in Bismarck (Transit Division). We originate rides out of Adams, Bowman, Hettinger, and Slope counties. Fun fact: Every county in North Dakota has a transit agency, with some, like us, serving multiple counties.

One of our biggest challenges is letting people know about us and what we do, as well as ensuring we fulfill every ride request. Originally incorporated as Southwest Senior Services in September 1987, we changed our name in 1996 to reflect a broader mission. At that time, there was a significant effort nationwide to expand transit services to all individuals, regardless of age, ability, or income level. You don't have to be. a senior, have special needs, or

In Adams County: Haynes, Hettinger, Bucyrus, and Reeder.

In Bowman County: Gascoyne, Haley, Scranton, Bowman, and Rhame.

In Hettinger County: New England, Mott, Regent, Burt, and Bentley.

In Slope County: Amidon and Marmarth.

Our fleet consists of ten vehicles with five that are wheelchair accessible. We have five vehicles in Bowman, four in Hettinger, and one in New England. We're hoping that as prices for everything go up, more people will see the benefit of using public transportation. In the cita one-way ride costs \$1.00 to \$1.50. That fare hasn't changed since 2014! Can you think of anything else that hasn't gone up in price for that long?

#### FIT test: \$39

This take-home kit, recommended for those ages 50-75, assists in screening for colorectal cancer.

#### Glycated hemoglobin (A1C): \$27 Used to detect diabetes.

#### Lipid panel: \$37

(Must fast beforehand) Measures the amount of cholesterol and triglycerides in your blood to monitor heart health.

#### PSA: \$42

Tests for prostate cancer.

#### TSH (\$45)

Evaluates thyroid function.





#### The role of a a critical access hospital is to provide health care services to rural, often underserved communities. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services describes critical access hospitals as having an average stay of no more than 96 hours. A critical access hospital often provides life-saving care, and prepares patients for further specialized care if necessary.

"We try to take care of as many health problems as we can here, but when it's needed, we transfer people to other facilities. We do our best within all our capabilities to provide patients with local care," Luce said. "We're here for them."

Current providers include Dr. Elizabeth Sundberg and Trevor Stavig, who are primarily in Elgin, Rhonda Schmidt at the Glen Ullin Family Medical Clinic and Jolene Engelhart at the Richardton Clinic. Maria Aune rotates throughout all three clinics. Morris Duffy sees patients in Elgin and also provides emergency care, along with Kelsey Luce and Deb Middleton.

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#### Celebrate JMHCC during National Hospital Week May 13-17 by Luann Dart

Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC) in Elgin will celebrate National Hospital Week with activities May 13-17, including discounted prices on certain lab tests.

"We invite the public to celebrate the week with us, and encourage everyone to take advantage of the screenings we have scheduled," says JMHCC CEO Scott Brooks.

With its slogan, "Peace of Mind. Close to Home," JMHCC has eight providers seeing patients at JMHCC and its clinics in Elgin, Glen Ullin and Richardton. JMHCC cares for longterm patients and has a 24/7 emergency room, along with fully staffed lab and radiology departments, while its clinics provide primary care.

"There's a lot they do well. It is such a benefit to the community as a critical access hos-

pital. You can get the medical attention you need. I think it's vital for the community to have the hospital here. And there are so many wonderful people who work there. We are just so lucky to have the hospital here in Elgin," said Leona Zemliska, Elgin, a JMHCC board member. "We try to provide compassionate care for all of the community members and the long-term care residents," said Physician Assistant Kelsev Luce, who provides care in the emergency department.

JMHCC also now oversees the New Leipzig-Elgin ambulance service, with four paramedics and a full staff of EMTs.

JMHCC is one of only 10 hospitals in the nation enrolled in a federal program allowing the hospital to receive costbased reimbursement to operate an ambulance. Through the Frontier Community Health Integration Project, certain requirements are being waived as of July 2022 to allow JMHCC to operate the ambulance on a nonprofit basis. The five-year JMHCC also has a financial impact on the community. Determined by the Center for Rural Health, JMHCC has a \$5.2 million direct and secondary impact.

#### **Reflections on the** Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

Last week we noted in 1 Peter 1:1 that Peter referred to God's people as "pilgrims" passing through this world on the to their eternal heavenly home. He goes on to further describe them in 1 Peter 1:2a: "Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father." Here Peter calls believers in Christ "elect," which is simply a word that means "chosen.

The concept of election runs throughout the Bible. God chose Noah and his family to survive the flood. Then, out of all the people on earth, God chose Abraham to be the father of a new nation and people, whom He called Israel. The rest of the Old Testament reveals God's dealings with as His chosen people. Though this is taught all through the Old Testament, we shall cite just one verse, Deuteronomy 7:6: "For you are a holy people to the LORD your God; the LORD your God has chosen you to be a people for Himself, a special treasure above all the peoples on the face of the earth." It should not be surprising, then, to find the New Testament continuing to emphasize election. In the New Testament, the elect refers all whom God chose before the foundation of the world to be part of Christ's church. from every nation, tribe, and tongue. The apostle Paul wrote in Ephesians 1:3-4, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Ford Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ, just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love." Paul often refers to believers as God's chosen or elect in his letters. The apostle John also refers to the elect in his writings. What do these New Testament writers mean? Very simply, they mean that God, in His own good pleasure and for His own glory selected some people to be saved, to be His special children. And Peter tells us in our verse that the basis of God's election is "according

It is perfectly just for the holy God to punish those who reb-

to the foreknowledge of God." That phrase will be the subject of our consideration next time,

Lord willing. Election often meets with objections among people who claim that it is unfair for God to choose those whom He will save. Friends, the simple answer that the Bible gives to this objection is found in Romans 9:20: "But indeed, O man, who are you to reply against God?" God is the sovereign Creator of all things. He has every right to do as He pleases, and we must bow the knee to His authority. Dr. R. C. Sproul answered this objection by pointing out that God gives some people justice.


el against Him, which is every one of us as we come into this world. But God in His infinite grace gives some people mercy by granting them the free gift of salvation. God gives injustice to NO ONE.

Now, if this teaching causes some to become anxious about whether he or she is elect, there is a simple test. If you have seen yourself as a sinner in need of a Savior and have placed your trust in the Lord Jesus Christ alone to make you right with God, this is the best indication that you are among God's elect. Those who are not elect have no such concern about their souls. If you have not trusted in Christ to save you, you may do so right now.

taking his medicine." "Maybe he feels that taking


medicine makes him less of a man."

hardly bothered with complaints of their writing. Besides which, spell check sometimes draws conclusions you didn't anticipate when you put your words on the screen.


