Discussion centered on 4 main qualities employers expect from an employee & everyone got involved in the conversation at this combination focus group & costume party.

Dependability: Being at work when scheduled; completing duties as assigned and in a timely manner; when it's ok to call in sick (flu, fever, hospitalization, etc.)& when it's probably not the best idea, like being too tired or just a common cold.

Honesty: It's ok to make a mistake if you are honest about it, but not ok to try to cover it up or lie about it. It's never a good idea to be dishonest with your employer about anything. Attention to Detail: Performing duties up to your employer's standards in the time allowed; noticing things that may need to be done and doing them without having to be told; being polite, respectful and professional with supervisors, coworkers and customers.

Appropriate work place behavior and appropriate social behavior outside of work: Your job must be your primary focus; no fighting, gossiping or standing around visiting; using a professional voice - no yelling or talking loudly; not hanging around the work place when not scheduled to work; acting appropriately out in public because people you work with may see you and it may affect their opinion of you on the job.

THE ROAD TO SELF SUFFICIENCY

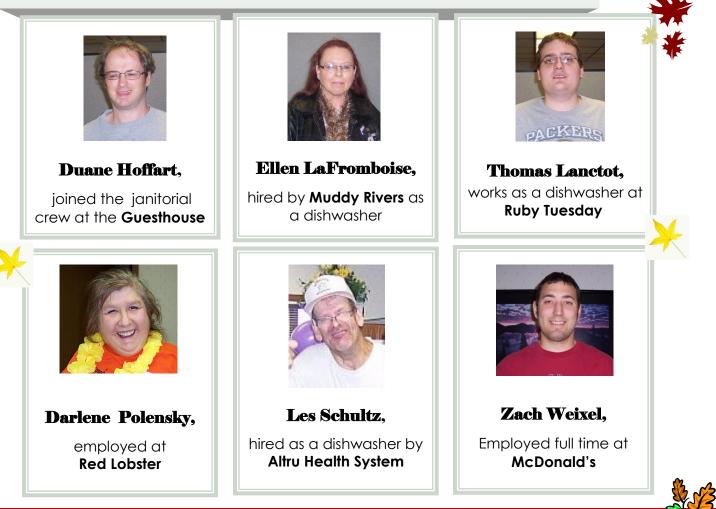
