Welcome to True Treatment Physical Therapy's monthly news article. My name is Lauren Meier, the owner and physical therapist of True Treatment PT. I am married to Andrew Meier, who is originally from Mott, ND. We have a dog named Remmy who keeps us on our toes. In my free time, I enjoy cooking, painting, knitting, gardening, hunting, fishing, and helping on the Meier farm. I am excited to begin educating our community about common health information through monthly articles in the Eido Connect.

How can we expect people to make quality decisions about their health when they can't interpret their own lab values, have difficulty understanding quality research articles, and are only provided with medical documents utilizing abbreviations and medical terminology?

The medical field is full of jargon and abbreviations that are challenging for the average person to follow and understand. Research articles can be monotonous, extensive, overwhelming, and unclear. Medical professionals are typically understaffed and unable to spend significant amounts of time educating patients. All of

these things lead to poor health literacy or the ability to find, understand, and utilize the health information provided.

One of my goals is to help educate our community on common medical topics so that they can make informed decisions about their health.

This month's topic is pain. We have all had the common aches, pains, or bruises from doing more than our body is used to doing on a regular day. Before rushing to take pain medication, one could try stretching, repeated light movement of the painful joint, ice, or heat on the painful area. Doctor Joseph Weisberg has written a book titled "3 Minutes to a Pain-Free Life" which demonstrates stretches that can be performed daily to reduce overall pain. If over-the-counter pain medication, stretching, ice, or heat do not reduce your pain, it may be appropriate to see your medical professional or to schedule a physical therapy appointment. Research suggests that by understanding the cause of your pain, you will have less pain and improve your functional mobility. Another great resource for pain education is a book titled "Why Do I Hurt?" Written by Adriaan Louw.

As we explore different medical topics, you may develop questions. Please write these questions down so that you can ask your medical provider. Or, feel free to send me your questions and I will be happy to help guide you to the correct professional or answer the questions that are within my scope of practice. I look forward to providing more information next month!

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Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We pick up our study today in Ruth 3, where we had begun to see the unfolding of Naomi's plan to find a husband for her daughter-in-law. Last time we saw her instructions for Ruth to make herself attractive and go to the threshing floor of Boaz. The next part of Naomi's instructions has surprised and puzzled many Bible readers. She continues in verse 4, "Then it shall be, when he lies down, that you shall notice the place where he lies; and you shall go in, uncover his feet, and lie down; and he will tell you what you should do." Ruth is to notice where Boaz lies down for the night so that she can find it in the dark. Then, when darkness comes, she is to lie down beside Boaz and "uncover his feet" and wait for further instructions.

What has given so many Bible readers trouble with this is that it sounds as if Naomi is advising Ruth to make a pass at Boaz. After all, what would any man think if he woke up in the dark and saw a young woman lying beside him? It was actually a practice of prostitutes to go to threshing floors at night. But Naomi's advice should not be interpreted in this way. Ruth had the reputation of being a virtuous woman, and Boaz had the reputation of being a man of integrity. Ruth's uncovering of Boaz's feet was most likely a symbolic gesture. It was designed to say, "I have uncovered your feet and am asking you if you would cover me by providing for and protecting me as your wife."

From a human perspective, Naomi was asking Ruth to take a huge chance. There was certainly the potential for her to be misunderstood and turned down. Yet Naomi's faith seems to have been restored. She believes that God's hand will be in this and that He will work things out.

In verse 5 we see that Ruth agrees to the plan: "And she said to her, 'All that you say to me I will do." Again we see that Naomi and Ruth are ladies

of courage and action. As they did not sit around waiting and hoping for someone to provide food for them, neither are they are sitting around waiting for a husband to show up at the door. They are prayerfully seeking that God might provide a husband for Ruth as they carry out a plan to obtain one. They are counting on God to work as they follow their somewhat peculiar plan. This is God's customary way of working. He works in His children by His Spirit, which results in their doing something in line with what He is prompting them to do. We see this brought out in Philippians 2:12b-13: "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who works in you both to will and to do for His good pleasure.'

"Decision"

Lord willing, we shall see more about this plan next time. But let us consider for a moment that Naomi and Ruth are stepping out in faith. From start to finish, the Christian life is a life of faith. It begins when a person is brought to see his or her sinfulness and need of a Savior and places faith in Christ's payment for sin alone to make him right with God. But it doesn't stop there. The Christian life from start to finish is a life lived by faith. Christians must constantly exercise faith in God and His Word until they leave this earth and enter the presence of God for all eternity. Only then does their faith become sight

