



We need to thank Dr. Ricks and his staff at the Dickinson Clinic for believing us when we showed concerns about Benjamins developmental delays and getting us to the appropriate medical professionals without delay. We need to thank the Dr's and staff at the Minnesota Childrens Hospital for the three weeks we spent there over the two trips. Their hospitality and professionalism as we went through the testing, treatment, and palliative care plans for Benjamin set us up that when we came home, we were prepared and ready to keep him home through the end.

Upon arriving home and informing the school the support and understanding we received from administrators, teachers, staff and our children's friends, coaches, and parents of our school has been nothing short of extraordinary. From the show of support from the entire girls BB team and most of the staff at the funeral to the "Go Blue for Ben" night at the girls Basketball game where our crowd looked like it was cheering for another team there was so much blue in the stands.

We don't like to generalize but we can pretty much thank the whole of the communities of Mott, Regent. Elgin, and New Leipzig for the outpouring of generosity they have shown our family the past six months. We joke that Angela, and I haven't cooked a meal in over six months and we will need to learn how again as we received meal after meal from community members, family, friends, and neighbors. To live in small communities is in many ways to have an extended family. Everyone knows your business. but it is because most everybody has a vested interest in the happiness, success, and sustainability of each family in the community. Our communities have met every aspect of that mantra, and we are forever grateful to be part of these communities and do our part to keep them successful.

We would be remiss not to thank our employers who have been so crucial through this journey. The Southwest District Health Unit and West River Health Services that employ Angela let her take a leave of absence without question so she could be the caretaker for Benjamin and manage his condition. They kept her in the loop on what was happening and showed her support in every way and let her know her position was waiting for her when she was ready. The North Dakota Army National Guard who employs me was flexible with my job and encouraged me to take time with family. My supervisor SFC Justin Jacob and my BN Operations Officer CPT Alix Kling were exceptional in both supporting me in my day-to-day career and being there for emotional support when needed.

Our immediate family has been our rock while on this path. Steadfast and reliable we could always rely on Brad and Lena Greff and Dan and Marla Larson as our parents and Benjamins Grandparents to be available, helpful, and caring. From Dan and Marla coming across the state for extended stays and making weeks' worth of food and entertaining the children to Brad and Lena making daily visits to talk to Benjamin and give Angela someone to talk to. To our siblings, nieces, and nephews who through calling or visiting made each day more bearable and gave us that avenue to talk whenever we needed it.

Our children have impressed Angela and I from the day of their respective births, while we are biased it does not take away from the extraordinary resiliency, they have displayed to us over the years. When we lost our first son John from Trisomy 18 and he was stillborn that had an impact on us a family but through talking and prayer we moved forward. When Benjamin was born a healthy baby boy and only five months later showed signs of regression, was diagnosed and over the next five months they had to watch him slowly regress they could have pulled away despaired. But they didn't. They kept their grades up (Mostly) they stayed in sports, they held Benjamin, asked questions about his condition, completed chores without complaint or question, played piano to him, sang to him, played around him and probably accidentally hit him with a pillow or two while roughhousing with each other. They made him part of our family's life and that is something that will never be forgotten by Benjamin or his siblings. Lastly but most importantly I need to thank my wife, Angela. I know she cannot be the best wife or mother because Facebook and social media has created far too much competition for those titles but I tell people that she has punched her ticket to heaven. And not just from being married to me. As a mother and woman, she has been the epitome of her namesake. From raising and managing a bustling household, excelling in her professional career, and now experiencing the loss of two of her sons I have always sat in awe of her, and that admiration only continues to grow. Her management of Benjamins care was not lost on anyone around her. Every day from his birth to his passing she was with him, fed him, cared for him, and loved him. It is visible in every one of her actions that her love for Benjamin was limitless and that his life had meaning to her that knows no bounds.

