Looking back...

Eastern Football League 1961 - 1975

In 1975, the Eastern Football League crowned its champion - the Tri Attleboro Kings. Thus the most successful campaign in the 15 year history of the league concluded: the treasury showed a healthy balance and two very solid franchises from Marlboro, Massachusetts and Manchester, Connecticut petitioned for entry.

Things had not always gone as smoothly for the struggling league, however. Over a 15 year span the league has gone by 5 different names and has fielded teams from 7 states and 39 towns. Back in June of 1961, it was known as the New England Football Conference and was made up of teams from Framingham, Wakefield, Lynn, Whitman and Quincy. In those days it cost \$20. to enter a team; in 1975 it cost a new entry \$100. for team dues, \$500. for a franchise, and \$750. for a performance bond, which is returned upon successful completion of the season. For the established teams there is \$100. for dues and \$500. for bond.

There have been many factors contributing to the difficulties that the league and its individual teams have faced, among them inadequate financing, poor management, poor attendance, theft and insufficient media coverage. Only one owner has managed to field a team for 15 consecutive years and even that team has had 7 different homes. Still, in face of all difficulties, the league has managed to survive and today stands stronger than ever.

Perhaps in no season was total disaster closer to the door than in 1967. The league having finished 6 fairly successful years, became trapped in an untenable financial position. In an attempt to create a larger gate the owners began to import big name players and to pay them fairly substantial salaries. And while the gate attendance did increase, the gain was not sufficient to cover expenses and the league was unable to finish out the season.

In 1968 the league reorganized, this time with the lessons of 1967 clearly before them. There was to be no more player payments of any kind. With this percent firmly adhered to, the league grew stronger each year and enters 1976 in its best shape yet. Among the many improvements that the league has adopted over the years is the creation of a slate of officers, having as its president an attorney. In addition the position of Commissioner of Officials was created enabling the league to achieve a fairness and consistency of officiating.

Even when one looks back over the years of struggle, however, things have not been all gloomy. Nearly 4,300 differ ent players have performed, many of whom went on to successful college and pro careers based in part on the exposure that they had gained. A team was flow to Pottsville, Pa. one year for a benefi Cancer Fund Game that netted \$5,000. for charity. Many former high school and college athletes were given the chance to extend their playing careers for a few more years, and countless thousands fans have watched and enjoyed th exciting brand of football offered. Toda in 1976, it appears that at long last th struggling Eastern Football League finally coming of age.



Randolph Oilers Defensive Scouting Report

Coach Paul Costello inherits a defense that has nine starters from 1975 returning from a defense that allowed only 111 points in thirteen games while shutting out their opponents five times. Costello has also picked up some outstanding new talent that should give the Oilers even more depth this season. ..Ranking first in the league in 1975 against the rush, the Oilers should also be impressive this season on pass defense.



DEFENSIVE LINE

Larry Corda, Sundy Sutherland and Ernie DiLoreti are three veteran starters the return up front and ... along with Mike Klapman, Steve Callahan, Allan Banks and Joe McGunigle... have developed an even stronger passerush for this season.

LINEBACKERS

Another strong point for the Oilers will be the linebackers with the likes of Joh Callahan, Danny Hess and Brian McDonoughall back for another season. Also promising to play a big part on defense this year are Steve Romanowski, Dav Bee, Bart Campanella and Joe Pickard.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Brian O'Connell will be joined in the defensive backfield by four other sw tacklers ... Mike Grassia, William Wallington, Harris Thompson and Tomm Joyce -- who have all been working as defensive backs.

SPECIALISTS

Mike Keefe looks as if he will handle the place kicking job for the Oilers in '76.
strong field goal kicker, Keefe is also accurate on the extra points and booms to ball deep on kickoffs.

Punting should be no problem as William Wallington and Mitch Sikora have bublet up impressive statistics during the early workouts.

Randolph Oilers Offensive Scounting Report

In 1975 the Oilers battled back from a 3 - 5 start to put together a 5 game undefeated string and finish the schedule with an 8 - 5 record. Over the second half of the schedule Randolph gained victories over three opponents which had defeated them earlier in the season and finished with what some people feel was the strongest team in the Eastern Football League.

