Randolph keeping an eye on playoffs

RANDOLPH — The Randolph Oilers are now 5-2 in the Eastern Football League after downing Warren R.I. last week by the score of 28-7.

Their second loss, incurred two weeks ago when the Oilers were defeated 14-7 by Tri-Town in a stunning upset, would appear to have been the death blow as far as Randolph winning or tying for the the regular-season league title.

What the Oilers must do now is polish up their offense and defense for the upcoming playoffs that will begin in three weeks.

The top four teams in the final standings will compete in the championship playoffs and the Dilers are a cinch to be in the nunt.

"Let's face it," admitted Ranlolph coach Tom Pileski, "we got mbushed in that Tri-Town game. t should have been an easy win or us, but we were not physical nough or aggressive enough and hey came up with two touchowns in the final five minutes to eat us."

By scoring four TDs against Varren, the Oilers have a great art on the momentum that they just now build up to properly presere for the playoffs.

"We're going to have to stop Soocco (Paul) and his passes if we be going to get by Charlestown is Friday night (at Charlestown 7:30)," said Plieski. "He was be leading passer in the league of year and is ranked third this ason with 43 completions in 102 tempts for 569 yards and 11 achdowns."

EFL standings with 329 yards gained on 52 carries for an average of six yards per carry, while McGee is one of the fastest backs ever to wear a Randolph uniform.

The Middleboro Cobras draw a bye this week, but will face a key matchup next Friday when they travel to Randolph for the second meeting between these two clubs. The Cobras were the winners when they met earlier in the season.

"Bobby (Witt) is the leading passer percentage-wise in the EFL this year and sometimes I think we look for the easy score rather than grinding it out on the ground at five or six yards a clip," added the coach.

Pileski noted that his squad gained only 102 yards on the ground against Warren in spite of the four scores. Three of the touchdowns were actually set up by the defense with timely interceptions.

"We need a strong running game to take the pressure off Witt," concluded Pileski, "and we have two of the best ball carriers in the league in Mike Waithe and Jay McGee."