We are grateful to have shared in Benjamins short time on this place. We are also grateful to be surrounded by so many people in our families and our communities who have supported us on this journey. This thank you is a little wordy, but each previous draft left someone out or didn't express our full appreciation of the love we have felt as a family from the community. Thank you all



Back in September I bemoaned the KC Chiefs' loss to Detroit at Arrowhead. But, this week, I want to comment on something else that happened this past Sunday that doesn't speak very highly of "professional" sportsmanship. Recall that I was a football official (college and high school) commencing back at the turn of the century-25 years. That all ended in 2019 during the COVID. I had enough! And, the truth was that a truly repulsive phenomenon was just kicking-in to full swing where not really the players but, their parents were engaging in violent confrontations with opponents and officials at every level. It just wasn't fun anymore and I wanted out of the mess because you mimic what you see and, now, the kids are acting like thugs on/off the playing surface!

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
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SOLDIER FOR THE AGES By Francis Martin

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



John married Melanie Stevens, another highlight of my life. They have two daughters, Morgan and Camille and live in Tennessee

Mark lives on his place in rural Belle Fourche. I talked to him every day.

I loved to travel by bus, car, truck, plane, or train. I loved poetry and stories, writing them and giving oral presentations.

My latest challenge in life was learning to operate a smart phone. Hopefully I won't need it in the next life. The ultimate smart phone is the human body and I haven't figured that out either.

I lived in an apartment in Spearfish until I could no longer live alone and then moved into the Rolling Hills Nursing Home in Belle Fourche for about a week before having to go into ICU/Comfort Care at the Spear-

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

to Hettinger, ND. She always felt Hettinger was her home.


Goldie's life revolved around her family and friends. Many elderly in the Hettinger area had Goldie as a caregiver before transitioning to the nursing home.

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
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Thoughts for the Week



Firearms and Trap Club is Formed

The North Dakota Wildlife Federation (NDWF) is an association of local clubs (affiliate clubs) and individu-1935 by hunters, anglers, trappers, and farmers, who rallied around a common mission and vision, NDWF provides a single united voice in the interests of North Dakota's wildlife and habitat resources. The North Dakota Wildlife Federation is a grassroots organization, which protects and enhances North Dakota's wildlife, wildlife habitat and access to that habitat, and promotes hunting, fishing, trapping and other wildlife related activities through education, programs, and projects.

The NDWF wants to welcome and share the news of its newest affiliate club Beach Firearms and Trap Club in Beach, ND. This club is newly formed after being combined with the local Pheasants Forever Chapter for the past few years.

The club decided it wanted to focus on supporting the Beach High Trap Team and other projects that support als from across the state of youth in outdoor hunting and North Dakota. Founded in fishing skills. The new club members were approached about opportunities with the NDWF for grants that would help them accomplish these goals.

> Beach Firearms and Trap Club applied for and was awarded a \$2500 grant to help meet their costs of supporting the Beach High Trap Team (BHTT). This grant will support the 20 plus shooters on the team with ammunition, attending the State tournament in Fargo, and other equipment needed for the sport. The BHTT was established 7 years ago and holds weekly practices during the spring season. A practice or competition event will consist of shooting two 25 target rounds for a total of 50 targets from the 16-yard station. Up to five athletes (squad) will occupy the stations on a trap field. Station

one is assigned the "squad leader".

Trap and Shooting sports are one of the fastest growing sports in the United States. The sport at the high school level started in neighboring Minnesota when Jim Sable from the Plymouth Gun Club noticed that all the shooters at his local gun club were older than him and there was a need to recruit the next generation to the sport. Since 2001, the sport has taken off and is now in 30 states with over 40,000 participants.

NDWF wants to encourage clubs to support shooting sports through 4-H programs, High School teams, events, and local clubs. That is why there are several opportunities for funds to do this work. Check out our website for these opportunities. https://www.northdakotawildlife.org/grants

The other benefit of being an affiliate club of NDWF is the network of other clubs around the state of North
