Eugene ARS meeting Wednesday, April 17th, at The Springs. Join us for Dinner at 5:30 PM and/or meeting at 7:00 PM.

Bruce Palmer will present "What's in a Name II?"

Bruce began his career as a science and math teacher at Ferndale High School in Humboldt County, California, in 1960. In 1968, he started the biology program at the University of Hawaii's new Maui Community College and retired, in 1993, as Chief Academic Officer of the college, moving back to Humboldt County with his wife, Nelda. Bruce is an active member of the Eureka Chapter of the ARS and volunteers at the Humboldt Botanical Garden. He writes a column on biological terms for the Eureka Chapter's monthly newsletter as well as quarterly articles for both the Journal of the American Rhododendron Society and the Botanical Guardian of the Humboldt Botanical Garden. Bruce was awarded the American Rhododendron Society's Gold Medal in 2015.

Bruce's "What's in a Name II" discusses the history of plant taxonomy in the Ericaceae family and, specifically, the characteristics of the genus Rhododendron (from the Greek "rose tree"), starting with the pre-Linnaeus era (prior to 1700) up through the current DNA revelations being made by Dr. Ben Hall and his researchers at the University of Washington. Bruce will consider the characteristics of the Ericaceae family, members of the family, the origin of the name Rhododendron, characteristics of the genus, and finally, subgenera in the genus. Bruce will make a challenging topic understandable and logical. One of his two handouts is a reprint of a 2005 Systematic Botany article, prepared by Dr. Ben Hall and associates from the UW Dept. of Biology, proposing modifications in Rhododendron classification.

News from Hendricks Park by Emily Aune

Righting "Wronged" Rhodies

Along with the multitudes of tree and branch failures that we have been cutting and removing our way through in the garden, we had about 6 completely uprooted Rhododendrons. Since Rhododendrons are so shallow rooted. this lends the plant to the ability of being stood back up. Here's our method.



First – Dig out soil below and around the root ball, where it will be sitting back into the earth. Often when a plant uproots, soil from the exposed part of the root ball will fall back into the hole, and surrounding soil will fill the lowest area. If this soil is not removed, the Rhododendron will sit higher than it used to, once it is stood back up.

Second – Get staking system or wires ready and installed. I was left with several of these nifty wire stakes that we pound in to the ground with the rod I am holding in my right hand, and then remove the rod, leaving the wire deep in the ground. As there is tension on the wires the below ground piece pivots to a horizontal direction, and does not pull out of the ground.



Third – Next, depending on what you have available, use brute strength, a tractor, a come-a-long, or several volunteers, to stand your Rhododendron back into the upright position. If the Rhododendron is too heavy, you may also prune the plant prior to standing up. This photo shows one volunteer holding the plant as the other is attaching the wires. I helped stand the Rhododendron, then ran off to take a photo.

Fourth – Install a "crutch" made from old Rhododendron or oak wood, to give support on the direction of fall. I bury the bottom of the "crutch" into the ground and try to find just the right angle and position on the plant. You may want to have a couple heights available.





Fifth – Attach wires. You can attach wires to sturdy stakes, or sometimes neighboring trees or shrubs, if they are big enough. I also like to make sure there is some protection on my wires. We have been using old hose.



Sixth – Refill soil around the base of the plant. You will have to do extra tending to this Rhododendron for the next couple of years, especially if it is a large plant. But, with some extra water and support (literally), it should survive for many years to come.

March was Election Time for our group.


Officer Positions: Secretary – Emily Aune AND Treasurer – Nancy Burns
