

Letter from the Reverend Beverley Vincent

May is here and what a busy month it promises to be! Bank Holidays, local elections, Pentecost, a national week of prayer in churches and the coronation of a new monarch! Lots going on locally and nationally. I'm guessing for many of us the coronation of a new monarch, King Charles III, will be something we have not witnessed before. There is sure to be a lot of pomp and ceremony.

On her coronation in Westminster Abbey on 2nd June 1953, the late Queen Elizabeth II made promises before the congregation and before God that she would serve her country and those she governed, towards the end of the ceremony she said "The things which I have here before promised, I will perform and keep. So help me God." The faith of the Queen was well recorded and despite the privilege of her position, I have no doubt that at times she earnestly needed the help of God to keep the oaths she had made. A life of service can't always be easy, especially one lived in the spotlight.

In this ancient ceremony, using the oil of Chrism pressed from Olives from the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem, the Archbishop of Canterbury will perform the anointing, a duty which has been undertaken since1066. It seems fitting that the new King will be anointed with fruits of the earth that he has been campaigning to protect for over 50 years. We shall then become a nation of pomp and parties with bunting, fun, fizz and cake aplenty. From 18th May, during the ten days between the festival of the Ascension and Pentecost Christians will join a global prayer movement, called 'Thy Kingdom Come'. We will pray for our world, for the church, for our communities and for ourselves. You might recognise the phrase 'Thy Kingdom Come' it is from the Lord's prayer taught by Jesus to his disciples.

But what is this Kingdom that we are praying for? God's kingdom is a topsy-turvy one. God's is king and everyone is welcomed, everyone is loved. It's a place where kindness, truth, justice and compassion rule. It's not a separate place, somewhere we go to, it's a state of being and it's what we pray every day – 'Thy Kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven'. I wonder what our streets would look like if heaven touched earth? How might our communities be different?

As we come together this month to be community, maybe to celebrate the coronation, maybe just to be with friends and family on a bank holiday (hopefully a sunny one!) I pray that we too will continue to life lives of compassion and service, recognising that everyone is important and valued whatever their status.



Nature Notes

Following the drought-like conditions of February (2 mm recorded in my gauge) and a very wet March (94 mm), April has been about average and a little cooler than expected. However local plants and animals seem undeterred, as the roadside verges are boasting wildflowers and the birds are breeding. On a recent stroll Lesser periwinkle, Purple dead-nettle, Greater stitchwort, Lesser celandine and Cow parsley were all encountered in just a few hundred yards. They certainly brighten up a walk.




The grandchildren were with us for Easter and spent a lot of time in the garden. One day they rushed indoors to report a "lizard in the pond". Investigation revealed that our common newts have returned and will soon be breeding. One thing I didn't know about newts was that they

feed on frog tadpoles along with the more traditional land and water invertebrates. Seems a little grisly – I suppose they can differentiate between frogs and their own tadpoles...

It's always nice to hear the first singing chiffchaff of the spring and for me this was on 6th April in the garden. Ten days later a blackcap was heard and now both can be heard whenever you venture out of the house. On the 19th April, while cleaning out a garden shed, I noticed a mass of leaves behind a paint can and investigated. A small bird flew off and out the open door and I was able to peer into the nest where there was a clutch of brown-mottled tiny eggs. The shed door is normally closed but a window is permanently open, affording entry to an inquisitive bird. I will now have to suspend the spring clean until the young have fledged and meantime will have to snoop further to see if it is a wren or a great tit. Wrens do like to nest inside buildings, so this is the main suspect.

Last month the big surprise was the mandarin ducks; this month it is a breeding pair of dabchicks, or little grebes. In the spring I usually encounter these charming little diving birds on local water bodies, but they seem to move on after a short stay and I've never seen young. This time I

was scanning Alderford Farm pond when, quite by chance, I came across a dabchick on a nest. They build a floating nest anchored to submerged or overhanging vegetation and it was pure luck that I spotted it. I look forward to seeing the young when they hatch.





Patch Patroller

This month is a busy one for the work that needs to be done in the garden!

Dead head daffodils, tulips and hyacinths, cutting the old flower heads and the stems down to the base of the bulb and removing them before any seed formation – but leave the leaves to die off naturally! Also, remember to feed the bulbs if you're leaving them in the ground until next season – a brand of general fertiliser is ideal.

When cutting the grass, lower the mower blades a notch and rake out any moss. Lawn sand, applied with an applicator, is ideal to for greatest coverage when killing moss – you will notice the moss turns black as it dies.

