





A Little Birdie Told Me: "St. Frances Xavier Cabrini A Great Life." Francis Cabrini was born July 15, 1850 in Saint Angelo Lodigiano, Italy. At an early age she was determined to join the religious order the Daughters of the Sacred Heart who had been her teachers and mentors. Due to her ill health she was not accepted into the order undeterred she founded her own order with seven other women: the Institute of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

After being denied several appeals to Rome to become missionaries to China: Frances obtained an audience with Pope Leo XIII. Pope Leo instructed Frances "Not to go East, but to the West." She would become a missionary to the thousands of Italian Immigrants in New York rather than to China.

Mother Frances Cabrini and her seven Sister companions set out on a steamer for New York City. Upon arriving at Five-Points an Italian Slum in New York City, Mother Cabrini was met with great poverty, sickness and despair. Archbishop Michael Corrigan the son of an Irish Immigrant was not immediately supportive: but eventually gave his permission to found the



Sacred Heart Orphan Asylum in rural West Park, New York. Mother Cabrini organized

catechism and education classes for the Italian immigrants and provided for the needs of the orphans.

Mother Cabrini faced many obstacles as she established. orphanages, schools and hospitals. By the time of her death she had made 24 trans-Atlantic crossings: the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus had established 67 institutions, orphanages, schools and hospitals on every continent to include China.

Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini died on December 22, 1917 in Chicago and was canonized by Pope Pius XII in recognition of her holiness and service to mankind.

"Cabrini" the movie portrays the life of Mother Cabrini, the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and the terrible living conditions of the Italian Immigrants in Five-Points, New York. Mother Cabrini was in poor health and faced many what seemed to be insurmountable odds but never gave up on her mission and relied totally on the providence of God.






Enchanted Highway **Foundation Raises** \$17,375 for Giving **Hearts Day!** By Ted Uecker,

The newly formed Enchant-Highway newly formed Board of Directors (including Angela Carlson, Scott Meske, Rich Wardner, Connie Wax, Laura Greff, Mark Stelter and Ted Uecker) are committed to their mission of "sustaining the Enchanted Highway for future generations." Therefore, raising enough funds to maintain the existing magnificent sculptures; plus possibly building new and innovative sculptures for the future - requires fundraising. are also now part of the reputable North Dakota Community Foundation, so you'll know that your Endowment Fund gifts are being pooled and invested wisely - for the future.

sota. We are grateful for all of the \$17,375 in gifts for our first Giving Hearts Day go-round.

Who would have thought the Enchanted Highway would receive gifts from all over the country? The Impact Foundation and Giving hearts Day was a terrific start. It also certainly helped that the Enchanted Highway Foundation joined the Southwest ND Giving Hearts Consortium, made up of 15 southwest ND nonprofits. Via this membership, the EH Foundation was part of a 21,000 piece, oversized postcard direct mail effort. Plus, we were able to bounce ideas off other nonprofit leaders at our monthly gatherings. We are hoping to plan next vear's Giving Hearts Day effort

a little further in advance, so we can continue to build our brand with our donors.







4H Camp Opportunities



Nature Deficit Disorder and No Child Left Inside are phrases that have been associated with legislative action, grant programs, and phrases to explain the trend that is affecting young people's mental health. These terms became prevalent in American culture in the early 2000s because we found kids getting outside less, being less connected to the outdoors, and facing more publicly recognized mental health issues. Summer camps focused on hunting and other outdoor skills are great ways to combat this phenomenon.

North Dakota Wildlife Federation (NDWF) is partnering with NDSU Extension 4-H summer camps to educate kids on outdoor skills, archery, and wildlife at 3 summer camps to be held in Washburn ND. Bullseye Archery Camp June 9-13; Outdoor Skills with Hunter Education June 30-July 3; and Wildlife Camp August 4-8. The NDWF gave a grant of \$2500 to North Dakota 4-H program NDSU Extension that will provide 7 scholarships for youth to attend one of the three camps. The 4-H State Activities Coordinator will give out the scholarships based on need. 4-H has criteria for scholarships and each county also gives out scholarships based on need criteria.


The camps are held at the 4-H facility in Washburn, ND. The North Dakota 4-H Camp is on 80 acres of wooded riverfront property 1.5 miles west of Washburn, N.D., and has provided overnight camping to youth for over 50 years. Camp starts on Sundays at 4 pm and ends on Thursday at 11 am.
