
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~ ~ News from Hendricks Park ~ ~ "Air Layering Harvest" by Emily Aune

Hendricks Park had some successes with air layering this summer. We started this process in April, 2019, three and a half years ago! Under the tutelage of John Hammond, then president of the Scottish Chapter Rhododendron Society, the park volunteers and I were instructed in his method of air layering rhododendrons. For more details of the process, revisit our June, 2019, newsletter, but in short, we nicked stems and wrapped them in plastic bags filled with peat moss. We made little signs explaining our process.







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We lopped off the branches and unraveled wrappers to find several nice networks of roots on about six of the plants that we had done. Some we suspect didn't get enough water, or the plant was already in decline. But successes, with our we soaked the roots in water, to help unfurl them, and potted and staked these two foot tall plants. That is certainly one of the perks to this type of propagation because you end up with a pretty good size plant.

I am most excited to get two successful *Rhododendron ririei* from our air layers. This species from China has a smoky lavender flower, and I have been told our specimen at Hendricks Park is a really nice and unique plant, and I have not been able to take successful cuttings from it previously. We also had success with *Rhododendron decorum* and *Rhododendron souliei* which will make their way back into the garden soon.





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~ ~ Thoughts from Jack Olson ~ ~ "The Name Game"

I had an interesting visit with a good friend and fellow hybridizer recently. He had invited me to see his seedlings and garden. We started walking through his garden and he would point out and call out the names of his various plants. After about ten minutes it dawned on me that I had never heard of any of these plants. Finally I asked him, "I have never heard of any of these plants, where did you get them?" His answer was "Oh, they are my seedlings, I named them so I could remember them." I was thinking, "What?!" Through my involvement with the American Rhododendron Society, I have learned that names are important. While touring my friend's garden, I assumed that the names he was calling out were correct names ... but if something happened to him, the plants that he had "named" could be named the same as a rhododendron that was correctly registered previously. Registering named hybrids through the American Rhododendron Society is how we hybridizers document the crosses we have created.

Registering a plant is a meticulous process. The color of the flowers, color of the foliage, shape of leaves, parentage, and many other characteristics of the plant are all recorded, so that the plant can be correctly identified in the years to come. It takes lots of time and all the paperwork must be filled out completely and correctly. And last but not least, the name you submit for your hybrid must have not been used before. If duplicate names were allowed to be used on multiple plants, there would be two (or more!) completely different plants being sold with the same name. Which is the correct plant? The one that has been registered! As you can see this could cause numerous problems. If a grower collects fifty cuttings of a misnamed plant, it can cause so much confusion! Another problem I have witnessed are mixed seedlings. A hybridizer will have similar seedlings, and will sell them with the same name. A good example of this is R. 'Red Walloper'. The best way to make sure you purchase a correctly named plant is to attend flower shows and buy your plants there. At a flower show, the plants are inspected and confirmed to be labeled with the correct name. Another option is to purchase your plants from a nursery or grower who is listed with the American Rhododendron Society. Steve has become a foremost international authority on Rhododendron taxonomy and distribution and he regularly visits the more remote parts of China, Vietnam, India, Tibet, and Papua New Guinea to discover, identify, and acquire new species. Steve was awarded the ARS's highest honor, the Gold Medal, in 2007 for his internationally significant work with genus *Rhododendron*. Steve's presentation for our meeting will be a travelogue of his Expedition to China in 2019. It promises to be a fascinating evening of pictures and stories from Steve's trip. 
A little background about the plant in our cover image this month ...