Look out for nesting birds and those on the ground when trimming shrubs. I have a pair of French Partridge who have nested behind a water butt in a quiet corner of the garden

It was a shame many magnolias and camellias suffered frost damage last month – they should be generating new growth for next year; again, a feed of general-purpose fertiliser will not go amiss.

A rhododendron or azalea makes a striking 'dot' plant. By that I mean you can place them where they catch the eye when entering a garden or turning a corner but they do need an acid loving soil – they can be planted in a large container with ericaceous compost if need be.



In the vegetable garden, plant out courgettes, French beans, runner beans and outdoor cucumbers at the end of the month, once the risk of frost is minimal. Brassicas need to be planted outside now if you have not already done so.

House plants can benefit from repotting and a feed in early summer. Step up your watering if you have greenhouse plants or plants in a conservatory. Use the finger test – if the compost feels damp, excellent, if it's wet, hold back on your watering regime for a few days.

Hopefully, once all this is done, we can sit in our gardens for a little while and take in the beauty of nature.

Don't get sunburnt out there!

Think Road Safety

Speed limits and speeding in the villages. PLEASE SLOW DOWN

In the April issue, page 11, Little Maplestead Parish Council reported on the, currently, unsuccessful efforts for reducing the 40mph speed limit through the village to 30mph. In consideration of thinking about road safety, we are grateful for the below communication from a worried resident, which is beneficial for everyone to consider and share:



'As indicated on page eleven about the speed that most drivers drive through the villages. As I have said I now have to use a crutch when I walk following nine very bad falls in six months. Lowering the speed as suggested from 40mph to 30 mph would make no difference at all.


The other month I was driving through Pebmarsh to get out onto the Halstead road to go into town to do some shopping, under the speed limit and with care. Passing the Pebmarsh War Memorial and approaching the school, which has a 20mph limit at certain times of the day, which was in force at the time I was passing. The car behind me sounded its horn and with great speed passed me outside the school gates and had to cut me up so as to miss a store delivery van which nowadays are quite large, that was coming up from the Pebmarsh village street. In fact it was passing the school playing field, so you can imagine there was not a lot of room between me and the delivery van.

I am constantly aware of the high speed that drivers do through our villages, but are the drivers aware of the law that came into force in January 2022?

Drivers must give a **MINIMUM** of two meters from their vehicle, at a speed no more than **TWELVE MILES AN HOUR** for **CYCLIST, DOG WALKERS, HORSE RIDERS AND PEDESTRIAN.** Now I know that to give the space between vehicle and the above through the country lanes is not always possible, but you can slow down or stop.

The other problem I find are **pedestrians with or without dogs**, walk in dark clothing in our dark roads and expect drivers to see them and miss them. I had abuse from two teenagers when I stopped and asked them, how much is their life worth? I have a HIGH-VIS rap on jacket which cost £1.50 and a HIGH-VIS waterproof long sleeve coat, pockets with zip and button front and built-in-hood that cost £10.00, which I wear if I go out in the dark.

I hope you will be able to find a space in the next Parish News to put **THINK ROAD SAFETY** in, in an effort to try and slow down the speed of vehicles through our villages.' AND to ensure pedestrians consider the BE SAFE, BE SEEN initiative!



Grounded by Dr. James Canton

We are so pleased to be able to provide some exciting news on a local author...James lives in Little Maplestead and is planning to do a talk in the summer at Little Maplestead church. The book has been reviewed recently in the Financial Times and Wall Street Journal, among other places, so keep an eye out for news on that event & in the meantime maybe seek out the book or get in touch with James!



A personal journey through our ancient landscapes, and how we can heal our ruptured connection with them and the natural world

For thousands of years, our ancestors held a close connection with the landscapes they lived in. They imbued it with meaning: stone monuments, sacred groves, places of pilgrimage. In our modern world we have rather lost that enchantment and intimate knowledge of place.

James Canton takes us on a journey through England seeking to see through more ancient eyes, to understand what landscape meant to those that came before us. We visit stone circles, the West Kennet long barrow, a Crusader round church and sites of religious visions. We meet the Dagenham Idol and the intricately carved Lion Man figure. We find artefacts buried in farmers' fields. There is history and meaning encoded into the lands and places we live in, if only we take the time to look.

Our natural world has never been under more threat. If we relocate our sense of wonder, veneration and awe in the landscapes we live in, we might just be better at saving it.

