Southwest Public Transit

Hello from Southwest Public Transit! We're a private non-profit organization offering transportation services to residents across southwest North Dakota. We are regulated by the federal government in Washington (FTA) and the state in Bismarck (Transit Division). We originate rides out of Adams, Bowman, Hettinger, and Slope counties. Fun fact: Every county in North Dakota has a transit agency, with some, like us, serving multiple counties.

One of our biggest challenges is letting people know about us and what we do, as well as ensuring we fulfill every ride request. Originally incorporated as Southwest Senior Services in September 1987, we changed our name in 1996 to reflect a broader mission. At that time, there was a significant effort nationwide to expand transit services to all individuals, regardless of age, ability, or income level. You don't have to be a senior, have special needs, or come from a low-income background to ride with us-transit is for ALL!

We operate as a rural, de-

mand response agency. Demand response means we use vans or small buses to pick up riders in response to their requests. Basically, we take riders wherever they want to go, when they want to go.

We provide transportation services to several communities across our four different coun-

In Adams County: Haynes, Hettinger, Bucyrus, and Reeder.

In Bowman County: Gascoyne, Haley, Scranton, Bowman, and Hhame.

In Hettinger County: New England, Mott, Regent, Burt, and Bentley.

In Slope County: Amidon and Marmarth.

Our fleet consists of ten vehicles with five that are wheelchair accessible. We have five vehicles in Bowman, four in Hettinger, and one in New England.

We're hoping that as prices for everything go up, more people will see the benefit of using public transportation. In the cities of Bowman and Hettinger, a one-way ride costs \$1.00 to \$1.50. That fare hasn't changed since 2014! Can you think of anything else that hasn't gone up in price for that long?



Giving it to God, and Really Meaning it.

Fr. Greg Hilzendeger Holy Trinity in Hettinger, Sacred Heart in Scranton and Reeder

In times of fear, stress, suffering, anger, hatred, or any difficulty, Christians are often exhorted to "give it to God." This is good advice. God provides for us as no other can. In giving our difficulties to God, we entrust them to the One who has promised that He can take care of us, and that He desires to do so. But what does it actually mean to give something to God? How do we entrust something to Him in a way that opens us to truly experiencing His consolation?

Reflecting on these questions, I believe there are two essential components to the act of giving something to God. First, we must make a real, concrete act of surrendering our worry, trial, difficulty etc. to God. This sounds simple, but we can so often forget it. It's not complicated. It can be a simple prayer. One of my favorites is: "Jesus, I surrender this to you, take care of everything." It doesn't need to be a set formula; what is important is that we actually relate our difficulties to Jesus. It can be so

easy to get stuck in our heads. We can spend hours worrying, trying to figure it out ourselves, rehashing the problem over and over without ever actually turning to God. Prayer isn't just thinking about something in a church. It needs to be relational. We need to tell Jesus and truly surrender our trial to Him.

In surrendering our prob-

lem to God, we've placed ourselves with our brokenness in the sphere of His presence. The second component of "giving it to God," is that we need to reject any thoughts or lies which would take us away from His side. After we've surrendered to God, a thought will likely arise that we need to keep thinking about the issue and trying to take care of it ourselves. This worry and anxiety will take us away from God and thus needs to be rejected. We may start hearing lies from the enemy about how it's never going to get better, that there is no hope, that God doesn't really care, or that we are worthless or unloved. Again, these thoughts need to be rejected so that God can truly take care of us. We need to say no to these thoughts and fears and make continual acts of surrender.

I'll end with an analogy to illustrate this. Recently I was at a family's house. Their one-and-





Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We have been considering the description of believers in 1 Peter 1:2: "Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father." Last time we concentrated on the word "elect," or "chosen," and that brings us to an important question: What is the basis upon which God chooses some people to be His own? Peter tells us plainly that it is "according to the foreknowledge of God." Now this leads to another question: "What is meant by foreknowledge?" One obvious meaning of the word is simply to know something beforehand. God has perfect knowledge about all things. He knows every thought, word, and deed of every creature, being, and thing before it ever hap-

Many claim that God looked down the corridor of history, so to speak, and saw all who would believe in Christ; and on the basis of their choice, He chose them to be His people. Of course God foresees the faith of all who will believe. But that faith is given to them by God. Ephesians 2:8: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God." Only those to whom God grants faith has He chosen to be His own.

There is another meaning of the word that is critical here. The Bible frequently uses the word "know" in the sense of God's placing special love upon something or someone. For example, Psalm 1:6 says, "For the LORD knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the ungodly shall perish." Obviously, the psalmist does not mean that God knows what righteous people are doing but not what the wicked are doing. Bather, this means that He has a special regard for the righteous. The prophet Amos said

to the nation of Israel in Amos 3:2, "You only have I known of all the families of the earth." Amos does not mean that God did not know about the other nations but that He placed His love upon Israel in a unique way, which He did not do for other nations. Jesus Himself tells us how He will deal with unbelievers on judgment day when He will say to the wicked. "I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!" (Matthew 7:27). The Lord is not saying that He does not know who the wicked are, but that they are not His people. Another verse which makes this point is Galatians 4:9: "But now after you have known God, or rather are known by God, how is it that you turn again to the weak and beggarly elements, to which you desire again to be in bondage?" Paul is saying to the Galatians that their coming to know God as believers was the result of having been known by God.

Now, when you take this usage of the word "know" with the prefix "fore," it is clear that the word "foreknow" is equivalent to "predestine" or "predetermine." God's election of His people according to His foreknowledge means that God's choice of those who are saved was entirely on the basis of His own sovereign good pleasure.

A major purpose of Peter's letter is to comfort and encourage believers who are suffering because of their faith in Christ.

He tells them that they were specially chosen by God in His sovereign grace to be the objects of His love. Election is something God does, and the great comfort in this is that believers can never lose what God has done for them. Believer, the fact that you have placed your trust in Christ means that God loves you personally. He chose you before the foundation of the world to be His own, and nothing can pluck you out of His hand. God cares about everything you are going through, and His purpose in all of it is to work for your good and His glory

And if someone reading this is without Christ, do not let the Bible's teaching about election be an obstacle to you. For the Scriptures also say "Whosoever will may come," and "The one who comes to Me I will by no means cast out." Won't you come to Christ today and show yourself to be one of God's


"Did the psychiatrist talk to James at all. I mean, did he threaten to put him back in the hospital if he didn't take his meds?"





Ray Riehl from Flasher North Dakota lost the sight in both of his eyes after an accident on February 24, 1986. By April of 1987 he became a self taught leather-smith and started his leather repair shop, R.R. Supplies Ray Riehl Saddle & Tack Repair on the edge of

Walking into his completely dark repair shop Ray kindly turned on the lights for me and I wondered "how much he saves on electricity being able to work in the dark?" While most of us would struggle with even a basic task in the dark Ray has managed to overcome any obstacles life has thrown his way; so much so that he has created a succesful business in spite of being blind. The walls of his shop were lined with his handy

work ranging from bridles to leather fly swatters as well as leashes and belts braided from paracord. His current project is an old saddle in much need of his expertise.

Ray's hard work and fine craftmenship have not gone unnoticed by those who use leather goods on a daily basis, which has made him the "Go-To-Guy" for the dog training community.

A dog trainer's saddle is completely different from a typical saddle used on a ranch. Ray's leatherwork has made it's way across the US, Canada, Germany, France and Japan. He has even worked with: The Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Southern Border Patrol, and Army, as well as Police dogs and their trainers.


