"What next?" questioned Me Me, so decided to take the time and check


it out - followed the crowd but had a hard time understanding why there was no invitation to this event. After all Me Me was the winner of the contest, brought all this information back to the community - - now - -.





I was contacted by law enforcement and informed that, despite the fact that "recreational" marijuana legalization failed in 2022, the tokers are ramping up for another push. The officer asked if I would put in my 2-cents worth. Background? I have been in law enforcement since 1978, the head of 2 strike forces in the late 80's thru 1996 and, I have prosecuted over 6,000 felony drug cases in Missouri (the number 2 producer of pot in the world). Everything from arresting to prosecuting. I have also lost 3 childhood friends to drug use (both personal OD's, suicide and violence on the street) and, one of my very close family members developed full-blown schizophrenia solely from self-medicating depression with marijuana (both legal and illegal) and, now, living on the street. So, as I was trained, "a man with experience is never at the mercy of a man with an opinion" and, my experience (both inside and outside the courtroom) is that the public is only hearing half the story from pop culture opinions and, ignoring the rest of the story.

Dakota has been legalized since 2016. Under Chapter 19-24.1, an individual who has been diagnosed by a health care provider as having a debilitating medical condition, can get a registry identification card from the state and, under the supervision of that health care provider, purchase tetrahydrocannabinol (THC, the active ingredient in marijuana) medical marijuana product(s) from a licensed "compassion center." The same methodology as any other prescription medication which requires a licensed medical professional's prescription and supervision-you know, the whole public safety thing. This new push is to use THC as a recreational intoxication platform, without medical oversight, and nothing could be a worse idea based on my experiences.

Medical marijuana in North

Don't ignore history! In the late 70's if you got caught holding pot, we dumped it out and wrote you a citation in city court. That led to cocaine in the early 80's, crack cocaine in the late 80's, methamphetamine in the 90's, designer drugs in the new millennium and the current fentanyl horror. The moral? Tolerance leads to more dangerous substances, increases users, abuse and death. And, in regards to marijuana, as per the Yale School of Medicine, the THC content I dealt with thru the 90's was at about 4%. But. by 2017, with horticulture enhancement, 17% and, as of August, 2023, currently standing at 90%. The result in states which have legalized pot? Decreases in memory/attention, judgment, poor reflexes, anxiety, panic and psychosis; and, for younger users (under age 21), changes in brain structure (particularly the prefrontal cortex) which increases the risk of developing schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, depression, and anxiety. And, lest we forget, the overdoses of young children from consuming their adult family member's gummies, brownies and other "products". So, my suggestion? No man is an island. Before you only hear one side of this story, I would do some independent research before you vote because it is NOT incumbent on the rest of us to be at the mercy of those who wish to imbibe! Right, NY, LA, Portland, Seattle, Minneapolis, et. al,?





Elaine Froese Speaks During PCCD Winter Workshop and Awards Luncheon

The Perkins County Conservation District held their Growing With A Purpose Winter Workshop & Awards Luncheon on Wednesday, January 31 at the Beeler Building in Lemmon,

SD. Elaine Froese, farm family transition expert from Boessevain, Manitoba, Canada presented her Tools For Transition workshop throughout the day.

Eido/Connect Country

Froese is a certified professional speaker, certified coach and four-time book author focusing on farm families who want better communication and conflict resolution to secure a successful farm transition. Froese shared simple, practical, and actionable tools with the attendants that will help them talk about tough issues and get traction in their farm transitions. Seventy people attended the event, including sponsors and booth vendors.

Over lunch, the Perkins County Conservation District presented the 2024 District Awards which included Outstanding Conservationist, Ag Educator of the Year, and Tree Stewardship.

Outstanding Conservationist: This award is meant to recognize individuals or operations that have demonstrated innovation, experimentation, and passion in both agriculture and conservation. It also looks to showcase those who are community members and share their experience with others to improve our natural resources.

