



Now that it's March, staying with it gets hard. Life gets busy, motivation drops, and suddenly you're back on the couch, wondering how you're 6 episodes into The Golden Bachelor instead of at the gym.

You know the benefits of exercise - they're probably what motivated you to start exercising in the first place. If you need a reminder here are just a few:

Knowing that you should exercise or why isn't the problem. Getting up and doing it is. Here are our top tips for making sure you stick to your exercise plan:

Set realistic goals. Don't try to go from zero to hero overnight. Start with small, achievable goals and increase them gradually. Make it easy to win that helps you build motivation and an exercise habit. For some people that might mean starting with a daily 10-minute walk. For some people, that bar is too

When we say make it easy to win, we mean easy. Your goal could be to scan your card at the gym 3 times a week. It might be putting on your walking shoes and going out the door. It might be one pushup. Start tiny.

Do activities you enjoy. Exercise isn't punishment. Choose activities that are fun. It could be running, walking the dog, dancing, swimming, kickboxing, or playing a sport.

Schedule it. Schedule your workouts like you would any other important appointment. When people ask you to do something else during that time, say "Sorry, I've got an appointment." The more you make exercise a routine, the less likely you are to skip it.

Don't go it alone. Having someone waiting for you at the gym really motivates you to get there. Having support helps push you to work harder and motivates you when you're feeling down. Your support could be a friend, the other people in a group fitness class, or a trainer.

Mix it up. If you usually run at the same pace, try intervals. Walk a different route. Doing the same thing over and over again gets boring and leads to burnout. Keep things interesting to stay interested.

Track your progress. Bonus points if you find a way to make it visual somehow. Our brains love to see tasks checked off, a chart or numbers going up, and rings closing. Seeing how far you've come is a great motivator. Keep track of your workouts in a journal, make a spreadsheet, or use an app or fitness tracker.

Bribes work. Celebrate your successes, no matter how small. Set a goal to work out 3 times this week and treat yourself to your favorite coffee when you do. Buy yourself a new workout outfit, get a massage, or anything else that will help you stay motivated when you reach milestones.

Adjust. Don't push yourself too hard, especially when you're starting out. If you're feeling tired and sore, take the intensity down. Plan rest days into your routine. Don't make your goal and plan so rigid that it's impossible to complete in the real

Forgive yourself! Everyone has setbacks. You are going to get sick. You are going to miss a workout. That is ok. Pick yourself up and get back on track. With the right mindset and a little perseverance, you can reach your fitness goals.

A Little Birdie Told Me

By: Vivian Hernandez A Little Birdie Told Me: "A Real Big Fish Story."

Here we are into the final week of Lent and we Catholics have been observing the longstanding tradition of "No meat on Fridays during Lent." The reasons "why" are often guestioned and crazy theories have been floating around for centuries, so what is the real truth?

Catholics have abstained from meat since medieval times, and not just on Fridays but Wednesday, Saturdays, Lent, Advent and other Holy Days. Fasting on Friday started as early as the first century to commemorate the sacrifice Jesus made on the cross on Good Friday to redeem the world.

So where did the notion come from that a powerful medieval pope made a secret pack to prop up the fishing industry and impact the world economy? This "Fish Tale" was even taught in Catholic Schools. The Vatican archives have been turned upside down with no evidence of this "Fishy Story."

Fish are coldblooded and remained on the Friday menu: With all these days of abstaining from meat the hunger for fish grew. The growth of the global fishing industry was directly related to the many meatless days in a year and not any edict from

In Medieval times fish had to be cured, smoked and salted to preserve it. Herring was the food of chose it was plentiful but dry and tasteless. There was no good way to get fresh fish to the devout Catholics but cod eventually replaced herring it tasted better when cured and lasted longer.

The Vikings dried cod for long seafaring adventures and their route took them to the natural range of Atlantic cod from Greenland, Iceland and Newfoundland around 1000 AD. "Why do people go over the horizon?" Fishermen went out in search of cod in the north Atlantic to meet the demands of the faithful.