Key to the 1975 surge was the balanced running and passing attack and the strong offensive line that did a good job protecting the quarterback and opening the holes up front. A loss in the opening round of the playoffs to the eventual champions, Tri Attleboro Kings by a 20-13 score, ended the season ... but with several starters returning on offense the Oilers will be out to up their win production this year.

QUARTERBACK

Rick Armstrong, last year's most valuable player, returns ... and if his performance in the EFL Jamboree is any indication (7 for 9, 114 yards, 1 TD), the rugged signal caller is in for quite a season.

Teddy Meyer, a versatile athlete, will again be ready to step in when needed Meyer finished second on the team in scoring, averaged almost 18 yards $\hat{\imath}$ completion.

With veteran Tommy Joyce and Mitch Sikora ... the Oilers are in good shape

RUNNING BACKS

Sturdy - swift Jake Dailey, Doug Northrup and Meyer are the top hands returning from 1975. Paul Killinger, Ed Nelson and Dick Queeney are also slated for action Nelson developed quite a knack for crossing the goal line while at Southeastern Vocational High School as he scored better than 100 points in his sophomore, junior and senior years, while Killinger is a former Rockland High great and scored 10 points in his junior year.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Few teams can boast three wide receivers as capable as Norm Kennedy, Artie Sullivan and John Moriarty. This veteran trio should all rank near the top of the league in receptions.

TIGHT ENDS

Alan Banks and Tom Kelley will team up to give the Oilers two strong scoring threats at tight end. Both are also excellent blockers.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Oilers offensive line should be one of the strongest in the Eastern Footbal League and the return of John Carter, Carl Titus, Kevin Cotter and Leo Venezi are four big reasons why. Also picked by coach Paul Costello, to make the offensive go, are guards Larry DeVoe, and veteran Dick McGrail, along with big Fred Rihbany (an outstanding prospect at tackle), and Mike Molinano a rugger performer who should see a lot of action at guard.



About the coach...

PAUL COSTELLO



Paul Costello, the head coach of the Randolph Oilers, is a man who wears many hats. Born in Dorchester, Paul played his high school football at Boston Technical and later went to the University of Massachusetts where he played fullback on offense and linebacker on defense. During the off season in college, Paul was a member of the swim team and the gymnastic team - the former of which he was the organizer competing on the trampoline where he won the New England AAU Championship eight years in a row, from 1952-1959 and in 1955 placed second in the nationals.

After college, Paul played a year for the Whitman Town Team in the New England Football League before having a try out in 1962 with the Boston Patriots. Returning to Dorchester in 1961, Costello took his first shot at coaching when he joined the Lyons Club Football Team in the Boston Park League.

Winning became a habit for the Lyons Club as they captured 7 league titles from 1961 to 1968. In 1969, the new league didn't seem to make any difference as the Lyons Club won the Eastern Football League crown. For the next three years Costello coached Lee Chisholm's Malden and Peabody Colts -- winning three more titles and 34 straight games.

After a year off, Paul returned to coaching in the EFL in 1974 as head man with the Middleboro Cobras and won his fifth straight EFL title. 12 championships in 14 years --- not a bad record for any coach.

Costello has also been very successful as a high school coach for the past 9 years. Starting at Hyde Park High in 1967, he served as Assistant for two years before moving on to Boston Latin. At Latin after another two years as Assistant Coach, Paul has taken over the head reins for the past five seasons.

1970, his first season, is one he will remember for a long time .. as his team went undefeated and in 1972 they posted an 8-2 record.

Showing his versatility he has also been head coach of basketball for the last five years while producing tournament teams in 1971 and 1972.

Currently making his home in Duxbury with his wife, Joan, and 4 children - Tim, 16, who is a goalie on the Duxbury High Hockey Team, Chrissie, 14, Brian, 12 and Mary Beth 10. Coach Costello continues to keep in shape by playing tennis, basketball, and touch football. Always one to take an active part in Community affairs, Paul also serves on the Recreation and Activities Committee in his home town as well as playing a part in the Town Swimming Program. Having obtained his Bachelor of Science and Master's Degree he is currently going after his CAGS.

1976 promises to be an exciting season for both the Oiler players and fans ... with Paul Costello at the helm.