Winners: Bart and Shannon Carmichael, Wedge Tent Ranch For almost 30 years, Bart and Shannon Carmichael have ranched north of Faith, SD where they raise registered black angus cattle. Through practices such as cross fencing, rotational grazing, water tanks, electric fences, bale grazing and others he has been able to increase his carrying capacity, improve warm season grasses, increase conception rate, and reduce input costs. The Carmichaels give credit to NRCS employee Ryan Beer and the South Dakota Grassland Coalition as playing an integral part in the implementation and success of the conservation practices used on Wedge Tent Ranch. Bart is heavily involved in the South Dakota Grassland Coalition and has served on the Board of Directors for the last few years. He has spoken at numerous events and workshops including Grazing School.

those folks that have shown effort and experimentation in utilizing shelterbelts for livestock, soil, or homestead protection as well as wildlife habitat, aesthetics, or multiple purposes.

Winner: Drayton Ranch

In 2009, Dennis and Lynda Drayton left Nebraska and moved to Lemmon, SD where they bought a ranch 5 miles east of town. Paul and Lori Drayton had just moved to Lemmon prior to that and were soon joined by Mike and Stacy Drayton. After operating the ranch for a couple years, it became apparent that there was not adequate protection for the harsh winters due to the old windbreaks that

had died. A plan was developed with help from the NRCS office in Bison to tear out the old windbreaks and re-establish them as well as plant new windbreaks that would provide protection from storms. The first project completed was the removal of the old windbreaks and planting new trees in 2011. The second tree plot was planted into sod which worked well with the grass. re-establishing quickly right up next to the fabric. The Drayton's continued to look after the trees over the years through mowing and watering in drought years. They Drayton's are thankful for the planning and financial assistance that the NRCS provided

as well as the Perkins County Conservation District who planted the trees and laid the fabric. These windbreaks will provide protection from winter storms for livestock and wildlife for generations to come.

A silent auction was also held and raised \$548.00 for a scholarship opportunity for local high school students. The Perkins County Conservation District would like to thank all of the sponsors who helped make this event possible as well as all those that were able to come and attend the event. Andrew Erickson Barn North Dakota National Register of Historic Places

The Andrew Erickson barn was officially nominated by the North Dakota Historic Preservation Review Board in October 2023 and was accepted by the National Register of Historic Places in December 2023. The National Register of Historic Places, established by the Secretary of the Interior under provisions of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1990, is the official list of the Nation's cultural properties worthy of preserva-

According to the nomination the Andrew Frickson Barn sits on the property purchased by Andrew and Mayme Erickson, of Swedish and Norwegian descent respectively, in roughly 1939 from Mike Kamanda who homesteaded the place. The barn is located on the east side of Highway 8, north and east of Hettinger, in Adams Countv. Andrew's home place was to the north a few miles and Mayme's home place was to the west a few miles, so this location was a perfect location to begin their family. Andrew (05/05/1911-02/20/2010) and wife Mayme Thormodsgard Erickson (01/25/1918-09/28/2006) grew their family of eight surviving children, raising dairy and beef cattle, horses, and farming wheat and alfalfa hay for feed. Their livelihood was dependent upon this barn and the cows milked and raised there. Andrew was drafted to World War II to Fort Snelling, Minneapolis, MN, and appeared for enlistment. However, upon hearing he had three young children, a wife, and a dairy and beef farm to take care of, he was told to go home. This dairy barn sent milk in 8-gallon cream cans by way of the Milwaukee Railroad first to Aberdeen, SD and then finally to the Mandan Creamery in Mandan, ND.