By 1509 Henry VIII was on the throne and fish dominated the menu for a good part of the year. Henry was Catholic and married to Catherine of Aragon but became smitten with Anne. Boleyn. The pope refused Henry VIII a divorce and as a result the Church of England was born. Henry was now the head of the Church of England and able divorce Catherine and marries

Fish was now seen as a "popish flesh" and the Anglicans lost their taste for it. This had a negative impact on the fishing industry so in 1547 Henry's young son Edward VI by law reinstated fast days. "For worldly and civil policy, to spare flesh, and use fish for the benefit of the commonwealth, where by many be fishers and use the trade for

Abstaining from fish affected the global economy into the 20th century, soon after Pope Paul VI loosened the fasting rules in the 1960's U.S. fishing prices dropped drastically. One smart McDonald's owner started to market the Fillet-O-Fish and capitalize on the largely Catholic population in Cincinnati, Ohio to replace the Big Mac on Fridays.

So the conspiracy theories are true, just about the "Wrong Church Leader!"

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
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
ALDEN CEMETERY MAINTENANCE BIDS For 2024-2026



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


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Farm Credit Donate Computers



Reflections on the Words of Life

In our study of Ruth we have seen that Naomi had previously been devoid of all hope for the future. But God graciously changed that with the marriage of Boaz and Ruth and the birth of their son. We resume our study today in Ruth 4:16, "Then Naomi took the child and laid him on her lap and became his nurse." Naomi is now a delighted grandmother who helps with the care of her grandson. Now her name, which means "pleasant," is an accurate description of her life.


Verse 17 tells us about the naming of the child: "Also the neighbor women gave him a name, saying, 'There is a son born to Naomi.' And they called his name Obed. He is the father of Jesse, the father of David." Most likely the part which the neighbor women played in naming the child is that they approved of the name given by Boaz and Ruth. And the phrase "a son born to Naom?" emphasizes the fact that he will carry on her family name, showing that her situation had been completely reversed. The one who went out empty is now full of hope for the future.

The name "Obed" means "servant," and indeed this child served in remarkable roles. We see that fact in verses 18-22, which close the book: "Now this is the genealogy of Perez: Perez begot Hezron; Hezron begot Ram, and Ram begot Amminadab; Amminadab begot Nahshon, and Nahshon begot Salmon; Salmon begot Boaz, and Boaz begot Obed; Obed begot Jesse, and Jesse begot David." In this genealogy we are confronted with God's working in history to bring about His plans and purposes. We have seen repeatedly the way He worked in the lives of individuals like Naomi, Ruth, and Boaz, All those events were leading up to one great event: the birth of Obed. Through this child, the greatest of all Israel's

finitely more important, through this child the King of all kings and Lord of all lords would be born. The women of Bethlehem spoke far beyond their intentions when they said to Naomi, "Blessed be the LORD, who has not left you this day without a redeemer." For through the very child whom Naomi held in her lap would come the Redeemer for the whole human race. In Matthew's genealogy of Christ, four women are mentioned. The first is Tamar, who deceived her father-in-law into an incestuous relationship that resulted in the birth of Perez. The next woman is Rahab, the harlot from Jericho who hid the Israelite spies who came to scope out the city. Rahab ended up marrying a man name Salmon, the father of Boaz. The third woman named in Christ's genealogy is Ruth, the Moabite who was once among the despised enemies of Israel. And the last woman referred to by Matthew, though not by name, is Bathsheba. She is simply called "the wife of Uriah." She is the woman with whom

What does that tell us? It tells us that God preserved the kingly line for His Son through an incestuous relationship, through one who was a prostitute, through one who committed adultery, and through a Moabite. Here is the wonder of it all: While God hates sin and hated all the sins that were involved, yet in His amazing plan, He used these things to bring about His purpose of sending the Redeemer to earth. The real love story of Ruth is that there was a Baby born in the same town where Ruth and Boaz lived, only many hundred years later. And that Baby came for the very purpose of dying. No one forced Him to die. He gave Himself to be crucified. For by doing so He was offering Himself as a sacrifice to pay for the sins that separate mankind from God. Friend, is this One your Redeemer? Are you trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ alone to make you right with God?



