Challis Arts Council's long-time renter, Challis Area Chamber of Commerce, moved out December 31.

This changed the Council's financials in more ways than one.

First, loss of rental income (\$2,400) and no more shared utility costs (about \$1,300).

Second issue was staffing. The Chamber paid Melissa Fitzgerald for 20 hours a week while the Council paid her for 15 hours. Without the Chamber's salary, Melissa would come up short.

There is no way the Council can run the gallery without paid staff.

Melissa offered to stay with us if we bumped up her wage (we were paying her far less than the Chamber) and increased her hours to 20 a week. That arrangement sets us back over \$6,000.

A generous donation by a member and nearly \$700 from a fundraiser last fall helped offset that shortfall, but we're still \$5,000 shy of making our nut.

What's the plan? We've been lucky the past four years with strong gallery sales and a few one-time windfalls from the state so we haven't had to hold any fundraisers.

That has to change. Gallery sales were much lower this year and there's no more state money. We'll be looking for volunteers to help pull off some kinds of money-making ventures.

We've resolved to stay open on Saturdays, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and need volunteers to do that.

We're expanding our profile in the community by hanging selected artwork at the CusterTel office.

There's a committee exploring the possibility of selling espresso from the building that could diversify revenue and programming options.

Memberships bring in over half of our annual revenue. IF you can, we'd appreciate an increased donation this year.

Gallery sales add up to at least a quarter of our revenue. Think of us when you need something unique and elegant for a gift or your personal space.

We can talk more about money at the Annual Meeting. **Bylaws**

Our bylaws haven't been updated in well over a decade. We've made some changes to reflect how we're operating today. You'll receive a pdf copy in your email. Look for it.

It's dull reading but necessary.

We'll be voting on those at the Annual Meeting.

Membership: We ended the fiscal year with 105 members who contributed \$9,417.

We chased one last grant from Steele-Reese Foundation that came through so we FINALLY had enough money (adding to grants from Idaho Community Foundation, CHC Foundation, fundraising money and a percentage of gallery sales), to give the green light on the siding project.
