I wanted to write and express my appreciation for the community of Bowman and the people who responded to an emergency on 1-12-24.

Our church group from Bismarck ND was traveling to Terry Peak in the Black Hills for a middle school ski retreat. There were roughly 25 of us on this trip, mostly middle school students. When we were roughly 8 miles north of Bowman, just North of the county line, our vehicle experienced a malfunction and failed on the side of the road. Within a few minutes the temperatures dropped, and we could see our breath in the air. There was another vehicle with us that was transporting kids to a warm location, but this was not going to work. We contacted 911 and requested assistance. Although only 1 officer was on duty for the Sheriff's department, there were 4 that responded. Jason Bullis, a male and female deputy, all responded even though they were off duty and enjoying their warm homes with their families. A game and fish agent also responded as well as the one county deputy that was working. Even though this incident was outside of their county, outside of their work hours, they decided to respond

contact a towing company to safely remove the bus from the side of the road.

The Frontier Travel Center staff were incredible to our group. The trucker's lounge was made available to us. and we were made to feel at home. While we were waiting for a back-up bus to come to our location Bowman residents would hear of what happened and offer to open their churches and homes to us if it was needed. This is the North Dakota I grew up in and living in a bigger town. It has been some time since I have seen the true heart of North Dakota as I saw

it that night in Bowman. I wanted to express my deep appreciation for all the officers and workers that responded to assist us. All went well above and beyond what anyone would expect. I also feel it is important that the people supervising these individuals know what a tremendous job they did in representing themselves, their agencies, and their community

The only name I was able to btain was that of Jason Bullis as I knew him at one of his previous positions. I am hoping you can identify the other individuals who assisted us and can pass on my deepest thanks to them for their response to our situation. 



. A stair chair for the New

Leipzig/Elgin Ambulance Service. Cost: \$4,790. The stair chair is a device that helps get people out of a house with stairs much easier for the patient and the responders.

• A RAD-57 EMS package for monitoring patients. Cost: \$4,324. The RAD-57 is used for the detection of carbon monoxide (CO) to prevent CO poisoning in our firefighters by checking them before they go back into a burning building. The RAD-57 detects CO, so they can be treated quickly.

- Ten adjustable patient beds. Cost: \$1,541 per bed. Older styles of hospital beds have not been updated for quite some time. More user-friendly beds are needed.
- A bathing system. Cost: \$26,221. This will replace the current bathing system, which is showing small cracks and needs to be updated.
- Ten recliners. Cost: \$1,000 each. Recliners need to be replaced in the activities room and patient rooms.

- 40 waterproof recliner covers. Cost: \$26 each. These covers will protect all the recliners in the activities room and hospital rooms from spills.
- · Repair to medical equipment. Cost: \$6,700. The wall-mounted aspirator needs parts to function correctly and is not working at this time. A portable aspirator is currently being used.

"JMHCC is a strong health care presence in the region and needs to update and add equipment to continue to provide the quality health care our patients have come to expect and deserve," said CEO Scott Brooks. "As a critical access hospital, we regularly provide life-saving care. We hope our supporters can help us fill this needs list during Giving Hearts Day."

Donors are encouraged to give a gift to cover the cost of an entire item or to donate toward the purchase of an item. Any funds received above the goal will be used for other needed equipment in the hospital and

for the ambulance.

Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus New Leipzia

We left off in our study last week at the point where Naomi tells Ruth that she is seeking security for her daughter-in-law by finding a husband for her. We resume in Ruth 2:2, where Naomi begins to reveal her plan by disclosing the name of the man she has in mind: "Now Boaz, whose young women you were with is he not our relative? In fact, he is winnowing barley tonight at the threshing floor." This surely must have immediately found approval with Ruth, for Boaz had already shown her unusual kindness and demonstrated that he was a godly and kind man. In addition, Boaz was a near relative who might be interested in fulfilling the role of a kinsman redeemer by marrying Ruth, taking over the inheritance of her deceased husband, and perpetuating the family

Naomi is sharp. The last part of verse 2 reveals how she had thought carefully about the details of her plan. She came up with a way for Ruth to be able to propose to Boaz that would provide a certain amount of secrecy and privacy. The plan would take place at the threshing floor. Now that the harvest was over, it was time to thresh. The workers would beat the grain to separate it from the chaff and then throw the grain into the air with pitch forks so that the wind would blow the chaff away and the good grain would fall back to the ground. And since Boaz supervised the threshing just as he did the harvesting, he would be at the threshing floor.

Naomi had carefully planned nat Ruth was to do. Note verse 3: "Therefore wash yourself and anoint yourself, put on your best garment and go down to the threshing floor; but do not make yourself known to the man un-

til he has finished eating and drinking." Without first telling her daughter-in-law what she would be doing, Naomi tells Ruth to make herself attractive. Now, there is a big difference between a woman making herself attractive and making herself seductive, and both men and women know the difference. Naomi was advising Ruth to make herself attractive.

Lord willing, we shall continue the narrative next time, but I'd like to make a point that I believe is pertinent for our world today. God's Word commands Christian women to dress modestly. We read in 1 Timothy 2:9-10, "In like manner also, that the women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with propriety and moderation, not with braided hair or gold or pearls or costly clothing, but, which is proper for women professing godliness, with good works." The apostle Peter, in addressing Christian wives, connects outward dress with the inward state of the heart. "Do not let your adornment be merely outward-arranging the hair, wearing gold, or putting on fine apparel-rather let it be the hidden person of the heart, with the incorruptible beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is very precious in the sight of God." Immodest clothing is rampant in our day. We should not expect unbelievers to be interested in pleasing God, but it is especially sad that even professing Christians sometimes dress immodestly. If a person is truly a Christian, one who has seen himself or herself as a sinner and is trusting only in the Lord Jesus Christ for salvation, that one should be concerned to live a life that is pleasing to the Lord in every area. Even unbelievers notice the outward obedience of a Christian, which is part of the liever's testimony. As we read in 1 Corinthians 10:31, "Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.'

"What do the MPs think? Is it the gun that killed Fetterer?"


'They're MPs. They did their job and took him away. I was told he's telling everyone who will listen to him that he was set




Sallee was an exceptional oil painter, was a very talented scrapbooker, and loved raising flowers. For many years, Sallee would plant thousands of petu-

Since opening last May the center has welcomed over 56,000 visitors, from 37 of the 50 states.

I have had the pleasure of visiting the ND Gateway to Science twice and the Magic City Discovery Center once with the grandsons. Both centers were great experiences for the boys, getting the chance to touch, and see how things work did not disappoint. As they say, "A picture is worthy a thousand words" you can see by the joy of their faces that the centers are a big hit.