All applications are reviewed and scored by five WRHS Foundation Scholarship Committee Members. All scores are then reviewed by the WRHS Selection Committee and recipients are selected.

We have three family memorials establishing scholarships "In Memory" of Joyce Stippich, Irma Steinmetz and Lynn Feist. We also offer our Auxiliary Legacy Scholarships and General WRHS Foundation Scholarships. 

A few weeks ago we had a story on crosses given to us by Bob Splichal.



Hard to imagine and put into perspective how an idea created, followed thru, can make a difference in the world - we may not be able to go there but thru the words of others maybe can visualize the importance of what they are doing and what we too



So.......Why go on a mission trip and get out of my comfort zone at home? This is the question that I originally had when considering a mission trip outside of the USA. I always felt that I had a "servant heart" and needed to follow God's path of life for me, to Love and Serve others during my lifetime. (1 Peter 4:10 - God has given each of you a gift. Use them well to serve one another.) Friends at church kept telling me about the mission trip to Jamaica and encouraged me to go. "It will change your life" they told me. Well..... why not go while I am healthy enough to go. Something was compelling me to say "yes" this year. On Sunday we were bussed more than an hour up into the mountainous region of Jamaica, to help some of the children that reside at Westhaven Children's Home get ready for a Sunday service, in a small church nearby. (Darrel) "I was told that we would be going to a Protestant Jamaican church service on Sunday and that we needed to dress up. We would be attending Faith Chapel Church with people that honored God by dressing up and we needed to honor them by doing the same." We were able to take some of the children from Westhaven with us to the service. We pushed those that were in wheelchairs, about a quarter mile up a hill, and lifted them up steep steps into the church. 'The Faith Chapel" was a wellbuilt church that sat close to the top of the mountain it was built on. The Jamaicans that were present were indeed richly dressed in their best Sunday regalia of bright colors. It was a very loud and active, 2+ hour

service, in which the Jamaicans demonstrated how to properly proclaim their allegiance to

The use of a microphone, and very large speakers mounted behind us in the back of the church, made for a powerful service that one could feel from our head to our toes. I am sure the people at the resort in Montego Bay could hear the service! Even with ear plugs, the music was loud and joyous. "Praise the Lord" and "Hallelujah" were shouted often throughout the service. The Jamaican residents educated our mostly reserved Norwegian Americans on how to properly praise the Lord! It was an experience that none of us will soon forget.

(Darrel) "We all had a choice to either go to Westhaven and work with the children there or go to the Falmouth area and build Ja'Bodes. We all three chose to build homes during the three scheduled workdays. Everyone made a lunch each day from the resort buffet that we would eat on site. We were encouraged to drink lots of water during the day due to the hot conditions we would be working in. Ice filled water coolers were provided for our consumption during the day."

We were bussed about 20 minutes, past the opulent resorts that most of us see while vacationing in Jamaica, to the section of the island where we would be serving our Jamaican friends. (Darrel) "I was surprised to see all of the signs and names on buildings written in English. I found out that English has been the main language since about 1962, when Jamaica won its independence from the United Kingdom. They do speak Patois (Pat-Wah), their native language among themselves.



seemed well built next to shacks that were constructed with whatever material they could find to shield them from the hot sun and rain. I imagined that the difference in homes was due to the

been developed and nurtured on the island. MJ also works with a program similar to Habitat for Humanity at various sites throughout Jamaica.

From humble beginnings of 19 missionaries from St Andrew's the first year, some of whom are still serving, this ministry has grown to include several churches in several states all around the country. It has grown from one mission site at Hope Valley Experimental School in Kingston (where the "experiment" was to include children with special needs in the classroom with other children) to several mission sites in Kingston and the Montego Bay area.

Mission Jamaica provides a way for us to love and serve our neighbor as Jesus taught us through His love and service to others. The trip combines a service project with time for reflection and spiritual rest. It allows a person to experience an international mission field that is close to home vet far enough away to immerse themselves in another culture for a week.

