passion for basket weaving. She did find those friends; and, behold, the Tidewater Basketry Guild was born. Twenty-five years later, what a gift she has bestowed upon us: that is, a life-long interest in basket weaving inducing happiness and a sense of accomplishment. We miss her already, yet her spirit exists in all aspects of our guild. It is now our responsibility to carry on this beautiful legacy that we have inherited. Indeed, the guild joyously pledges to commit to this duty.

Jamie VanOekel has retired!



In loving memory and tribute to Billie Dorris aka "Queen Mother"



Billie Dorris, one of our founding members of the Tidewater Basketry Guild, affectional known as the Queen Mother, passed away on Jan. 19, 2021. She leaves behind her husband Johnnie, her son Willie, daughter in law Susie and a ton of friends.

In 1995 Billie contacted a few basket weavers, inviting them to her house and that was the beginning of the Tidewater Basket Guild. Billie held many board positions and chaired Winter Weave and Guilders Weave throughout the early years of the guild.

I met Billie at the Virginia Beach Spring Craft show in 2001. Wanting to learn basket weaving she set me up with a brochure and her phone number. After becoming a member, it seemed that Billie was always there. Teaching, offering advice and sometimes calling me out across the room when I had done something wrong.

Billie was one of the most giving people I have ever met and she became a great friend and mentor. We traveled to conventions together, wove together and I even nursed her bleeding hand at NCBA when she stabbed it with an awl.


Did you know Billie loved to cook? She was once a test cook for the magazine Cook's Illustrated and I can say that whenever I was at her house, she always had something delicious prepared for us. It could be anything from a simple dessert to a full meal. She loved to share recipes and tips that she learned.

I remember once when I was having a hard day, I called just to chat she said "Cindy sometimes you need to just stop and think about yourself. After you've rested then you're better able to do the rest of the things you must." I have this printed out and posted in my office at work and home. It is hard to believe that I can never pick up the phone or send that email to her and expect that opinionated, spicy response back.

We will all miss her candor, her laugh and her advice. I am honored to say that I was her friend and will never forget the fun we have had over these 20 years. Thank you B for all the advice and fun over the years, I will truly miss you.

Building a friendship with Billie took time. Only then did you begin to appreciate her generosity, humor and intelligence. Basketry was not her only forte'. She was also an accomplished cook, an avid reader and kitchen gadget collector who had lived the Air Force wife life prior to settling in Virginia Beach.

To me, she was a mentor and friend I could count on for very honest feedback if I had a question – and sometimes even if I *didn't* have a question!

Conversations at her kitchen table will always be some of my most cherished memories. Billie appreciated unique and unusual art and challenging basketry techniques. She would dive into a new topic or technique to gain as much knowledge as she could. There was always something interesting that she wanted to share.

TBG, as a whole, was very fortunate that Billie was among the founding members of the guild. As a group, those ladies set the course for the guild we enjoy today. I miss her greatly and will make it a point to *stay curious* to honor her memory.

Laura White remembers Billie:

The loss of our Queen Mother, Billie Dorris, has been a real heart breaker for many of our guild members and fellow weavers.

As one of my best friends for over thirty years, I am missing the quick funny phone calls and the emails sharing the latest article from the Washington Post. She was always trying to keep me updated on current events. We did so many things together over the years from NCBA conventions, a fantastic trip to the Stowe Basketry Festival in Vermont, guild displays and endless classes. As a master weaver, Billie was always a warm and generous friend willing to share her time and materials with anyone interested.

She befriended and offered her talents to our new weavers as they joined our Guild. The honorary title "Queen Mother" came from her willingness to lead our guild, her encouragement to new weavers, and her active participation in all guild events.





Arlene Wallace remembers Billie:

When I think of Billie the first memory, I have is waxed linen...strange for the queen of Nantucket's you might think. The first meeting I attended they were teaching a waxed linen flower basket the size of a quarter...I tried as best I could and Billie was my help mate. It never finished and after about 10 years I threw it away.

Billie introduced me to Nantucket's and I love them. She loved sharing her knowledge and tricks of the trade. And I'm talking real rims not cheaters. The process has changed over the years.

She remarked on several occasions that she was surprised I ever returned to the guild after my first encounter. A couple of years ago Billie gave me a waxed linen flower basket she had made and a Nantucket candy dish, I cherish. She was always kind and helped me with different techniques. She loved sharing her knowledge of basket weaving.

I remember when I first joined the guild being "scared" of Billie. But as time went on we became best of friends. You always knew when you asked her something you got a very honest answer. Years later the "scared" returned when our president Jamie VanOekel asked me to weave a basket for Billie as a thank you gift the year she was GW Chair. YES came out of my mouth way too quick. When I later thought what could "I" weave for such an accomplished weaver as Billie Dorris!

The basket ended up one of the baskets I am most proud of. I presented it to her at GW and went on to display it in the exhibit room at NCBA that year and won my first blue ribbon.

Remembering is a powerful thing. To remember is to put back together something that has been torn apart. As I re-member Billie, my hope is that I might weave back into the world a part of the joy with which she filled my life. Thank you, Billie, for the simple gift of you. Your presence in our lives was priceless. You will live on in our hearts forever.