As cited in the nomination, "North Dakota's early agriculture picture saw 80% of families living on farms and 80% of farm income coming from wheat. This led to a push to introduce dairying as a means to diversify the economy after experiencing some drought years. Dairying really began in North Dakota in the 1890s with the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station in Fargo starting a Dairy Department in 1894 and managing a dairy herd. The number of creameries and factories in the state quickly increased and then doubled again in less than 10 years. A second Experiment Station in Hettinger, ND was opened in 1909 to further research dairy. The numbers in 1912 included approximately 191,000 milk cows and 86 creameries in the state. Since 1913, better practices increased

production of dairy, which first led to an increase in farms with dairy cattle but then also resulted in a reduction of total cows and facilities in the state. The North Dakota Department of Agriculture's map of dairy farms listed on 44 Grade A and 2 Grade B dairy farms as of April 11, 2022. Prior to this push for commercialization, dairy labor was undervalued and considered women's work so an adequate number of mail dairy laborers to hire did not exist. Additionally, dairy products had primarily been traded previously so were not seen as great income contributions for the farm, which limited many individual farmers' willingness to make investments to increase opera-

Built in 1952, the barn was designed as a dairy barn by Haynes Equity, who served as the architect, and built by Donald Rose, Sr., New England, ND. The plan was specific for a maximum of 16 dairy cows. Today, it is used for horses, heifers, and cold storage.

The dairy barn measures 30' x 100' with 3' deep concrete footings plus an additional 3' concrete wall on top of the footings. The electrical is all wired in conduit. The roof utilized a rare type for North Dakota - the Gothic arch. According to the North Dakota Cultural Resources Survey, less than 3.5% of rectangular-plan barns have an arched roof and only 10 were built between 1945 and 1960. The barn suffered a major hailstorm in 1990, which resulted in the replacement of cedar shingles with steel, the west door with a vertical lift door, and one pane out of one window was replaced. No other alterations have been made to this barn.

The original design included an open dirt floor and no hay mow as Andrew Erickson felt it would be too enclosed and crowded for his wishes. Once he added the milking machines, he added a concrete slab on the west end that was approximately 30'x10' to make the milking area more sanitary and easier to clean. The feed room also had a concrete floor that helped protect the feed in the enclosed room. All the posts and beams are in their original form.

The walls are sheeted with horizontal 1" x 10" planks and clad in horizontal cedar lap siding. The roof is also sheeted with planks first and then the curved steel for the roof. Lynn Erickson, a son of Andrew and Mayme's, installed the metal roof with his four-man crew construction business (Lynn Erickson Construction).

Windows are located only on the south side and have never one pane in one window. There are nine windows with each being 28" x 34". Each window has four vertical panes. The placement on only one side was done primarily for maintenance reasons and choosing the south side made sense due to the sun. The 3' concrete sidewall increased weather protection of the barn as well as insulation in the summer and winter.

There were originally two sliding doors, one on the west end and one on the east end. The west door was replaced with a vertical lift door, roughly in 2018, due to deterioration but the original exterior sliding track is still in place. The door on the east end was rebuilt around 2000 with a wood frame covered with ribbed steel. There is no pedestrian door. Small doors on the west and east ends, above the main doors, for a hay mow are original. They were installed in case Andrew ever decided to add a hay mow. He never did, so the doors have never been used.


After the barn was erected, an unattached 18' x 40' silo was built on the northeast corner of the barn without a roof. A few years later, a small room with a sliding door on the east was built between the barn and silo and used as an elevator room. The silage stored in the silo would be pitched out into the silo chute and as it would hit the elevator shaft below, the elevator would then push it into the wagon. There is not access between this room and the barn and it stands empty today.

The dairy cattle came in the east door and were fed first in the large open area. Then, they were trained to come towards the milking area where they were tied with a short rope to be milked, first by hand and later by machine. There are three 10' x 10' stalls in the southwest corner that were used for bucket calves and horses as the need arose. There is an enclosed room inside the barn on the northwest side, opposite the stalls, that stored grain for the dairy cattle.