The goal on this trip was to help build 2 Ja'Bodes (homes) for 2 Jamaican sisters. I would travel and work alongside 48 other missionaries from 2 congregations in the Fargo-Moor-

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wide range of incomes that were earned by the people, either honestly or through the selling of drugs and prostitution. A rough, black-topped road led us part way into the area but soon deteriorated into rocky, pot holed roads that no small car should be driving on. This was the former Race Course area that the government was now creating "better ground" for the Jamaican people to build on. Truckloads of rock and limestone are hauled into the swamp and dumped and packed down for homes to be built on. That endeavor was quite evident when first walking into the compound and seeing the rough ground that led to the swamp bordering the back. We were introduced to the family residents that lived in the compound and started unloading the tools that would be used for the coming days. (Darrel) "What thrilled me the most was the smiling faces of the future homeowners. They were very appreciative of what we were doing for them. I was amazed when the children came home from school, how well dressed they were in their school uniforms. It was not what I had expected given the poverty conditions in which these families lived. Once they got to know Jasmine, they all had a lot of fun playing games. She fulfilled another important task of ours on this mission trip. I was proud to see them all having so much fun!" (Jasmine) "The life goal of the two single mothers receiving the homes is to raise their children in the most God-loving and safest environment possible. I was honored to establish a strong connection with one of

I was amazed at the speed at which the missionaries of the mission trip worked. The new people were paired up with a veteran and the work began. Everyone seemed to know what to do as many had been here before, some as many as 25+ years. The cinder block foundations for the 2 Ja'Bodes were already in place next to each other. These were prebuilt by employees of Mission Jamaica that oversee the building of the Ja'Bodes. A large group of workers set up stands and twice hand painted all of the wood that would be going into and onto the structures. Once the building materials were in place, they were all given a third coat of paint. This was done to discourage the termites from destroying the wooden walls. We built the 2 X 4 walls individually and set them in place. As soon as that was completed the yellow painted siding went on. We finished the main structure of both Ja'Bodes that first day along with about 1/3 of the siding on the walls.



(Darrel) "Each evening after we got back to the resort, we had devotions for an hour. This was time for us to share what we had experienced during the day Besides singing hymns

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we had a discussion on what words we could think of that corresponded to the letters in the word SHINE. The three words that resonated every night with me were Smile. Satisfaction and Humble. We also discussed the options for work we would have the next day and signed up for



our choice."

The second day we built the roof rafters, attached corrugated steel roof panels and completed the siding on the structures. The mood in the compound was more friendly today as the Jamaican families interacted with our group. The laughter heard and the banter between workers was a testament of the enjoyment that the people serving together had. At one time I stepped back and closed my eyes. I could hear and feel the love that emanated out of the group as all worked together to accomplish the goal. I just knew that God was present in this compound that day, smiling and thinking, "This is what my children do when they love and serve others."

On the third day we would



finish the Ja Bodes. Window frames and shutters were installed, and doors hung. Four young muscular Jamaican men were hired to mix a pile of rock, dirt and cement on the ground and shovel it into pails. The mission people made a bucket brigade and moved the cement into the structures. Here it was poured in place and leveled. Steps were also poured leading to the main door entrance of each. Once the homes were finished it was time for the ceremony that all were anxiously waiting for. We all laid hands on

and dedicated them to the 2 sisters, Janique and Eannesha, and each of their three children. The sisters were presented with the keys to their life-changing homes and a suitcase filled with necessities to start life in their new Ja'Bodes. Both Janique and Eannesha thanked their friends of Mission Jamaica for building their Ja'Bodes. Janique stated "Now that I have a home, I don't need a husband. I can keep my children safe and provide a good home where they can grow up in."

(Darrel) "This mission trip has made me humble and thankful for all that we have. I appreciate, not only the people that are in my life, but a home



that is spacious and protects us from the elements and food on our table to eat. I am truly bless-

(Jasmine) "The experience I had was far more incredible than I could ever have imagined. My father and I worked together building the two homes alongside many other new friends. Our Jamaican friends definitely modeled the Jamaican national motto these three days, "Out of many, One people." In between swinging a hammer and slinging buckets of cement, I spent time playing and laughing with the children. No day goes by without my thanks and praise to GOD for sharing this opportunity with me. The memories made with my father, while serving the Lord, will forever be in my heart. My eyes have forever opened, and my heart has been forever filled, with the love for the power and Word of the Lord. My soul has been forever impacted by the tremendous work and rela-

world for me to do.