"Snowy Clouds and Snowflakes"... Ice crystals and cold tiny water droplets end up in a freezing mix to make up 'Snowy Clouds'. Tiny dirt particles get pushed upwards into the airy clouds by the prevailing cold wind, then ice crystals surround the dirt and form in the Snowy Clouds. The ice crystals from the 'Snowy Clouds' develop into falling 'Snowflakes' when the temperature drops enough and there exists enough moisture in the surrounding air. When it's colder than freezing (32ºF), 'Snowflakes' can form inside 'Snowy Clouds'. Scientists say, the ideal range of temperatures for the development of 'Snowflakes' in 'Snowy Clouds' is between ten degrees ABOVE and

four degrees BELOW Zero. It's truly a myth that it needs to be

below zero to snow. 'Snowflakes' multiply into overall 'Snowfall' and are defined as 'slight', 'moderate', or 'heavy' storms. When combined with strong winds, snowfall counts often create dangerous blizzards, icy windblown roads, and hard-to-manage snowdrifts. 'Snowflakes' are wintry products that come from three mid-level types of 'Snowy Clouds': 1) Nimbostratus clouds, which are really dark clouds that cover the sky, block out the Sun, and generally demonstrate snow that falls for an extended period of time; 2) Altocumulus clouds, which are medium gray clouds with moisture in the form

of ice crystals; and 3) Altostratus clouds, which are blue and grey clouds that cover the sky and hold snow quite well; it's believed that the heaviest snow often falls from them.

Air temperatures determine the number of ice crystals that gather together to form 'Snowflakes', as well as their size and weathered ingredients. 'Snowflakes' that fail through cool, dry air will be small and powdery, with little to no sticking power. Though better suited for snow activities, this 'dry snow' tends to drift during windy conditions. 'Snowflakes' will melt slightly above 32 degrees Fahrenheit and bond to one another to form large, dense flakes when the temperature rises over that point. This produces 'wet snow' which is perfect for introducing "Mr. and Mrs. Snowman" since

it sticks together readily.



the chilly, cold-blowing wind carried into the sky, where they mix to become drops of water. When the temperature drops to 32 degrees or lower, the water freezes and forms 'Snowflakes'.

The seasonal "Snowy Clouds and Snowflakes" are caused by the tilted axis of the Earth. The Sun's most direct, hot ravs fall on different places of the Earth during the year. So, the Northern Hemisphere experiences Summer when the North Pole tilts toward the Sun. Winter arrives "HERE" in this portion of the Earth that is north of the Equator when the South Pole tilts toward the Sun; "HERE" refers to "Us" in The Dakota Territory. I still tend to think that the Winters in The Dakota Terripredictable weather, or maybe even more so because of it. The incredible snow and ice formations, with their dazzling white and their light-glistening snow crystals, that have fallen throughout The Dakota Territory landscapes are beautiful to observe. When you're safely looking out your vehicle windshield or your house's warm-sided bay windows, choose to see the snow clinging to tree limbs and branches and be a creditable witness to Winter's stylized variety

On a final note, here are some answered questions:

...Where does a snowman get the weather report? ... The winternet.

...Why did the husband pour warm water on his computer? ... He had asked his wife what to do if the windows froze.

...What did the icy road say to the car? ... Wanna go for a spin?



ice crystals are the precipitation that falls from Winter's 'Snowy Clouds'. Since ice has a six-sided hexagonal structure, this is the shape that these ice crystals generally stick to. Snowy ice crystals differ from one another, and once more, I shall use the word myth to say with my kind of shattered certainty that no two 'Snowflakes' are the same in their shape. "Did ever tell you that I used to be a Youthful Raisin Counter' when I ate my morning breakfast cereal... remembering the Late 50s and 1960s, Black & White, 'RAI-SIN Bran' TV Commercials feauring Raisin Counters? Based on my 'Youthful Raisin Counter' experience, it's led me to think hat I actually know little or nothng about 'Snowflakes' and their shapes." Thank GOD for the Science of Meteorology. The temperature and hu-

nidity levels influence a snowlake's shape. The moisture in he 'Snowy Clouds' attaches tself to the grains of dust that

passed away on December 20, 2023 at CHI St. Alexius Hospital in Dickinson, ND, with his wife of 70 years by his side.

Funeral services for Lynn were held at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, December 29, 2023 at the Spencer Memorial Presbyterian Church in Lemmon, SD. Rev. Ed Zimmerman officiated with burial following in the Greenhill Cemetery. Military Honors were afforded by the Brattvet-Green American Legion Post #66.

Lynn was born south of Thunder Hawk, SD, to Herbert and Velma (Brammer) Jackson on August 19, 1932. He attended school in Thunder Hawk and graduated from Lemmon High School in 1950. He then worked at the Thunder Hawk elevator, joining the National Guard (Lemmon's first) with George Samis, Commander, and from there was drafted into the US Army. He trained at Camp Roberts, CA.

While Lynn was on leave he was united in marriage to Mary Ann Hoherz on June 12, 1953. They returned to California and then on to Fort Richardson, AK. Lynn traveled by troop ship - living on soda crackers for three days- her by luxury liner, inside passage for five days (they even transported their car with just a passenger ticket). Lynn asked his commanding officers for living off post privileges, he said Lynn would have to wait till she arrived - Lynn said "she's aiready here!"




