased the garden in 1983 and, along with the Willamette and Tualatin Valley Chapters, now manages and maintains it. A selection of plants featured in the garden are available for purchase.

There is a modest admission fee of \$3.00. Due to the sloping site the garden is not considered handicap accessible. The garden is located at 5065 Raybell Road, St.Paul, Oregon, 97137. 7/10ths of a mile west of Highway 219 between St. Paul and Newberg. Turn west on Champoeg Road (look for the blue Heirloom Roses sign) and continue straight on to Raybell Road to the garden. Parking and entrance are on the right just past the house with the garden address. ## MEET THESE LITTLE GUYS AT OUR SHOW APRIL 27

Dwarf conifers are a great attraction to any garden. They come in different shapes; narrow, broadly conical, round, sometimes flat and even weeping. Colors vary from many shades of green and blue to silver, golden and variegated. Needles, buds and cones as well as growth habits are uniquely different from each other.

Dwarf conifers can occupy a space and not outgrow it for a long time and provide year round interest. A nice mossy rock accents conifers well.

I would like to introduce to you three Bosnian pines:

Pinus leucodermis (aka P. heidreichii) 'Irish Bell' The name describes this plant well. It makes a nice compact slightly broad conical shape, growing about 6" a year.

Pinus leucodermis 'Schmiditii' (aka Pinus heidreichii 'Schmidtii') is a very dwarf pine that originated in Bosnia. It has a long light green needle and dark brown buds that stand out. In addition, the tree grows about 1-2" a year making a compact mound.

Pinus leucodermis 'Compact Gem') is an upright tree that is conical but not wide. A full tree but not extremely thick branching. It grows about 6 to 8" a year and is a medium green color.

Jane Goodall, whom we all know from her work with chimpanzees in Africa, wrote in the March, 2013 Smithsonian Magazine of her lifelong love of trees and nature. "Of all the trees in the world, the one I would most like to meet, whose location is top-secret, is the Wollemi pine. It was discovered by David Noble, a New South Wales parks and wildlife officer, who was leading an exploration group in 1994, about 100 miles northwest of Sydney, Australia. They were searching for new canyons when they came across a particularly wild and gloomy one that David couldn't resist exploring, After rappelling down beside a deep gorge and trekking through the remote forest below, David and his group came upon a tree with unusual-looking bark. David picked a few leaves, stuck them in his backpack and showed them to some botanists after he got home. For several weeks the excitement grew, as the leaves could not be identified by any of the experts. The mystery was solved when it was discovered that the leaves matched the imprint of an identical leaf on an ancient rock. They realized the newly discovered tree was a relative of a tree that flourished 200 million years ago. What an amazing find—a species that has weathered no less than 17 ice ages!"

Ed. Note: It was a lifetime thrill for me to see an offspring of that one and only Wollemi pine in a lovely private garden in Victoria, Australia in 2009. I have photo somewhere in my voluminous files. When I find it, I'll share!