No doubt, this mission experience touched my heart also, in many ways. I know that we "made a difference" in these people's lives. I was also humbled in many ways during the



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

Patricia helped feed and check in the cattle that ranchers brought to the stockyards to be shipped out on railroad cars during the drought. Someone brought in an injured horse to the stockyard that Patricia and her mom nursed back to health. Patricia contacted the owner after it was healthy and bought the horse for \$17.50. Patricia named her new love Bobbie. She had a special connection with Bobbie and if anyone else tried to ride her, they got bucked off. She also acquired a naughty goat that she loved, but it got into lots



of trouble so she had to give it away. She had a unique relationship with all animals. At a very young age she would walk the cattle out to graze and one day she decided to jump on a calf's back and it let her ride it. She named this calf Judy and rode her around until she acquired Bobbie.

Patricia and her family milked up to 30 head of dairy cows and she drove their Model T to deliver the milk to local businesses and residents. While her father was renewing his driver's license, the license issuer asked Patricia (age 9) if she would like a driver's license and she said "Sure!" The local sheriff found out and tried to take away her driver's license and all the business owners chased him away because she needed her license to deliver the milk.

She graduated from the 8th grade in the Marmarth School and finished a couple of years of high school. She guit high school because some boys were very disruptive in the classroom and she was not able to learn with the disruption. The teacher could not control the boys and the school board was no help so she did not finish high school.

Patricia met her future husband Darel Thomas (Tom) Peters when he visited her parent's house. He asked her out on a date the next time he visited and she eventually married Tom on June 2, 1956 in Miles City, MT. They lived in Bowman for several years and eventually built a new home south of Bowman in 1973. These parents are proponants of teaching their child the value of money and the ability to provide for themselves, however there were many comments that this was a horrible idea and that they should be heartily ashamed of this. Their response was that it was their job to make sure that their child knew the value of a dollar and had knowledge of how to be responsible with money so they could care for themselves.


I was quite taken aback by this, but thinking about the current atmosphere and attitude maybe I shouldn't be. I have been told by others that schools no longer recommend that children attempt to get any work experience as this takes away from their studies so is frowned upon. I also have heard that many parents, if not most these days, feel that their children should be able to concentrate on school and activities as childhood lasts for such a short period of time. I guess that I can understand part of this, but not all of it. How do we expect children to learn to fend for themselves if they never have any experience in working at all? Is it any wonder then that children are spending more time in their parent's basements rather than getting out on their own?

Children of earlier generations used to start out at a very early age with full time jobs. Fortunately, this is no longer either needed or recommended. Children do need to be children and able to enjoy the time when they don't have a lot of responsibilites. However, I think that in order to make sure that they have the tools and abilities to grow into those responsibilities that come soon enough, there needs to be some stages of learning what is involved with their future. First steps should be teaching them the basics such as how to keep their possessions in some kind of order and it used to be taught by the parents. Keeping their room clean and neat, picking up their

dirty clothes and putting them in a hamper, taking care of pets are all first steps that require very little effort, but are the basic blocks of life. Once they are a bit older, teaching them basic cooking, cleanup and laundry should be added as one day they will have to do these things, and if they are not taught, how will they learn? No wonder we find them staying at home longer than expected.

Obviously, these days it takes more than just a basic job to handle all the expenses that come and there is nothing wrong with helping children take those first steps, but are parents able and willing to support their children forever? At what point should parents say that they cannot afford to do this anymore? Right now some families are more than just two generations, sometimes they are caring for elderly parents as well as trying to make sure their children are taken care of as well. Maybe that is the reason that so many families are struggling to make ends meet along with the current finanacial atmosphere. This can put a huge strain on the health of the family unit, and possibly a cause for the younger generation not wanting to commit to a permanent relationship with anyone. It appears to be snowballing and creating more and more upheaval in the lives of so many. So what can we do to stabilize this and give our children a brighter future.

One suggestion would be to return to some of the basic values the prior generations were taught. 