Andrew and Mayme lived on this farm until heading to a retirement home in the early 2000s. Mayme passed away in 2006, followed by Andrew in February 2010. Their son Vern and his wife Dyanne took over the farm and live there to this day. The dairy barn hosted a Semi-Retirement Party and Dance for Vern in the summer of 2011. Over 80 people were served a meal and danced to a DJ throughout the night, continuing the tradition of hosting social events in the barn. The furthest guest in attendance was Vern's Agriculture Work Ex-New South Wales.



According to the Common Farm and Ranch Barns in North Dakota Multiple Property Documentation Form, all resources eligible under the context should be considered eligible under Criterion A "for their contributions to the broad patterns in history associated with trends in the development of farms and ranches throughout the state of North Dakota." The Erickson Barn retains a high degree of integrity, provides an excellent example of its type with the

In the movie the character



Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

Last time we saw the plan of Naomi for securing a husband for Ruth begin to unfold. Let us recall that Ruth crept unnoticed to the spot where Boaz was sleeping after feasting at his threshing floor and uncovered his feet. When he awoke and asked who she was, Ruth replied, "I am Ruth, your maidservant. Take your maidservant under your wing, for you are a close relative" (Ruth 3:9). Here Ruth was asking Boaz to take her as his wife. But she was being even more bold than that, for she reminds Boaz that he is a close relative. However, "close relative" is not the best translation of the word. We saw several weeks ago that this word is actually "kinsman-redeemer," and we noted that a kinsman-redeemer was a relative who, among other things, could redeem family members from slavery and even, if he should desire, marry a deceased brother's wife so that their first child would carry on the deceased man's name. Now Boaz was under no obligation to fulfill any roles of kinsman-redeemer. He was not Ruth's brother-in-law, nor was Ruth, a Moabite, someone he had any responsibility toward. But Ruth was appealing to him on the basis of their mutual close relationship to Naomi, for anything he might do for Ruth would also bless Naomi by carrying on her family name.

I believe that what made Ruth willing to take such bold steps is quite simply that she knew what Boaz was like. He was a man of honor and integrity and above all, godliness. So this made Ruth, a poor widow from a foreign country, willing to risk asking this man of noble reputation if he would marry her. In verse 10 we see Boaz's reaction: "Then he said, 'Blessed are you of the LORD, my daughter! For you have shown more kindness at the end than at the beginning, in that you did not go after young men, whether poor or rich." He doesn't take Ruth's proposal the wrong way and is honored that she chose him above younger men. But verse 11 goes on to tell us the main reason why he is happy about her proposal: "And now, my daughter, do not fear. I will do for you all that you request, for all the people of my town know that you are a virtuous woman." What impresses Boaz most about Ruth is her character. Though Proverbs 31:10 had not been written at that time, Boaz knew the truth of it: "Who can find a virtuous wife? For her

worth is far above rubies." Next time, Lord willing, we shall see that there was one obstacle in the way of a possible marriage between Boaz and Ruth. But to conclude today, let us consider how important it is to look for a spouse with godly character. Yes, there needs to be physical attraction, but that will eventually diminish as the years go by. Far more crucial is to marry one who has true godliness, which will not fade but increase over time. Believers in the Lord Jesus Christ are commanded not to marry unbelievers. We read in 2 Corinthians 6:14-15, "Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness? And what accord has Christ with Belial? Or what part has a believer with an unbeliever?" Young people who are believers in Christ and desire to be married, look for a spouse of "like precious faith" (2 Peter 1:1). Be sure that you seek a life partner who is trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ alone for salvation. Ask God to provide for you someone who will not only be a companion in this life, but with whom you will spend all eternity in the presence of Christ.

Prayer Cross Ministry

Prayer Cross Ministry

The history of the Prayer Crosses starts in 2016 with Dan, who loved the Lord and doing one of his favorite retirement hobbies, wood working. Dan's good friend Ron was dying of cancer and Dan made him a prayer cross. Ron passed away in February of 2016 holding onto the Prayer Cross that Dan made for him. Dan, a leading member of Hope Lutheran Church in Fargo, ND, shared the story with many of his friends and inspired the Men of Hope to start a Prayer Cross Ministry to make similar prayer crosses to provide comfort, peace and inspiration for people in need.