· James Canton's previous book, The Oak Papers, was selected as a Radio 4 Book of the Week and has had a strong critical reception. Grounded builds on Canton's reputation in nature writing but has a broader appeal.

• Grounded opens up the sacred spaces of the past and shows us how amongst the frenzy of the modern world we can find spaces of quiet reflection and learn to stop and slow down.


• Grounded is also in part a personal journey, as James tries to make sense of his father's death from twenty years ago. As well as the public and ancient monuments he visits on his journey, he also invites us to consider the private markers in the landscape which are sacred to individuals and which connect us to the people from our past.

News from the Gardens of Easton Lodge

What do you know about the Countess of Warwick's socialism? Volunteer guides have always featured this in their tours of the Gardens, and the Trustees thought it is a part of the Countess' life worthy of being told in a bit more detail at the **21 May Open Day**. The Countess became a fully-fledged member of the Social Democratic Federation in 1904, campaigned for Independent Labour Party candidates in 1906 and installed socialist vicars in the parishes of Tilty and Thaxted. The Trust's archivists will be displaying fascinating stories, photos and details. Why not come and find out more?

On 21 May, as usual for a Sunday Open Day, there will be a range of plant, craft, honey, produce and information stalls; local duo Karen and Tony will be playing music; and of course a delicious range of homemade cakes and savoury snacks (bacon, cheese and hummus rolls).

The Gardens usually look at their best in May and are open every Thursday through the month, allowing visitors (and dogs on leads) to explore while the Trust's volunteers are hard at work. The Trust's volunteers provide hot and cold drinks and homemade cakes and visitors are welcome to bring picnics.

In May, the wild areas of the Gardens are full of fragrant cow parsley, with wild orchids in the long grass towards the end of the month and last year bee orchids too. It is iris and allium season, with yellow flags in the pond and blue iris, purple alliums and allium christophii punctuating the borders with vivid style. Everything is lush and green and there are still flowers on the trees – the apples and pear blossom, with luck the laburnum (for some



reason it sometimes skips a year!), and also the chestnuts.

We love having the school in church and enjoy welcoming them and their parents to St John the Baptist Church and hope for their continued support.

Defibrillator

- The Pebmarsh defibrillator is in the phone box outside the pub and fully operational.

- Dial the ambulance service on 999 to obtain the code to access it.
- Remain with the patient and ask a friend/neighbour to collect the defibrillator as a matter of urgency give them the access code.

- The ambulance service will tell you how to use the defibrillator; the defibrillator itself will also give you instructions.



Pebmarsh History Corner

Much has changed in Pebmarsh over the centuries, but one thing that has not is the sound of the church bells. We might take for granted when the bells ring out, that what we are hearing is almost exactly what the peasant farmer or Lord of the Manor would have heard back in the 1400s. Consider too all the celebrations over the centuries for which the bells would have provided the backdrop being heard across the fields of Pebmarsh. Here is an extract from the Revd Bayley's book Pebmarsh Church, published in 1946. [Readers will note the article on the life of Revd Bayley in April's magazine]:

In the tower are six bells and a bell for the clock in the turret above it. The only ancient bell, the tenor, by John Bird, is of early-fifteenth-century date. On its shoulder is a medallion of six fleur-de-lis in an octagonal frame, which also appeared on Bird's bell at Little Horkesley (now broken by enemy action.

The present fifth was installed by Mr J C Ambrose of Sudbury who took away two broken bells and made no charge. Nothing is known of the date of these bells.

In 1906 an entirely new bell-frame, made by Mr S Sturgeon, wheelwright of Pebmarsh, was installed, the present fourth was recast, and the present second and third placed in the tower. The recast bell reproduced an original inscription 'Miles Graves Made Me 1667'.

The clock bell, inscribed 'Tho = Gardiner Fecit 1737' is from the foundry of the well-known Sudbury bell-founder, and is one of a group of eight or ten Essex bells cast in that year.

Formerly a bell was rung in harvest time as a signal for the gleaners. The morning bell was at 8am. It rang again in the evening for them to cease. Payments for the ringing appear regularly in the accounts, the last being in 1886.

The Death Knell is rung 12 or 24 hours after death: three for a man, two for a woman, one for a child. But relatives do not now always ask for it.

The bells are rung on New Year's Eve at midnight, and usually at 6.30am on Great Festivals. On Sundays they are rung before morning and evening

service, if sufficient ringers are available. One bell is rung for five minutes before service begins.


