Witt leads the league in TD tosses (five) and is ranked second in both passing percentage (59)

and rushing average (7.2).

The Middleboro Cobras entertain Charlestown as both teams put their 2-2 records on the line in a Friday night game scheduled at 8:30 p.m.

The Cobras lost a tough 7-5

game to Marlboro in their last outing and hope to get untracked offensively.

Running back Kelly Brooks stands as one of the league's top runners, gaining 265 yards on 62 attempts, including three TD runs.

Mike Gonsalves ranks second in kickoff returns and third in punt returns, helping to give the Cobra offensive unit good field position.

Middleboro's defensive unit certainly will give Charlestown and its league-leading quarterback Paul Soracco plenty to think about.

The Cobras lead the league in causing turnovers (14), rank second in fewest total yards allowed (607), and have given up the fewest first downs (24).