About a month after Ron's death a handful of men met and cut out 15 to 20 crosses. These were cut from discarded wood scraps from a cabinet shop. In the following days a design was finalized and branding irons were made. The design included the branding of the words Faith, Hope and Love on one side of the cross and the star of Bethlehem and the manger on the other. By the end of April over 300 crosses were made and branded. About this time, the Prayer Cross Ministry took life and over 1600 crosses were made by the end of 2016.

The parishioners of Hope Lutheran in Fargo embraced the Prayer Cross Ministry and donated money to expand an existing garage into a large 2 room workshop in 2022. The space was dedicated to the Prayer Cross Ministry and named "The Garage of Hope." Approximately 20-25 people meet twice a month to make the crosses. The people meet for pizza and devotions and then spend 2 hours at multiple workstations cutting out, sanding and routering cross edges and branding the words and symbols of inspiration. The crosses then go through a final inspection and any imperfections in the crosses are dealt with individually.

Over 900 crosses are now completed in a night with the total exceeding 64,000 to date. The ministry has evolved from a handful of people to include over 150 men, women and young people from Hope and other churches. Anyone with the desire "to make a difference in someone's life" through this ministry is invited to join.

The prayer crosses have been distributed free to members of Hope, the community, hospitals, homeless shelters and on personal and mission trips all around the world. These symbols of Christ have touched people's lives locally and worldwide. The stories are endless.

Over the years, the crosses have evolved. Although the shape has remained the same the sizes have not. The group makes a full "palm sized cross" and also a smaller "1/2 palm size cross". The smaller size was first made 2 years ago for the children who were attending the Vacation Bible School that Hope held that year. These were enthusiastically received and now the ministry makes both sizes for distribution.

The wood used to make the crosses has come from many sources. What started out as discarded cabinet wood, old floor planking or wood from family farm buildings is now made out of mostly kiln dried aromatic cedar. It is a beautiful wood with many varying colors and is soft and easy to work with. The original slow and messy process of varnishing the crosses has now been replaced with just leaving them in their natural state. As people palm the crosses the natural oil from our skin helps smooth out and enhance the beauty of the crosses

"Imperfect crosses, made by imperfect people, made to be finished as we work out our imperfections with the LORD."

I personally love this ministry as wood working is one of my favorite hobbies. It gives me the opportunity to share time with great people that have a common goal. I am inspired by the stories I hear about how the crosses have made a difference in people's lives and have touched the hearts of many. When you don't know what to say or do for someone that is grieving or experiencing the difficulties of life, the cross says it all. It is a symbol and reminds us of Christ's unconditional love for each one of us in a world that is often dominated by hate and heart ache. Giving something away that I have made with my own hands creates a level of satisfaction and gratification that comes from giving the most precious thing I can give to someone else. My time! It is a priceless commodity that we all have. It is a limited resource. It cannot be bought, nor can it be retrieved once gone. Serving others is how we live out our faith by following the words of Christ and shown in our actions towards others. We are encouraged by GOD to not just "talk the talk" but to "walk the walk" and love and serve others.









Prayer Cross Ministry Helps Community Kicking Cancer Organization

Community Kicking Cancer is a nonprofit organization, started in 2016, Federal tax exempt and deductible. Our goal is to raise money to provide cash cards and homemade comfort blankets for rural people receiving chemotherapy and or radiation treatments traveling from southwestern North Dakota and northwestern South Dakota.

We raise money through fundraisers, raffles, and donations for our cause. As of date, we have given out 271 blankets, donated to 12 fundraisers, given \$55,800 in gas and cash cards. **Prayer Cross Ministry has recently supplied us with crosses to be included.** 100 % of donations go towards cash cards or materials for making comfort blankets.

This volunteer organization is open to anyone and everyone that want to participate in raising money for people going through cancer treatment in our rural communities.
